## BALL PLAYERS ARE GROUP OF OPPORTUNISTS

### Seize Upon First Show Of Pitcher's Slack To Grab Game

The idea of having one big inning to be coming more and more into favor in the major leagues, either by accident or intent. The signers of the big leagues, now finding their batting eyes rapidly, after a rather slow start, are becoming a group of opportunists, pouncing out enough runs to gain the victory at the moment the opposing pitcher weakens.

The seven big league games played yesterday gave just one set of illustrations of this fact out of the many that have turned up lately. The Cincinnati Reds and St. Louis Cardinals had no chance to hit due to wet grounds.

Play Towen Lot Hall

The Indians and the Giants carried the idea to its limit, as Brooklyn was for the second time in a row by a score of 19 to 15. Brooklyn scored eleven runs off four giant pitchers in the second frame, only to have the Manhattan warriors come back with a nine-run third frame.

Philadelphia's National league club likewise won an entire game in one inning with the Boston Braves as their victims. After seven scoreless stanzas of a duel between Ray Benge of the Phillies and Bob Smith of Boston, Philadelphia suddenly started hitting in the eighth to score all its runs in an 8 to 3 triumph.

Pirates Stage Hatred

The Pittsburgh Pirates gave the Chicago Cubs seven runs in the first three innings, and got them all back in one to beat the National league champions 13 to 9. The Pirates picked up a few runs first, but it was the seven counters in the sixth that gave them their ninth victory in eleven games, and put them at the top of the National league standing.

Make 2 in a Row

The Washington Senators produced the only big inning in the four American league games, to win their eighth in a row, and make their winning streak the longest either major league has seen this year. They also gave away seven runs in three innings, then tied the score in the third as they pounded Tom Zachary and Roy Shardt from the mound and went on to defeat the New York Yankees 11 to 3. Five Yankee errors contributed to New York's downfall, three of them contributing to the Senator rally.

A's Best Red Sox

The champion Philadelphia Athletics were content to get their runs in pairs, but, led by Al Simmons and Mickey Cochrane, they got four twosomes and a single to beat the Boston Red Sox.

Old Red Faber of the Chicago White Sox brought forth one of the day's good pitching feats, as Chicago downed the Detroit Tigers 5 to 6. Faber went the full nine innings, and although he gave 14 hits, he fanned seven and had the backing of two home runs by Carl Reynolds and one by Bill Cissell.

Sewell's 1,101st Game

Cleveland's 6-10-4 victory over the St. Louis Browns had the 1,101st consecutive appearance of Joe Sewell as its feature, although he had nothing to do with the triumph. Joe was in no shape to play, as he has been running a high temperature for two days, but he has missed but one game since he joined the Indians ten years ago, and wanted to preserve his record. Johnny Hodapp's home run in the third, the first one hit by a Cleveland player this season, was the leading factor in the overthrow of the Browns.

## Second American Golf Expedition Heads for Europe

NEW YORK, April 30, (AP)—The second American golfing expedition of the year leaves for Europe at 4 p. m. (est) today when the Mauretania steams out of New York harbor with the American Walker Cup team aboard.

Bobby Jones captain of the squad, and his seven comrades have timed their voyage so that they can get in about two weeks practice in England before the cup matches against the pick of British amateurs at Sandwich May 15 and 16.

Players accompanying Jones are Harrison R. Johnston, George Von Elm, George Vogt, Dr. O. F. Willis, Don Moore, Roland Mackenzie and Francis Quimot.

Among others in the party are Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Johnston, Mrs. Von Elm, John G. Jackson, general counsel of the United States Golf Association, and Mrs. Jackson; A. L. Lewis, father-in-law of Jess Sweetser former American and British amateur champion; Mr. and Mrs. Thomas B. Payne and O. B. Keeler.

In addition to the team match with England, Jones and most of his mates plan to compete in the British amateur at St. Andrews May 26-27, and the British open at Hoylake, June 16-21.

Also sailing on the Mauretania is Leo Diegel, professional champion, who plans to compete in the British open. Diegel, Horton Smith and Jim Barnes, as a matter of fact, are about the only noted professionals who will compete at Hoylake.
