Huston Not Ready To Resign Job as Leader of Party

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—Cladius Huston, chairman of the republican national committee, informed party leaders at conferences here over the week end he would not consider resigning his post under the fire of the senate lobby committee. Party leaders confer. A group of the republican chieftains including Joseph R. Nutt, party treasurer; Secretary Hyde, Postmaster General Brown, Senator Watson of Indiana, the senate leader; Charles D. Hiles, New York national committeeman; David Mulvane, Kansas national committeeman, and Jeremiah Milbank, of New Jersey, talked with Huston.

The party's situation as it relates to Huston was reported by some of those at the sessions to have been "frankly discussed." Some division of opinion as to the course which should be followed is understood to have been revealed. The republican chairman left no doubt he would remain at his post.

WILL EXTEND BUS SCHEDULE

Pass Klamath Ave. Light Ordinance; Would Pass Law Against Dogs

The temporary bus schedule offered by William Thompson, who holds the city bus franchise, and already has two buses in operation, was accepted by the city council at the meeting held last night.

A recommendation that the service be extended to the Hot Springs addition was in turn accepted by Mr. Thompson, who stated that the extension of the service will mean additional equipment which will probably be purchased soon.

Response Determines Lines. Other additional buses will be determined by the manner in which the public responds to the service and by the city traffic problem. It was stated that the bus starts at Bunnell's auto camp store on South Sixth street and continues on Sixth street until it reaches the intersection of East Main and Main, thence down Main street to Third.

The route then starts from Third and Main and traverses the same identical route, only extends out further to Altamont.

Hours Given. The Bunnell route is covered each 20 minutes and the Altamont route every hour. On week days the bus is in operation from 6:15 a. m. until 10 p. m. with the exception of Saturday when it ends at midnight. On Sunday the service starts at 8:15 a. m. and quits at 10 p. m.

Mr. Thompson also asked the return of the \$1,000 bond which he gave the city as a security, stating that, "we want to spend the money right here in Klamath Falls."

Mark Loading Zones

The loading zones have been marked off and will be painted with no parking signs. These zones, it was pointed out, are for the use of any loading and unloading purposes and may be used by taxi companies to let off and pick up passengers, but not for parking purposes.

The matter of the difficult parking problem on the narrow streets has been solved by allowing only one way parking. Eighth, Ninth, Tenth and Eleventh streets were marked for this purpose on Saturday night, but failed to impress motorists for many cars were parked on the wrong sides of the streets.

This ordinance will be strictly enforced in the future and since the streets have been plainly marked for this purpose, the safety of motorists, no excuse can be given for any error in parking on these streets, the mayor pointed out.

Strict adherence to these rules is essential for the safety of motorists and any violation will be punishable by fine or imprisonment.

Limit Parking

These streets have been marked along the right-hand side going away from Main street. This will relieve the congestion which has always been so noticeable on these streets, the mayor stated, and especially on Sunday when so many attending the churches located in this part of town park cars on both sides of the streets.

The ordinance which will be solved in the near future and which will prevent any confusing the "stop" and "slow" signs located at intersections and near schools, is the painting of the signs. Slow signs will be painted in a bright red with the raised letters in white, so that they will be noticeable at night, while the others will be painted orange.

Introduce Dog Law. An ordinance making it unlawful for dogs to run at large in the city of Klamath Falls, whether licensed or unlicensed, was read for the first time and passed to second reading.

This ordinance declares that dogs running about the city must either be muzzled or led by a chain. Officers will be allowed to shoot dogs, if necessary. All barking, biting and yelling dogs, on recommendation of three of the neighbors, must either be gotten rid of or taken out of the city limits. It is necessary for three to sign the complaint.

For Strict Enforcement

A. W. Schupp, city attorney, recommended that the city ordinance dealing with dogs also be strictly enforced.

From 10 to 12 dogs are killed and taken out of the city limits each week and 8 alone were killed last Saturday, it was pointed out.

Sixteen building permits amounting to \$19,370 issued by the building inspector were accepted. A resolution authorizing the mayor to vote for the city at irrigation elections was passed by the councilmen at a suggestion of Mayor Walters.
