CALIFORNIANS THROUGH WITH GIANT ITALIAN

Primo and Manager See Forever Barred; Four Others Suspended

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22. (AP)—The State Athletic commission has voted thumbs down on Primo Carnera, giant Italian heavyweight, and his manager, Leon See of France.

In a drastic ruling which followed an investigation into circumstances attending the unsatisfactory end of the Leon Chevrolet bout in Oakland last week, the commission yesterday barred the Italian and his manager from ever appearing again in a California ring. Their licenses were revoked.

In addition, the commission punished four others involved in the affair with indefinite suspensions. They were Frank Churchill of Los Angeles, Carnera's Pacific coast representative, Tim McGrath of this city, manager of Chevrolet, and the latter's two seconds, Bob Liga, San Francisco, and Robert Perry of Hollywood. In doing out the penalties the commission unanimously adopted recommendations of Commissioner Charles F. Traugott, who conducted a two-day investigation.

Carnera, weighing 276 pounds, was awarded a technical knockout over Chevrolet, 215-pound negro, when Bob Perry, one of the latter's seconds, tossed in the towel in the sixth round, after the negro had clambered to his feet following a trip to the canvas. The negro was unharmed and willing to continue, and Perry's action started a riot in which he was badly mauled.

Purses of both fighters, \$13,239 for Carnera and \$1,500 for Chevrolet, were held up, but the commission concluded it had no right to hold the money, and returned it. Commissioner Traugott added that he believed both boxers were giving their best efforts, and pointed out that neither was under suspicion.

Klamath Cubs to Meet Normal Team Twice This Week

Klamath Cubs, the city's junior baseball team composed of ex-high school boys and a few of the present upper classmen, will meet the Ashland Normal school team in a two-game series this week. Thursday the boys go to Ashland to play the Normalites and Friday the Ashlanders come to Klamath Falls.

The Cubs are a speedy bunch of youngsters and have a most laudable ambition to make the fourth team in the Southern Oregon league. The Ashland-Phoenix team dropped out of the league and Jack Harney, sponsor for the Cubs, feels sure his bunch can give any of the other teams sufficient worry to be considered pennant contenders. This matter will be hashed out in a meeting at the Elks temple Wednesday evening.

The Different Store, operated by Mr. Harney's father, has decked the Cubs out in nifty uniforms. Young Harney is endeavoring to line up several games for his aggregation and if Klamath fans want to see what the Cubs can do they are asked to visit the fair grounds park Friday afternoon when the Normal team plays here.

The Nut Cracker

Since trying out this spring as a member of the Yankee's pitching corps, I have come to the realization that golf, after all, is a more popular sport than baseball, so I have decided to devote my talents to instructing the duffer.

Today we will take up the matter of clothing and outfitting the successful golfer. First of all, skis inevitably will interfere with your putting and should never be worn. Mustaches, sideburns and goatees shouldn't even be countenanced on the fairways.

Wear something forceful, yet not too gaudy. I have found that kilts are interesting where good form is predominant. When wearing kilts and making the drive, be sure to keep both feet on the ground. Otherwise, there is always the danger of pneumonia.

One of the advantages of kilts is that the foursome just ahead inevitably will turn around to look at you, and while they are watching, you can punt your ball strategically right through them.

There are several handy little instruments besides a corkscrew that every good golfer shouldn't be without. Try to have a small sickle and pocket-knife along. You can save yourself many a stroke in the rough with these simple little tools. It is also the better part of wisdom to have a small compass and range-finder in your bag.

You should have at least 125 clubs in your bag. I don't believe I can overstate the importance of this. It is much easier to say, "that gives me a 43" at the end of nine holes if you have a bag bristling with sticks than it would be if you carried merely four or five clubs. Besides conquering your timidities, a large assortment of clubs lends prestige.

Pitcher Must Back Up Third

"If I had backed up third base I would have shut out Pittsburgh today, Mac." I said to Manager McMurrah of the Giants one day.

"That's right, Al, and it will cost you \$25.00 for failure to obey my orders."

A pitcher should make it a habit to always back up home plate and third base on all throws from the outfield. He is absolutely of no use to himself or anybody else standing out in the middle of the diamond on throws to third and home and often by retrieving a wild throw or a ball that gets away from a third baseman, he saves a run that would otherwise score. If there is a wild throw from the outfield to the plate, by backing up the catcher he stops the hitter, or other runners on the paths from taking an extra base. He can usually anticipate the bases where the throw will be made either to catch a runner or head him off.

When backing up a play don't "shake hands" with the baseman or catcher, but be well back of him from thirty to fifty feet. Otherwise you will not be in position to judge a wild throw.

Mrs. McCutcheon One of Greatest Bowlers in World

Mrs. R. J. McCutcheon of Pueblo, Colo., again has demonstrated that she not only is entitled to the rating of the greatest woman bowler but ranks with the best in the world. In the recent Brunswick 200 club tournament, rolled in Cleveland simultaneously with the American Bowling Congress tournament, Mrs. McCutcheon, the only woman in the competition, finished fourth in a field of 139. Only bowlers who have rolled a perfect score are eligible to roll in the 200 championship. J. Kiasoff of Cleveland, with a 766, was the winner.

Scores 678
Mrs. McCutcheon had a score of 678, and except for a bad split in her third game, had a chance to finish first. Joe Palcaro of New York, the world's open champion, was twelfth with 660. Joe Scribner of Detroit, Otto Stein of St. Louis, E. Kraft of Port Wayne, H. Steers, Chuck Collier, Jimmy Smith and F. Kartheiser of Chicago, Barney Spinella and Walter Seering of New York were among the noted bowlers who failed to finish among the first twelve. Everett Scott, former New York Yankee shortstop, was 25th with 205, 153, 245 for a 633 total.

Good As Best Men
Many of the experts who watched Mrs. McCutcheon bowl said she not only was the greatest woman bowler but she could beat 90 per cent of the men. One famous bowling man said he was ready to back her in a special match against any bowler in the world, on the condition that the match be limited to series of five games instead of the regular ten.

National Leaguers Get On Toes and Rap Out 97 Hits

Pitchers have been grabbing the headlines so often this baseball season that National league batsmen found it necessary to take them down a peg or two.

Giants Take Honors
The day's batting honors went to the New York Giants, who smashed out 14 safeties, including four for the circuit, to beat the Philadelphia Phillies 8-6, and chalk up their fourth successive win without a defeat.

Wilson, Hartnett and Beck hit homers as the Chicago Cubs whipped Cincinnati, 9 to 1. All told the Cubs collected 14 safe hits off five.

Del Bissonette was the big noise in a 16-hit attack the Brooklyn Robins launched against the Braves, to win 15-8. Bissonette drove in seven runs with a homer, triple and single. His homer and triple each came with the bases filled.

The Pittsburgh Pirates made good use of their seven hits to beat St. Louis 6-4. The Cards collected nine safeties, but Brame was effective in the pinches. Combs hit for the circuit in the second inning.

Hadley Bumps A's
Pitchers dominated the American League Games. Irving (Bumps) Hadley of the Washington Senators, was too much for the Philadelphia Athletics, and

the A's went down to their first defeat of the season, 6-3.

Clint Brown, rookie pitcher, held the Detroit to five hits, and Cleveland won without trouble, 6-1. The Indians batted around in the first inning, scoring four runs on five hits.

Ted Lyons was the whole show as the Chicago White Sox nosed out St. Louis, 3-2, in ten innings. Lyons held the Browns to five hits, and scored the winning run in the tenth when he tripled and came home on Ernie Smith's single. Willie Kimm hit a homer with one on in the seventh.

The Yankees and Red Sox had an open date.

Jackie Fields in Stronger Position

KANSAS CITY, April 22. (AP)—Jackie Fields of San Francisco, welterweight champion, sat firmly on his throne today, having clearly demonstrated his superiority here last night over Meyer Grace of Philadelphia.

The champion knocked out the Philadelphia in the third round of a scheduled ten-round bout. It was a non-title affair.

Grace held the edge during the first two rounds; battling even more aggressively than the coast boxer. In the third round, however, the champion knocked his opponent down three times—the last time for the count.

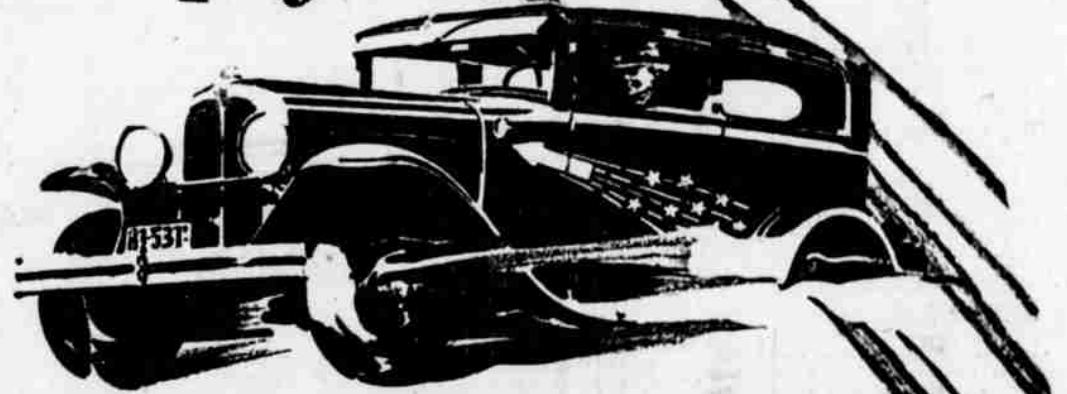


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
