Council Asks Airport Bids; Milk Ordinance Discussed For Klamath

Plans and specifications for the construction and paving of 5,000 feet of runway at the Klamath Falls municipal airport, drawn up by City Engineer C. C. Kelley, were accepted last night at the city council meeting and the police judge authorized to advertise for bids on this improvement work. The bids must be in on Monday, April 22.

The estimated cost of the work is around \$6,000. Three proposed methods are included in the plans. The broken stones and cold asphaltic binder was given in the data furnished by Mr. Kelley at \$5,330.75; broken stones and road oil at a probable cost of \$5,688.75 and broken stone in place and broken stone in stock at a probable cost of \$5,330.

Airport Badly Needed

It was pointed out that the field used now for the planes to land on will be plowed in the near future and that work on the new airport must be rushed as quickly as possible.

A cross runway of 2,000 feet will not be paved at the present time but the two main runways of 2,000 and 1,000 feet will be paved.

Appoint Committee

Dr. E. D. Lamb and C. A. Henderson, county agent, were appointed by the council members to compose a committee to meet with the dairymen and farmers of the county in order to formulate some acceptable ordinance governing the sale of milk and dairy conditions within the city. This committee will meet later and report the result of the meeting back to the council.

A letter from C. A. Henderson was read, in which he stated that he had talked with a number of dairymen and that most of them seem to be somewhat alarmed as to what the effect of the ordinance will be. "It is a known fact that the standard ordinance was really adopted for southern cities where the herds were particularly large, and it adopted without change in the districts where herds are small, it would work a serious hardship on over 90 per cent of the dairymen engaged in the production of whole milk," Mr. Henderson stated, and continued:

"Under these conditions, I would suggest that a meeting of all dairymen be called where the matter can be thoroughly explained and a dairy committee appointed by the dairymen to work with the city council in securing the right kind of an ordinance. It seems to me that we should make changes in the standard ordinance similar to those approved by dairymen of Multnomah or Jackson counties, and after talking with dairymen, I have drawn the following conclusions:

1. Cooling temperatures should be increased from 50 to 60 degrees. Water temperatures are such that artificial refrigeration would be required on each dairy farm unless this is changed.

2. I believe wooden floors should be permitted, particularly the 2-inch tongue and groove tight floor. In regard to this, it might even be necessary to permit a floor of still cheaper construction.

3. I believe dairymen would be willing to require the abortion test, particularly if they be given time to clean up their herds. A large number of dairymen now have their herds cleaned up and others are working at it as fast as possible."

Mr. Henderson pointed out that much unnecessary friction could be prevented if the dairymen were allowed to meet with each other and thoroughly go over the matter before an ordinance is drawn up and passed.

The local 336, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, petitioned the city council at last night's meeting to enact an ordinance licensing electrical contractors in the city for three reasons:

Salmon Fishing Not So Good Say Valley Sportsmen

OREGON CITY, Ore., April 22. (AP)—Officials of manufacturing plants announced here today they would co-operate with the state fish commission in closing down week ends for the purpose of creating more water at the falls to allow salmon to ascend the fish ladder en route to the spawning grounds.

Mill operators expected to shut down intakes to increase the central flow.

Thousands of salmon have gathered at the foot of the falls awaiting a rise in the river to aid them in crossing the falls to the upper grounds. Commercial fishermen have complained to the game commission that the usual run has not appeared, while sportsmen below the falls have experienced poor fishing.

There were 1,000 fishermen on the river Sunday. But 300 fish were caught.
