Hansen Breaks Gus's String of Straight Falls

PORTLAND, Ore., April 17. (AP)—While Charley Hansen, Seattle heavyweight wrestler, lost his match to Dynamite Gus Sonnenberg, generally recognized heavyweight champion, here last night, he gave the crowd a thrill when he broke the champion's string of straight falls by pinning Sonnenberg for the second fall of the match. After taking the first fall in 25 minutes 30 seconds with rabbit punches and flying tackles Sonnenberg came back prepared to end the match in short order. He dived for the rugged Swede, who side-stepped and dealt the champion a wicked rabbit punch behind the ear. Sonnenberg dropped with Hansen on top and while partly stunned Hansen rolled him over with a crotch hold for the fall. It all happened in just 14 seconds. Sonnenberg took the final fall with a reverse winglock in seven minutes after a furious struggle in which Hansen was the aggressor.

Water Shots Easy If You Know How

"If you are trapped in a water hazard," remarked Jack Hutchinson to me one day, "it is often possible to save a penalty stroke by playing the ball, but judgment must be exercised in each particular case as to whether to lift or play. It is not nearly as difficult to hit a ball under water as is generally believed. If one can get a fairly good stance. The chief requisite is courage. It takes some strength of mind to lay oneself open to the possibility of getting splashed all over with dirty water, but if the player will hit boldly, keeping his eye firmly fixed on the ball and endeavoring to get well under it, he will generally find that he can get the ball away quite well. Water does not offer nearly the same resistance to the club as sand."

"I've seen George Duncan play a ball out of water with a spoon," continued Jack. "Nevertheless a spoon is not to be recommended for the ordinary golfer for such a shot. An iron, masher or niblick are much safer clubs to use."

Marshall Defeats Strangler Lewis

LOS ANGELES, April 17. (AP)—Everett Marshall, La Junta, Colo., defeated Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former heavyweight wrestling champion, by winning the last two falls of their three fall match here last night. Marshall, former Washington State College student, was forced to abandon his airplane spin in favor of the body slam in order to win from the veteran mat man.

Lewis won the first fall with a headlock in 32 minutes, 16 seconds. Marshall came back eagerly and took the second fall with a body slam in 19 minutes, 21 seconds.

Lewis still was groggy when called into the ring for the third time, and the young Coloradoan won the deciding fall with a body slam in 33 seconds.
