## Vandals Disturb Veterans' Graves At Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 24. (AP)—Josephine county authorities today continued an investigation in the desecrating of tombs of war veterans in Sloan cemetery, oldest burying place in Josephine county.

With apparent spite against the graves of war veterans, the vandals within the last few nights have wrecked practically all tombstones in the cemetery. Two graves, which hold the remains of persons who died more than 100 years ago, were trampled and the shrubbery was torn.

**A. E. F. Graves Wrecked**  
Three graves holding the remains of American soldiers attached to expeditionary forces in France are reported to have been wrecked, the remains mutilated and the cement broken with heavy instruments.

A substantial reward has been offered by a patriotic organization for the capture of the thief or information leading to the arrest of the vandals.

## Orange Schedule Filled for Week

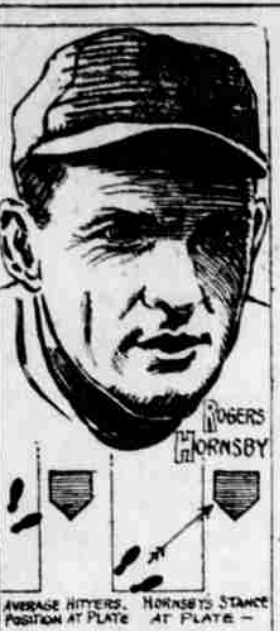
OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 24. (AP)—State athletes are facing a full schedule this week end. The freshman tracksters will start things rolling when they meet Albany college in the first match of the season here Thursday afternoon.

On Friday the Orange varsity track team meets University of Oregon at Eugene in a dual relay meet while the varsity baseball teams of both institutions open the conference season at Corvallis. On Saturday afternoon the baseball teams go into action again at Eugene while the Orange freshman baseball team meets Salem high at Corvallis.

The varsity golf team takes on Oregon in the opening match of the season at Corvallis country club and the varsity tennis team also opens the conference season with University of Oregon at Eugene.

## Rogers' Heel May Affect His Batting

The condition of Hornsby's heel is no little source of worry to Cub fans and baseball followers in general. Hornsby's presence in the line-up is necessary if the Cubs repeat this year.

Unless the heel heals properly it may prematurely retire the greatest right-hand hitter the game has ever had. That the "Rajah" is a great hitter can never be denied.

It is possible for a mediocre hitter to bat .300 and absolutely impossible for any player to negotiate the coveted .400 mark assuming he plays a representative number of games a season.

In a five-year period, 1921-25, Rogers had a grand average of .4023. Ty Cobb, hitting left-handed, had a grand batting average of .4027 in four successive seasons, 1910 to 1913, inclusive.

Jesse Burkett, who batted left-handed, is the only other slugger who hit .400 or better during three successive seasons. Of these three Hornsby is the only one now playing and he is still far from being at the end of his career barring of course injuries. Here's hoping his heel injury doesn't affect his batting or playing.

## PHILLIES AND ROBINS STAGE BATTLING SHOW

**Teams Ineffective At First Hit Stride In First Meeting**

Between them, the Brooklyn Robins and Philadelphia Phillies have about the greatest array of sheer slugging talent any pair of teams in the two major leagues can produce, but they haven't displayed it to a very good advantage through the first games. Their blows were rather weak and ineffective until they got together yesterday and then there were more than plenty.

**Homer First Inning**  
It all started when Fresco Thompson, Phillie leadoff man, stepped up to the plate in the first inning and drove the ball into the stands for a home run. It didn't end until the ninth inning when Spotts, the third Phillie catcher to appear, took advantage of an error by Flowers to romp home from third with the run that gave Philadelphia a 15 to 15 victory. In between there came 38 hits, 21 of them going to the Phillies, a parade of pitchers and pinch hitters and one big scoring rally after another. Starting with Jim Faulkner and ending with Bill Clark, the Robins used six hurlers while the Phillies called on four. In all 35 players took part in the game. Southern and Thevenon of Philadelphia and Frederick and Flowers of Brooklyn took the leading slugging roles, yielding only to Chuck Klein's third homer of the season.

**Snow Sweeps Field**  
The Brooklyn-Philadelphia was the only major league game in the east which suffered from wintry rigors of the weather. One western contest in each league reached its end while Pittsburgh tried to hold its home opening against Cincinnati but gave it up in the third inning when a snowstorm swept over the field.

**Cubs Regain Standing**  
The Chicago Cubs, champions of the National league last season, got back above the .500 mark by beating out the St. Louis Cardinals, 6 to 5, in the other National league game. The Cubs got five runs in the third inning only to have the Cards get them all back again before the ninth with his third homer of the game to bring Hack Wilson from third with the winning run. Charley, winning his first game of the year in three starts, outlasted a trio of Cardinal pitchers.

**Browns Increase Average**  
The St. Louis Browns were the only American leaguers to increase their average, defeating the Detroit Tigers for the second time in succession, 5 to 1. Dick Coffman was rather stingy with hits although generous with walks but the two Tiger hurlers, Herring and Samuels, gave freely of both at the times that counted. Schultz led the Browns with three hits in as many times at bat and was on the scoring end of a double steal.

The first test match, which probably will have Jake Schaefer, the world's 18.2 ballline champion, as a participant, is expected to be played before the close of the present season says Wm. A. Barron, manager of the Klamath Recreation.

**The Nut Cracker**

Today I will take up ethics on the fairways, which is the region on a golf course frequented by some golfers. If you should ever find yourself on the fairway and not know what to do, here are some general instructions:

1—Be sure to replace all divots. A cow might stray onto the course, fall into one of those holes and break a leg, sending up the price of honey.

2—A set of revolving mirrors helps you to keep track of your ball. These are great helps in case of foul tips.

3—Always frame up a good lie for yourself if you must tell one.

## Billiards Inside Glass Enclosure Late Innovation

Billiard matches played in glass "cages" may be seen soon. This innovation in billiards is expected to settle the troubles of billiardists in that it will do away with the disturbing air currents and uneven temperatures which in the past have been the bane of temperamental performers.

**Warmth Essential**  
The danger of "chilling the ivory" is very great when games are played in large auditoriums which do not have ventilating facilities needed for billiards. In order to make conditions ideal for the players it is necessary to have the billiard amphitheatre at a temperature so hot as to be uncomfortable for the spectators. A few experiments have been made under the direction of the National Billiard association and the tests showed that the glass enclosure is certain to help players and spectators.

The enclosure will be 25 feet long, 20 feet wide and 10 feet high, with ventilators at the top. In order not to destroy an important part of any billiard game the clicking of the ivory, loud speakers will be used for they must be installed if the referee's "one for Mr. Schaefer, the balls are in balk, out of balk, in anchor, etc." is to be heard.

**Ivory Very Sensitive**  
Ivory is very sensitive to changes in temperature. If the ivory is cold, it contracts and loses much of its resiliency. In the past electric heaters have been placed beneath the tables in order to take the chill out of the slate. Now virtually a perfect temperature can be maintained, the drafts eliminated and the complaints of the players ended. New record runs and averages should be the result.
