CHAMPION CUBS JUST ANOTHER BASEBALL CLUB

Hallahan, Card Hurler, In Fair Way to Put Jinx on Leaders

The Chicago Cubs may be champions of the National league and a generally dangerous team, but they are just another ball club where Bill Hallahan, a left handed pitcher who failed to live up to expectations last season, already has beaten the Cubs twice this season and is in a fair way to become a permanent jinx if he can continue his pace.

Hack Hits Homer

In two games, the Cubs have scored just four runs off Hallahan's delivery, three of them coming from a homer by Hack Wilson yesterday as the Cardinals scored a 3 to 1 triumph. And they have made only seven hits.

The Cards and the Cubs supplied just half of yesterday's National league schedule as New York and Boston were rained out while Pittsburgh and Cincinnati were not scheduled.

Phils Beat Robins

In the other game, the Phils beat out the Brooklyn Robins, 6 to 5, as Chuck Klein and Barney Friberg of Philadelphia's heavy hitting. They each got a homer in the first inning to gain a 3-0 lead and Klein added a double and two singles in four times at bat.

Miller Scores Homer

The champion Philadelphia Athletics continued to set the pace for the American league by demonstrating to a New York crowd of 56,000 the largest turnout so far this season, just how to beat the Yankees. A home run in the ninth inning by Bing Miller gave the Athletics a 7 to 6 victory after the teams had started out with a wild slugger apiece for three frames that drove lefty Grove from the mound and nearly did the same to Roy Sherid, young Yankee hurler.

White Sox Move Up

The Chicago White Sox moved into second place in the standing by defeating the Cleveland Indians, 4 to 3, for their third victory in four games. The pitching of Al Thomas turned the trick.

Washington continued its smart playing to nose out the surprising Boston Red Sox, 4 to 3, in a twelve inning duel between Charley Ruffing of Boston and three Senator mounds-men. Ruffing struck out eight but made a few mistakes and the Senators took advantage of every opportunity to get a run or two.

The St. Louis Browns had to go 13 innings to gain a 5 to 4 victory over Detroit after the Tigers had scored twice in the ninth to tie the score. Ted Glavin, rookie outfielder from the Osk mountains, drove in the winning run with his third hit of the game.

Referee Injured Seriously by Kick of Angry Matman

ASTORIA, Ore., April 23, (A.P.)—L. V. Harrington, referee of wrestling matches here, was in a local hospital today suffering from two broken ribs, one of which physicians said may have injured his lungs. His condition, resulting from a kick said by ringersiders to have been deliberately aimed at him by Bob Kruse, who defeated August Sepp in the main event of the mat card here last night, was described as serious.

Second Injury in Week

Harrington entered the ring last night only after considerable persuasion on the part of the promoters. His right hand was in bandages as the result of a wound inflicted when Harry Demetral hit him during the course of a main event grappling match a week ago.

Ringsiders declared Kruse took offense at some action by Harrington early in last night's match. They said he kicked the referee with considerable force. Harrington continued in the ring until the end of the match, however, when he dropped through the ropes unconscious.

Kruse, a local bone crusher, won the first fall then lost the next two to Kruse, a Portland heavyweight.

COLORED BOY HITS CANVAS IN ROUND ONE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23, (A.P.)—Primo Carnera, the mountain from sunny Italy, today was the possessor of a record of 16 knockouts in the same number of fights in this country.

His most recent victim, Sam Baker, Los Angeles negro who divides his time between the prize ring and the silver screen, hit the canvas for the sixth and last time after slightly more than two minutes of milling in the first round at the Coliseum here last night. Baker, who probably ranks second only to the ponderous Italian in size among followers of the fight industry, went down for the first time shortly after the initial bell. From that time he was on his feet for only a few seconds at a time.

Right Did Business

Carnera's crushing right put the negro down for the last time. The Italian used his right to good advantage throughout the fight. Carnera weighed 273½ pounds Baker 245.

In the preliminaries, Jimmy Dolan Portland, knocked out Brownie Buskirk of Boise in the third of their scheduled six-rounds. Mickey Dolan won a hectic six-round affair from Frankie Monroe.
