

Child Delinquency Is Traced To Neglect of Spine

FIANCE DIES IN CRASH

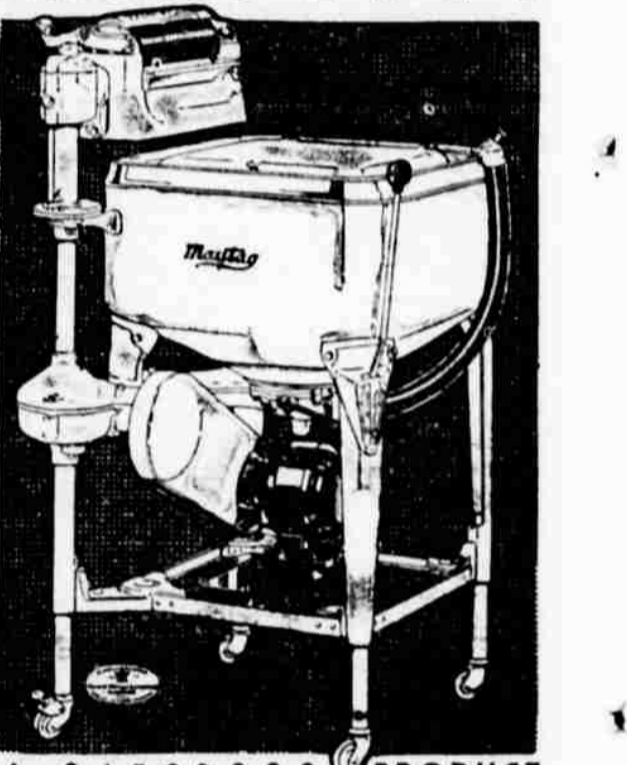
