

GRADE SCHOOLS TO COMPETE IN MEDAL CONTEST

Declamation Event To Open at Altamont Friday Evening

The first annual grade school declamatory contest, in which pupils from all of Klamath county will compete for four gold and four silver medals, will be held at Altamont school auditorium on Friday evening, April 19th, at 8 o'clock.

The county has previously been divided into four sections, with Bonanza, Merrill, Chiloquin and Altamont as centers, in which local contests have been held. Winners in each district have been chosen, and these victorious ones will now compete on Friday evening for the medals offered in each of four divisions as follows: 5-6 grades, serious; 6-6 grades, humorous; 7-8 grades, serious; and 7-8 grades, humorous.

Seven Schools Enter

Although complete information as to the outcome of the various preliminary contests is lacking, it is known that contestants will take part, Malibu, Henley, Bonanza, Shaw, Bertram, Camp, Fairhaven, Chiloquin and Altamont.

Several of the schools will present musical numbers to add to the evening's entertainment.

The judges for the contest will be Margaret K. and Frederick Berger of the Klamath Union high, and Mrs. Fred Glover.

A nominal charge of 15 cents for adults and 5 cents for children will be made at the door in order to cover the expenses incidental to the contest.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, April 16. (AP)—Butter prices continued easy today after yesterday's decline, but no further reduction was announced.

Eggs also were stationary, with the surplus receipts going into storage.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Apple stocks are now confined largely to higher-priced sorts, with local ungraded apples practically unavailable. Extra fancy Winesaps of desirable sizes are selling to retailers at \$2.25 per cwt. for their own use. Winesaps now being unloaded probably marks the last arrival of the season."

"Local asparagus is in lighter supply today, and the market is firm at \$1.25-1.35 per dozen bunches. Fancy young asparagus is rather scarce, and commands a premium over the coarse stemmy stock which now comprises most of the offerings."

"Total potato shipments are light. Most terminal markets are still well supplied from former heavy shipments, and have not yet reacted to the last few days of light supplies."

"Onions are very dull at all middle-western markets, and coast cities are well supplied, for the present at least. Oregon growers are now receiving about \$1.10 per cwt. for their onions, with a few sales of good stock 10-15c higher."

"Cabbage prices advanced at southern shipping points over the week-end, and dropped sharply yesterday. Portland's supplies are unchanged at 20c per lb."

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Four diamond rings, valued by C. M. Idelman, Portland attorney, at \$2,550, were stolen from a wall safe in his downtown office during the night. Idelman told authorities today. One of the rings, a cluster of diamonds, was valued at \$2,000, he said.

CLERK'S OFFICE THROGGLED WITH TARDY VOTERS

Over 400 voters crowded the county clerk's office yesterday from the opening hour until 5 p. m. when the time for registration to vote in the May 16 primary election was officially closed by law. It was stated last night by Charles Delap, deputy county clerk.

It is estimated that about 6,000 are registered in the city precincts and will be entitled to vote in the primary election. Only those who are registered within the last three years are entitled to vote, as it is unlawful to swear voters in at the polls under a law enacted by a recent legislature.

The registration figures will not be fully compiled for several days it is stated.

The new Eaglerock plane recently purchased by Forrest Colson and Lee Parker arrived at the old airport south of the city yesterday after having been forced to land because of weather conditions at Chemult Sunday night.

E. V. Allen, local pilot, who piloted the ship from Portland where it was tested and licensed, encountered such heavy sleet and snow Sunday at Chemult that he thought it best not to fly above the "low ceiling" and landed the plane near the Chemult depot.

Weather conditions were still adverse on Monday but yesterday the plane was flown here without difficulty.

Two Eaglerock and one Traveler are now stationed at the old airport and are ready for commercial use under the Klamath Flying service.
