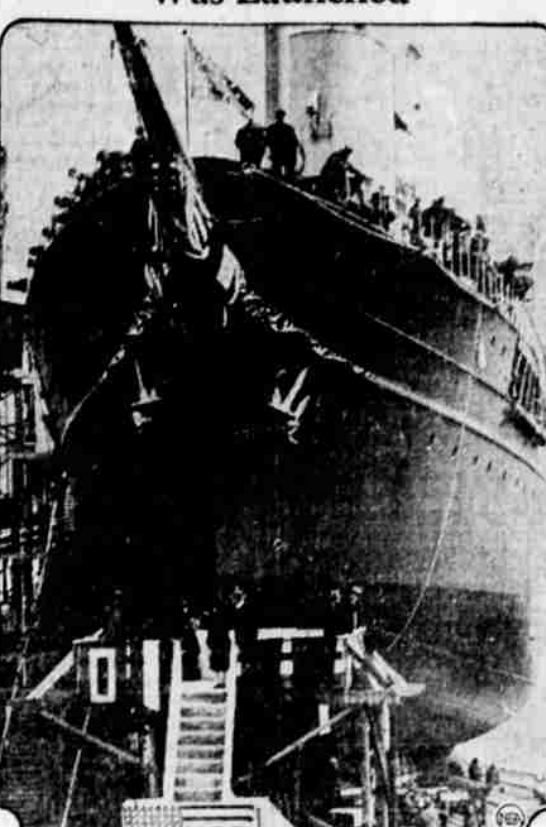

The largest pleasure craft in the world, the \$2,000,000 yacht Corsair owned by J. Pierpont Morgan, is pictured above during the launching ceremonies at Bath, Me. On the gaily decorated launching stage, shown in the foreground, were members of the famous Morgan family, including the pioneer financier himself and a daughter, Mrs. George Nichols, who broke a bottle of champagne across the knife-like prow of the huge vessel. The yacht has a displacement of 2112 tons and an over-all length of 344 feet.

Garageman Faces Disorderly Count

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24, (AP)—Jack Haley, 37, co-owner of a Portland garage, was in jail today facing a disorderly conduct charge in connection with his alleged forced entry into a charity home where armed with a rifle he cowed the attendants into submission when they were alleged to have refused him permission to see his daughter who had just given birth to a baby girl. Haley told authorities that he and the girl's mother separated in 1924 and that care of the daughter had been left to him. He said that although his daughter was unmarried, he would take her and the baby to his home and care for them. He told authorities he had been refused entry to the home.

British Captain Commits Suicide

PORTSMOUTH, England, April 24, (AP)—Shortly before the British cruiser Champion was to have gone out on firing practice today her commanding officer, Captain Richard Martin Welby, was found hanged—dead in the bathroom of his cabin. It was understood farewell letters were left by Captain Welby, who was between 45 and 50 and had been promoted to the rank of captain in December, 1928. He was appointed to the Champion last October. The contents of the letters were withheld by the authorities.

Star Witness in King Trial Fired Upon Four Times

EUREKA, Cal., April 24, (AP)—Authorities were on the lookout for persons who allegedly fired four shots at William Martell, star witness for the state against Clarence King, who faced arraignment today for the murder of Minnie McCoy. Martell, a service station operator told police that he had been called to Beatrice, 20 miles south of here, last night on a fake call for a tow car, and that while answering the call he was fired upon.

Salesman Target Also

Shortly after the alleged attack upon Martell a San Francisco salesman, James Weld, who was driving a car of the same color as Martell's private machine, reported that a bullet had been fired through his windshield 20 miles north of the place where the service station operator was said to have been attacked. Neither Martell nor Weld was hurt.

Eggs, poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes to wool, nuts, hay, cucumbers and hops steady and unchanged. Butter failed to sustain its top-heavy position with the result that a price reduction on it was made in three grades at the Portland Produce Exchange Thursday. This brought extras down to 35c, standards to 37c and prime firsts to 36. Firsts remained at 34.

Butter fat also suffered a reduction, the price delivered Portland being cut to 37c. Egg values were unchanged. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture says:

"Trading was slower on the whole than fruit and vegetable market, probably due to prevalent cool rainy weather. Strawberries, asparagus, and cabbage were in slow demand. Asparagus and cabbage were weaker. Lettuce is firm at California shipping points, but track supplies at Portland are excessive, and the market is barely steady. Celery and tomatoes are in light supply, and the market is firm."

"Onions are very dull, and are barely steady. Many potato dealers anticipate advances soon, in view of prevalent light shipments, and apparent cleaning up of farmers' storage stocks at all northern shipping districts. A few carloads of spinach will be available for shipment from nearby acreage, within the next few days."
