

STOCKMEN LAY MEETING PLANS

D. E. Alexander Elected President Of Southern Oregon Association

D. E. Alexander, owner of the famous Rock Creek ranch, was elected president of the Southern Oregon Livestockmen's association at a meeting Saturday at the chamber of commerce. He succeeded C. V. Loosley, Fort Klamath.

C. E. Drew was re-elected as vice-president of the association and other directors are W. R. Campbell, M. J. Fred Stuckel, Merrill, and C. V. Loosley, Fort Klamath.

Lytle Speaks
Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, spoke on anthrax control and vaccination and outlined measures and the general process of control of the disease. He states that the disease is not so serious as it is generally supposed.

The anti-theft law for beef was discussed by the members and a committee consisting of C. E. Drew, C. V. Loosley and C. A. Henderson was appointed to study the law. The committee will meet with enforcement officers and others interested and with farmers, and will recommend changes at the next legislature.

Plan for Convention
The coming convention of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association was discussed and the sentiment was that the meeting here May 23 and 24 will be a "red letter" affair for the stockmen and horsemen of the state. W. C. Dalton, D. O. "Buck" Williams and C. A. Henderson were appointed as a local committee to assist with plans for the meeting and to care for arrangements locally.

Duby to Visit
Judge William Duby, Baker, secretary of the state association,

will arrive in Klamath Falls Monday to make arrangements for the state association and will be given all assistance by the local committee.

The members of the state association are planning on starting a caravan in Walla Walla county with stockmen in the cities joining it as it travels southward to Klamath. The first night, May 21, will be spent in Prineville and the caravan will reach Fort Klamath on May 23 at noon, where they will be given a barbecue luncheon. They will then tour the Wood River valley, which is admittedly one of the best stock-raising sections in the west, and will arrive in Klamath Falls the evening of the 22nd. The convention will open the morning of the 23rd.

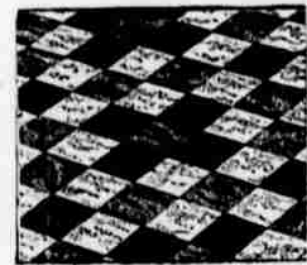

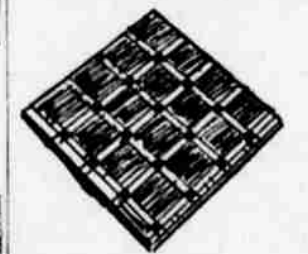

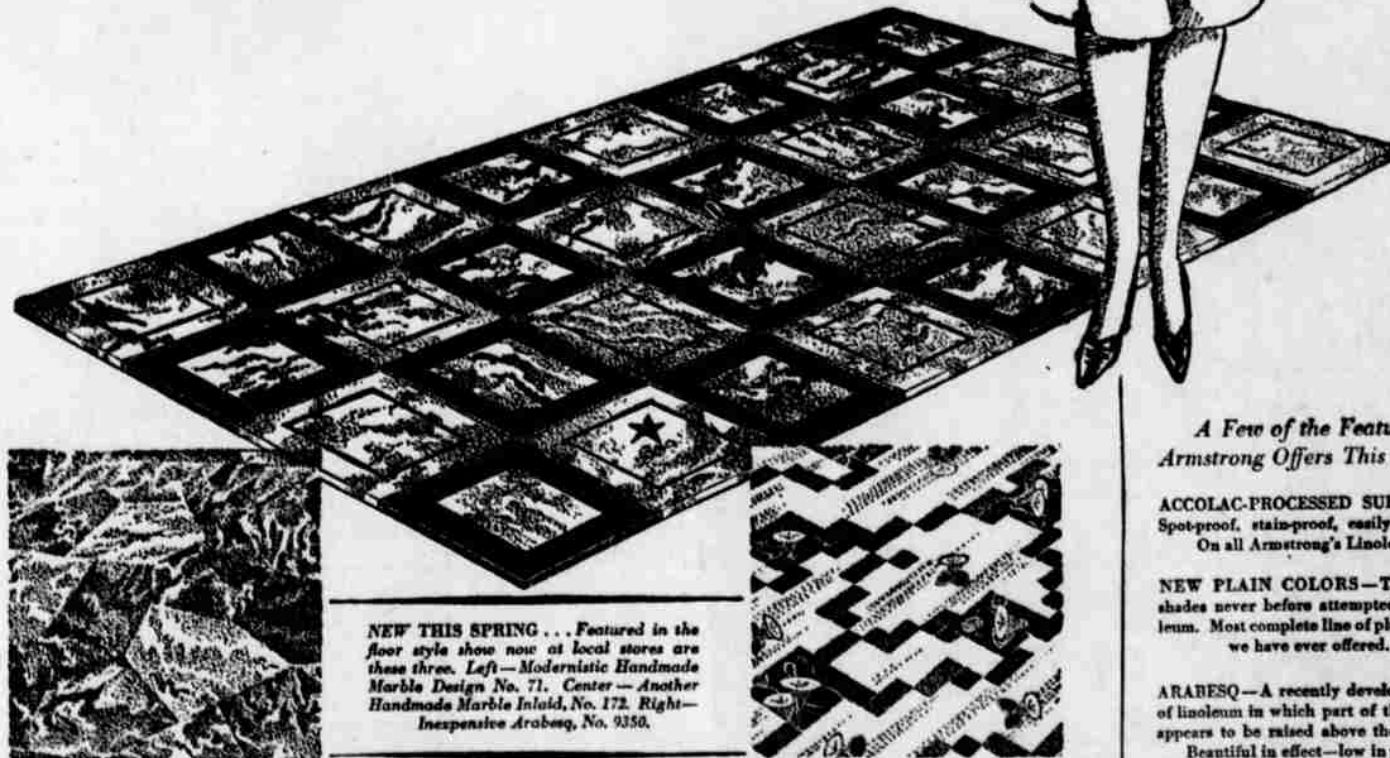
