DAMP WEATHER HOLDING BACK MAJOR LEAGUES

Only Two Games Played Thursday; Few Fans Pay Admission

The present chills and dampness of spring appear to be holding up trouble for major league baseball teams almost as fast as they are piling up double headers. Only one club so far has played all its games, the Chicago Cubs gaining this honor, while the St. Louis Cardinals and Detroit Tigers have escaped serious consequences with but one postponement apiece.

Two Games Yesterday

More cold weather yesterday caused the postponement of all but two major league games and neither of these proved very profitable to the club owners. Only about 1,000 St. Louis fans turned out to see the Browns defeat Detroit, 12 to 4, while about three times that number appeared at the Cubs park in Chicago to see the St. Louis Cardinals down the National League champions, 3 to 2.

St. Louis Winner

Although St. Louis gained all the glory in the two games that did survive yesterday, the teams owe it to a select few players. George Fisher, slugging young outfielder, played the leading role as the Cardinals downed the Cubs, scoring one run and driving in four with a single, two doubles and a sacrifice in four trips to the plate. "Chick" Hoyer followed the example of Fisher set in the previous inning when he tripped with the bases loaded to bring in three of the five runs St. Louis scored in that inning. Sylvester Johnson hurled the entire game for the Cards.

Fred Schulte and Chad Kimsey divided the honors in the Browns' triumph over Detroit. Schulte did most of the heavy hitting while Kimsey stepped in as a relief pitcher when Herman Holshouser began to wobble and shutout the Tigers without a hit for four innings.

Wild, Careless Throws Useless

Wild, useless throws are usually the biggest single factor that enters into the losing and winning of amateur games. And nine out of ten times the wild throws, even if they had been perfect throws, would not have caught the runners.

My advice to boys and amateur players is when in doubt—hold the ball. If you see you have a chance to retire a runner, don't just throw in the general direction of the baseman. Throw on a line and keep the ball low.

Boys have a tendency to throw the ball high and over the heads of other players.

"When you start throwing the ball around it gets hot," says Babe Ruth, "and the best thing to do is put it in your hip pocket and let it cool off."

Babe's advice is sound. When in doubt and excited, hold the ball and let it "cool off." Never throw unless you have a definite reason for doing so.

Howard Ehmke Has Message of Reassurance for Baseball Minded Youth of Present Age

NEW YORK, April 25, (AP)—Howard Ehmke, the lanky blonde veteran with the slow smile and the slower curve that confounded experts and Chicago Cubs alike in the last world's series, has a reassuring message for baseball-minded youth.

Not only are better young ball players coming into the big leagues all the time but the caliber of the youths has improved steadily since Howard first wandered out to a big league pitching mound in Detroit fourteen years ago. Furthermore opportunity and financial rewards for youngsters never were greater than today.

Then Ehmke bent over as though he had a golf club in his hands. He still looked like Ehmke, the pitcher.

Plays Fair Golf

"It's the same principle in golf," he explained. "I play a fair game but when I swing back—like this—as I swing, I lose my rhythm and slice. I've moved the wrong part of the body. It affects my control of the golf ball just as twisting the foot affects the pitch."

"Youngsters should pick out four good pitchers and study their styles instead of trying to copy something from every thrower they see. I advise the new pitchers to study Herb Pennock of the Yanks, Ted Lyons of the White Sox, George Leno of the Tigers, and Sam Jones of Washington. I believe they have the best styles."

Easy-Going Kids Best

"Nonchalant, easy-going kids make the best pitchers because they are cool under fire. They must have experience—sitting on the bench does no good. And finally they must field the position. If a poor fielding pitcher misses fifteen out of thirty balls hit to him, half will drive in runs and maybe four will win ball games. Those four games can turn an ordinary pitcher, winning 15 and losing 15, into a great pitcher, winning 19 and losing 11."

Ehmke likes the youngsters. He is coaching Connie Mack's rookies this spring. By the middle of May, when the sun comes out, he hopes to be in there winning ball games. He wants to be ready for the opening game of the next world's series.

CIRCUIT CLOUT HAS STAGE AT FRISCO FIELD

Seals and Oaks Knock Ten Home Runs In Ragged Game

Although outthrew 12 to 8, the Sacramentans made better use of their safeties and piled up eight runs to five made by the Angels. Ed Bryan was the winning pitcher.

The Mission Reds buried the Portland club under an 11 to 7 score. George Castor, young right hander of the Missions, was given plenty of support at the plate, the Reds finding four Portland hurriers for thirteen safe hits.

Four errors by the Ducks hurt their chances of winning. Cronin, third baseman, committed a pair of misplays that in each case cost runs.

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KLAMATH CUBS DEFEAT NORMAL

Trim Ashland Nine By a Narrow Margin

The Klamath Falls Cubs yesterday defeated the Ashland Normal school nine in an 11-inning game in the valley city, 8 to 7. The two teams will clash again today at the fairgrounds field at 4 p. m.

The normal school defeated the Columbia university nine 5 to 4 after the college boys won Sunday 9 to 7 here from the Pelicans.

In the first inning yesterday the Cubs made two runs to three for the Normal boys. There were no further scores until the sixth when the Cubs went wild, playing in the rain with a wet ball, and allowed three hits, three runs and made three overthrows.

Abe Alexander, who was hurrying for the Cubs, was taken from the game and Jack Edwards was sent in. He walked one and hit one before he warmed up. A play at second and an overthrow allowed two more, making the total of 7 for the normal school.

In a ninth-inning rally for the Cubs, Edwards hit safely and the next three men up hit singles. Robinson came to bat and clouted out a two-bagger, clearing the bases and tying the score by making home on an overthrow and an error.

In the first half of the 11th the Cubs scored one and then retired the Ashland men in order.

Alexander allowed five hits, struck out four and hit one in six innings. Edwards was credited with no hits, six strikeouts and one hit in five innings.

The game will open at the fairgrounds here today at 4 p. m.
