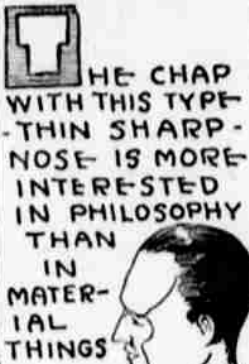


NEWS IN BRIEF

House Duties on Leather Goods to Stay in Measure

WASHINGTON, April 16 (AP)—The house duties on hides, leathers and shoes, all now on the free list, were agreed upon today by the congressional conferees on the tariff bill.

The tariff acceptable is 10 percent on hides, 12½ to 20 percent on leathers and 20 percent on shoes.

The senate bill restored all of these to the free list, where they have been for years.

By forcing the senate group to recede from the senate action in four times voting down duties on the high and leather products, the house conferees scored their biggest victory since the two groups met to adjust differences over the Hawley-Smoot measure.

The hide, leather and shoe dispute was one of the hardest fought in the senate tariff struggle.
