For some persons, a change of heart is beneficial; for others, a change of a famous name spells success. It wasn't until Reginald Denny of stage fame became John Garrick of the Fox Movietone movies that world wide success began to look him in the face.

As John Garrick, the actor won a singing lead in that musical extravaganza, "Married in Hollywood," featuring Norma Terris of stage fame. As John Garrick also he won the lead in "The Sky Hawk," the all talking Fox Movietone romance of the world of flight. It might be added that it was not only the name, but a tenor-robust voice and flying ability.

Garrick, being modest, says his real claim to glory lies in the fact that he is about the only stage actor now in pictures who has not been in New York. But Fox officials believe he is a real talker find; the coming picture of the screen; the epitome of what real talking picture heroes should be.

With his English accent, Garrick could win any audience. He was born in Brighton, England, in 1902 and educated in Brighton schools and Brighton college. Some of the interesting facts about his life are:

Gifted Star Has Daring Role in Comedy-Drama at Pine Tree

One of the most poignant examples of the rapid rise to fame of stage-trained talent in the new medium of the talking screen is found in the past year's events in the life of Ruth Chatterton, Paramount star.

On December 29, 1928, Paramount released "Sins of the Fathers" in which Miss Chatterton supported Emil Jennings, the star.

Now on December 28, 1929, Paramount releases "The Laughing Lady" in which Miss Chatterton is the star. It is her fifth picture in a year's time. Four of them have been all-talking releases. After "Sins of the Fathers" came "The Doctor's Secret," then "The Dummy," then "Madame X" and now "The Laughing Lady" which will be seen and heard at the Pine Tree Theatre for two days beginning on Sunday.

Miss Chatterton had a prolonged stage career, and was one of Broadway's favorites at the time Paramount signed her for her first screen part. She joined a stock company in Washington when she was but 14 years old. Encouraged by her superior, and abetted by a burning aspiration to achieve fame on the boards, she climbed quickly. She was being starred on the stage when she was 18 years old.

Among the many productions in which she appeared were "Daddy Long Legs," "A Marriage of Convenience," "The Green Hat" and "The Devil's Plum Tree." She has produced a number of her successes herself. "The Laughing Lady" was adapted from the Alfred Sutra play by Bartlett Cormack and Arthur Richman, who have written the screen stories from a number of other Broadway successes. Victor Schertzinger, musician-director, who made "Red-skin" and "Nothing But the Truth," and who wrote the music for "The Love Parade," produced "The Laughing Lady" for Paramount.

Clive Brook, seen recently in "The Return of Sherlock Holmes" heads Miss Chatterton's supporting cast of nearly a score of well-known stage actors in "The Laughing Lady."

AT THE LIBERTY

How a good director can paralyze the theatre-goers was shown in Hollywood recently when a test was made of the "puzzling power" of "Trent's Last Case" at a preview of the picture.

The film, in the same form as it will be shown Sunday at the Liberty Theatre, was exhibited in one of the smaller picture houses on Hollywood boulevard to a cosmopolitan group of spectators, and in the middle of the last reel, just before the mystery was revealed, the picture was stopped by order of Howard Hawks, who directed the production.

As the lights went up, slips of paper were passed out to each member of the group, with a request that they write down the name of the killer, and their reasons for believing that their guess was correct. Out of the 542 spectators, only seven picked the real "murderer" out of the six possible "suspects," giving a percentage of one and three-tenths.

In addition to the mystifying qualities of the picture, an unusually fine cast is another of its features. Donald Crisp, Raymond Hatton, Raymond Griffith, Marceline Day, Lawrence Gray, Nicholas Soussanin and Anita Garvin take the principal roles and each gives a distinctive performance. The production was based on the noted mystery novel by C. E. Bentley.
