PIRATES PULL SURPRISE WITH NEW RECRUITS

With Leading Sluggers Out They Work Way To Second Place

At the start of the baseball season, Pittsburgh's prospects were considered doubtful. The Pirates had to start without the services of Lloyd Waner and Pie Traynor, their leading sluggers last year, and with a rookie, Gus Shier, on first base. And they had traded Burleigh Grimes, their most effective pitcher, to Boston.

Six Out of Seven

But the Pirates have removed a large part of that uncertainty in seven games. With a group of doubtful players coming through in remarkable style, they have won six games and lost but one and stand second only to the unbeaten New York Giants in the National League standings.

Subb, the rookie, the elder Waner, Adam Comorosky and Rollie Hemingway all are hitting at a .400 clip and stand among the league leaders while Remy Kremer, Larry French and Ervin Brame have been doing a great job of carrying the pitching burden. Yesterday they had to get along without George Grantham as well as the other missing members in their delayed home opener, but kept right on clouting to beat the St. Louis Cardinals 6 to 1.

Giants Frozen Out

The Giants again were frozen out yesterday, this time at Philadelphia, and the Chicago Cubs, the nearest active threat to Pirate supremacy, had to go twelve innings to beat the Cincinnati Reds 6 to 5. Pat Malone's pitching and Hack Wilson's hitting were the features of this clash.

In the third National League game, which opened the season at Boston the Brooklyn Robins displayed some of their heavy hitting behind the three pit pitching of Dazy Vance and defeated the Braves, 5 to 1.

Babe's First Homer

"Babe" Ruth's first home run of the year and two extra inning games were the leading features of the American league program. The "Babe" connected for his first four bagger in the seventh inning of the Yankees' clash with the Boston Red Sox to give them a lead.

They finally won out, 3 to 2, in the tenth inning after Henry Johnson and Milton Gaston of Boston had staged a great mound duel.

The Cleveland Indians had to go the same distance to beat their former teammate, George Uhlen, pitching for Detroit, by a 5 to 4 count. Willie Haidlin likewise pitched well but careless fielding by the Indians gave Detroit an early lead and a three run rally in the sixth barely put them into the running.

Senators Top Americans

Washington's surprising Senators went to the top of the American league, displacing the champion Philadelphia Athletics by a 6 to 4 victory in a nip-and-tuck game. The Athletics took the lead when they staged a four run rally against a rather wild Lloyd Brown in the sixth but Washington came back two innings later to drive old Jack Quinn from the mound with three runs.

Walter Stewart, St. Louis southpaw, held the Chicago White Sox in almost complete submission while the Browns took a 4 to 2 decision. Dave Harris, a rookie from the Portland Pacific coast league who appeared as pinch hitter, produced both the Chicago runs with a homer.

King Adds Thrills To Football Game

LONDON, April 25. (AP)—Before a huge throng and in the presence of King George, London's association football team triumphed over Yorkshire in the cup final at the Wembley stadium today. The score was Arsenal 3, Huddersfield 0.

A crowd estimated at nearly 100,000 attended the game and got an unexpected thrill when King George arrived and joined the spectators. It had previously been announced he would not attend because of doubtful weather prospects but the threatened rain held off and he finally decided to come.

Every golfer is at times off form, either with one club or stroke. Even the rawest beginner will fall at times under his own humble standard and begin to wonder what he is doing wrong. The golfer who is at the very threshold of his career should be very careful in seeking advice. He may grow into a rational golfer or into a miserable, restless style-buster, flying madly after the will-o-the-wisp of every new trick or tip. With him the action of hitting a golf ball is still new. It does not follow that because he hit the ball perfectly last time and did not, the next, that he has fallen into some definable error.

An occasional mistake should be disregarded altogether, and is best dealt with by Jock Hutchison's advice of "aim more carefully." It is wonderful how often it is successful. Under the policy of careful aiming, I made two or three other things. The time honored maxim of "Slow back swing," "Don't press," and "Keep your eye on the ball." They are so valuable for the reason that, unlike some other remedies, they cannot do much harm, even if they do but little good. This is a treatment that is peculiarly applicable to a breakdown of your game that is general rather than particular.

Sacs Lead Today

At this time Buddy Ryan's surprising Sacramento club is leading the Oaks by a half game. Ryan's crew of hitters have won four straight games from the Angels, dropping them for the fourth straight time at Wrigley Field yesterday by a score of 8 to 4.

The Senators found Ed Baecht, Los Angeles pitcher, for six runs in the sixth inning, and Luis Vinc, the fiery southpaw, had little trouble nursing this comfortable margin the rest of the game.

Oaks Lose to Seals

Carl Zamloch's Oaks booted themselves out of first place, losing to the Seals, 11 to 8. Errors of pop flies by Fenton and Verges were responsible for seven runs.

Records Expected To Vanish Today At Drake Meeting

DES MOINES, Ia., April 25. (AP)—With the fastest track provided in five years for the Drake relay carnival, three of America's greatest sprinters sought new laurels in the finals of the 100-yard dash here today.

Claude Bracey, Rice Institute, Cy Leland, Texas Christian, and Eddie Tolan, University of Michigan, were expected to break the world record and endager the world's mark in another "dash of the century." Bracey and Leland yesterday gave evidence of their form when they won their preliminary heats. Each reeled off the distance in 9.8-10 seconds, breaking the tape at least three yards ahead of their nearest competitor and seemingly with no effort.

The Lone Star State sprinters meet today for the fourth time in major competitions this year. Leland had to run the century in world's record time of 9.4-10 seconds a week ago at the Kansas relays to beat Bracey and Tolan. This record, however, will not be submitted to the A. A. U. because of a favoring wind.

The business of mark shattering started yesterday when five were broken and one tied in the preliminary qualifications.

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OREGON STATE CAPTURES SIX RELAY EVENTS

Orangemen Smother Old Rivals In Meet On Oregon Oval

EUGENE, Ore., April 26. (AP)—Oregon State college, smothering Oregon in six out of eight relay events, won the annual meet on Hayward field yesterday. The Orange took five straight events before the Webfoots rallied to win the spring medley.

Despite the coldness and a steady drizzle of rain which started at the two-mile relay, the second event, each race was close but with Oregon State consistently forging ahead they maintained the lead.

Oregon Teams Crippled

Bill Hayward, Oregon coach, offered a patched-up combination in the hurdle race when Harold Kelley was forced from the meet with an injured back. Ed Mosler, Webfoot discus thrower, substituted, but the quartet was too weakened to outdistance the Orangemen.

Webfoots Win Two.

The two medley relays won by Oregon were the closest of the meet. In the spring medley Clair McKennon, who suffered temporary blindness last week and appeared wearing smoked glasses and a visor to win the race for the Webfoots when he pulled up from behind in the 440, the last leg of the event.

The Orange won the four mile relay by the greatest margin of the meet.

CALDWELL, Idaho, April 26. (AP)—Outbursts of scoring by College of Idaho's baseball team proved too much for Eastern Oregon normal here yesterday, the locals winning by a score of 13 to 2. Barney Berlinger Of Pennsylvania Next World Champ

PHILADELPHIA, April 26. (AP)—Barney Berlinger, just 21 and a junior at the University of Pennsylvania, probably will be the next world's champion in all around athletic ability, if he adds middle distance running to his already wide range of accomplishments. The ability to travel 1500 meters, slightly less than a mile, in anything like a respectable time is the 10 per cent needed to make him the greatest of American decathlon performers.

Scores 9 out of 10

For 9 out of the 10 events comprising the gruelling decathlon yesterday, he hit a terrific pace in spite of cold weather at Franklin field. Over 90 per cent of the eight-hour track and field test, he was just about supreme. He won five of the first nine events. He high jumped over 6 feet, pole vaulted 12 feet, 6 inches, and heaved the shot 46 feet. He can do even better in these events, besides toss the javelin, discus and skin the hurdles with considerable flourish.

Couldn't Run Mile

But along came the 1500 meters and Barney's poor finish. Lead was in his feet and he barely staggered the distance. As it was he had enough to spare to beat his own carnival decathlon record and set up a new standard of 7460.608 points. By collecting only 244 points in the last event, by contract with an average of 800 points for all previous events, he fell far short of Ken Doherty's American mark of 7784.63 points.
