Long Drives Aim of Most Golfers

I do not suppose that there is a single golfer playing today, who has not, at some time or other, wished for more length from the tee. Altogether, long driving is a thing to be desired, though pros I know would rather improve their putting.

However, there is a lot to be said on both sides, for not even the long driver has it all his own way. Let us admit, for the purpose of argument, that to be able to drive a long ball really is an advantage. A hole of 300 yards can be reached in two by the long hitter, and if the second hole is possible. Again, we get a hole of 300 yards; here by reason of his long hitting a very short approach is all that is necessary for the second, and to be able to play a short mashie instead of a stiff iron is always an advantage. Undoubtedly a powerful driver has much to be thankful for, but—there is another side to the question.

So far as amateur golf is concerned, the long hitter in a club is usually one of the hit-or-miss type. You will generally find that the scratch man is shorter but more consistent from the tee. The slinger is usually about 12 handicap, a man of brawn, and he plays for the sheer love of slugging.

However, much can be said for and against long driving but personally I am quite content to take the risk of reaching trouble from the tee.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16. (AP)—Young Firpo, former Burke, Idaho, miner, slugged his way to an easy ten round victory over Harry Dillon, Winnipeg, here last night. The fight was a slugger's affair from start to finish with Firpo doing the slugging. Dillon went down twice in the sixth from the miner's terrific punches, but was up after a short count. In the same round Firpo rushed the Canadian to the ropes and both went over into the laps of ring-siders. Dillon was unable to locate the wily Idahoan, who was fast and carried the fight from all angles. Firpo weighed 174½ against Dillon's 176.

In his first match with the titleholder Sarpolis gave Sonnenberg a close hard battle, but fell a victim to a surprise fall in the fifth round.

Sarpolis had the champion in his per of scissor hold when Sonnenberg scored the fall. The Cleveland hander clamped on the leg hold but fell back on to his back and the champion held him there long enough to win.

With a double nelson in the fourth round, Tom Allen, Spokane light heavyweight defeated August Sapp of Seattle. Don Anderson, Salem, Ore., and Ted Lange, Seattle, draw in the opener.

With Parades and Opening Day Exercises Over, Teams Settle Down to Business

With the flagpole parades and other opening day ceremonies out of the way for another year, major league baseball players now are ready to settle down to the serious business of trying to keep runners parading across the plate during the next 157 games of the season. Only one opening is left for today. The Chicago White Sox and Cleveland Indians were stopped by rain at Chicago yesterday.

Weather Checks Crowd
Cold and rainy weather held down the size of some of the opening day crowds, but the 200,000 fans who witnessed yesterday's games found no reason for disappointment. There was a little bit of everything, including the unexpected, taking place. The two champions of 1929, the Philadelphia Athletics and Chicago Cubs, resumed their places at the top of the standings with victories over the New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals, respectively.

A's Win Handily
The Athletics, behind the brilliant pitching of Lefty Grove, gained a 6 to 2 victory over the Yankees with comparative ease.

Grove yielded only six hits and fanned nine while Al Simmons and Max Bishop collected the runs. Simmons, a holdout until noon yesterday, hit a home run his first time at bat. Bishop crossed the plate three times.

Cubs Rally to Win
The Cubs engaged in a clout-ding duel at St. Louis and barely outlasted a Cardinal rally which netted seven runs in the last three innings to pull out a 9 to 5 triumph.

Detroit's Tigers joined the Athletics at the top of the American league standing with a 6 to 1 victory over the St. Louis Browns in a game that produced four homers, half the day's total. Washington, playing its second game, beat the Boston Red Sox 6 to 1 to place both teams at the 500 mark.

Phillies Win Close One
Brooklyn and Philadelphia, rated as the heavy slugging teams of the National league, engaged in the day's tightest duel, the Phillies winning 1 to 0. Lester Sweetland, a Brooklyn jinx, out-

pitched the rival southpaw, Bill Clarke, granting the Robins but three hits and setting down 18 men in order in the last six innings. A record opening day crowd for Ebbets field, 27,000, was present.

Pirates Break Jinx
Pittsburgh's Pirates broke another jinx to beat out the Cincinnati Reds, 7 to 6. Red Lucas, who had lost but one game to Pittsburgh since 1927, gave up 13 hits, including successive

homers by Bartel and Hemsley, before he was removed in the sixth inning. Paul Waner collected four of the blows.

Before the biggest crowd of them all, some 40,000 fans, the New York Giants barely nosed out the Boston Braves, 3 to 2, in a game of errors. Mistakes were entirely or partly responsible for all but the winning run in the battle between Bill Walker of New York and Harry Sethold of

Boston, although there was plenty of hitting on both sides. The victory brought Walker's winning streak, carried over from 1929, to ten games in a row.
