

BOMB WRECKS DRY WORKER'S PALATIAL HOME

Second Bombing of Week
At Ashtabula; Strike
May Be Cause

ASHTABULA, Ohio, April 18. (AP)—The palatial home of M. C. Robinson, prominent coal dealer, was mysteriously bombed early today.

No one was injured. The detonation blew out a large part of the foundation and shattered windows throughout the house, causing extensive damage.

Family Asleep Upstairs
Mr. and Mrs. Robinson and a maid were asleep in their upstairs bedrooms at the time.

The bomb was planted near a basement window.

Mr. Robinson was unable to ascribe any reason for the act. He has been a prominent dry worker, but did not ascribe the bombing to his activities against bootleggers.

No Fire Followed
The detonation was heard over a large area of the city. Gas lines of the house were torn out but no fire followed.

The bombing was the second within a week here. The Palace theater block was bombed early this week. This was ascribed to garment workers' troubles. A clothing manufacturer occupied the third floor of the building.

Robinson Civic Leader
Robinson is one of the leaders in the city and always has taken active interest in civic affairs.

For many years he took a prominent part in anti-saloon affairs. He operates a large building supply and retail coal firm.

The house is estimated to be worth \$25,000.

Curran Says Tide Turning Against Drys in Congress

WASHINGTON, April 18. (AP)—Henry H. Curran, president of the association against the prohibition amendment, testified today before the senate lobby committee that the "tide is turning" against prohibition in congress.

The subject was brought up by Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, as Curran began his third day of testimony before the committee.

After reading a news story published in 1927 which said the country was dry, Walsh asked the witness:

"Do you still think the tide is turning in favor of prohibition?"

"There is no doubt of it," Curran insisted.

"The pendulum has a long, wide swing," he added, "and it is a tide of opinion that cannot be stopped."

Earthquake Hits Grecian Islands

ATHENS, Greece, April 18. (AP)—Severe earthquake shocks rocking the Peloponnese during the night did extensive damage in several small island towns. Athens and the Piraeus were shaken badly, and there was great alarm among crowds of Holy Thursday worshippers in churches.

Several persons were injured, one seriously, in collapse of a church tower at Isthmia, and a number were hurt at Corinth through collapse of several houses. At Sparta a church tower fell, but there were no casualties.

There was little material damage in Athens. Many women, particularly among the Easter worshippers, fainted. The shock, which lasted five seconds here, was felt as far north as Kometine in Thrace. Four people were injured there during the panic which followed the tremor.

The epicenter was placed in the Aegean Gulf 25 miles from Athens.

Anti-Dry Asserts Hoover Weakening On Enforcement

WASHINGTON, April 18. (AP)—An expression of belief by W. H. Stuyton, chairman of the board of the association against the prohibition amendment, that President Hoover "is beginning to doubt whether prohibition can be enforced," was received today by the senate lobby committee.

The opinion was contained in a letter written last February by Stuyton to Charles S. Wood, of Philadelphia, a vice president of the wet organization.

It said:

"My own feeling is, as I talk

to senators, members of congress, and public officials here, that Mr. Hoover is beginning to doubt whether prohibition can be enforced."

It added that Mr. Hoover "wants to take plenty of time to consider it, but he is being abused a little too much."
