

D. A. R. AVOIDS CONTROVERSIAL DISCUSSIONS

Injection of Religion And Politics to Be Eliminated

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—The Daughters of the American Revolution, today definitely excluded the prohibition question from its platform by reaffirming resolutions of 1913 and 1914 declaring it the policy of the society to avoid all controversial subjects of a religious and political nature.

When the resolution was read to the 39th continental congress, Mrs. Anthony Wayne Cook, honorary president-general, who urged the members to support prohibition at the opening session Monday, rose on the platform and remarked:

Resolution Forgiven
"Nobody has lived up to that resolution to avoid controversial subjects. I would suggest that we live up to that resolution."
She turned to the resolutions committee chairman, Mrs. Robert J. Johnson, city manager of Humboldt, Iowa, and reiterated her belief that a clause asking members to live up to their creed be inserted in the resolution to avoid controversial subjects.

New Resolution Adopted
The congress adopted the resolution without any further discussion, however. Mrs. Cook in her opening remarks had expressed the belief that the Daughters of the American Revolution should endorse prohibition, and had said that in spite of the polls being taken by newspapers and magazines resulting in the showing of wet sentiment, she believed the country was still dry.

Under a suspension of the rules, Mrs. Charles B. Brian of Tennessee, today withdrew her name from the contest for honorary vice president general and the convention elected the remaining candidate, Mrs. Eliza Perry Leary, of Seattle, Wash.

Major Shepard to Answer to Charge of Slaying Wife

TOPEKA, Kas., April 15. (AP)—Maj. Charles A. Shepard, 59-year old Denver army medical corps officer, was indicted by a federal grand jury here today on a charge of murdering his 37-year-old second wife at Fort Riley, Kas., last summer.

Major Shepard's bond was set at \$20,000. It was indicated at the United States district attorney's office that the case probably would be set for trial at the term of federal court convening in Kansas City, December 1.

The charge of first degree murder carries the death penalty upon conviction unless the jury should recommend life imprisonment.

The charge arose in federal, instead of state court where the death penalty has been abolished by law, because the scene of the alleged crime was federal property.

ELECTRIC HOG "STICKER"
MUNICH—The human hog sticker has been replaced in slaughter houses here by electricity. This system of hog slaughter is said to be more humane than the stabbing method. Hogs to be slaughtered are run down a chute where an electric current is shot into their bodies. Only ten seconds are required to kill each hog and 200 of them have been slaughtered in an hour.

DURABLE DOUGH
PARIS—A Swiss scientist, M. V. Schoop, has announced a method of making paper money which cannot be destroyed. His process consists of treating the paper pulp with a coating of tin. This coating, applied by an atomizer, is broken up into minute particles, thus giving the paper a flexibility and protection against tearing and burning.

LONDON—Margaret Preston might have been free with her words in life, but in her will she cut down on them until with only 141 words she disposed of more than \$1,000,000. The will included her full name, address, and description, the appointment of an executor and similar details.

Airman Reported Missing in Utah Mountain Region

SALT LAKE CITY, April 15. (AP)—John Blum of Seattle, Wash., president of the Northwest Air Service, who left Cheyenne, Wyo., yesterday enroute back to Washington, had not arrived at the airport here today and officials expressed the belief that a plane apparently in distress reported over Wallsburg, Utah, 40 miles southeast of here, was that of Blum and he probably crashed in the mountains. Blum, who was returning to Washington from North Platte, Neb., where he had taken O. M. Green, Olympia, Wash., banker, enroute to Chicago to his seriously ill son, was due here at 5 p. m. yesterday and had planned to follow the air mail route from here to Boise, Idaho, and Pasco, Wash.

Officials at the airport here said he had only about six hours gasoline, when he left Cheyenne and the trip here ordinarily would take about five hours.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 15. (AP)—John Blum, Seattle, Wash., president of the Northwest Air Service, reported missing last night, spent the night at Pocatello, Idaho, and left this morning in his plane enroute home, said information received here from Pocatello.

ATLANTIC, Ia., April 15. (AP)—Mrs. Mary Nelson, 56 year old, a mother, grandmother and great-grandmother, won a \$500 breach of promise verdict in district court yesterday.

Mrs. Nelson charged that Alexander Roe, 56 year old, had proposed marriage several times and had "made ardent love" to her until last June, when his ardor cooled. She asked \$15,000 damages, but the jury after deliberating eight hours cut it to \$500.

Authorities at Jerusalem Arm For Emergencies

JERUSALEM, April 15. (AP)—Jewish Telegraphic Agency—Machine guns have been placed in strategic positions on all the main streets of Jerusalem to prevent possible trouble growing out of the Christian and Mohammedan holidays.

Armed soldiers have been placed on guard in front of the former Russian compound, now the court house. A party of Jewish residents who wanted to drive to Amman, in Transjordan, to see the Nebi Musa—important feast in the Mohammedan religious calendar—were barred by the authorities who said they could not guarantee their safety.

BURBANK, Cal., April 16 (AP)—Colonel Charles A. He said that the start of the flight probably would be made within four or five days. Colonel Lindbergh said his plans were to maintain an altitude of 10,000 feet most of the way.

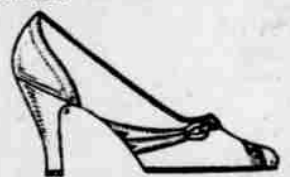
