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Vets Join Forces In Memorial Day Exercise Plans

Memorial day exercises will be held in Klamath Falls on Friday, May 30, at 10 o'clock in the Pelican theater, following services at the Link River bridge and a parade of veterans, it was announced last evening by the committee in charge.

The exercises will be under the joint auspices of the Spanish American War Veterans, American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Plans for the affair were completed at a meeting held last evening.

Paul T. Jackson, principal of the Klamath Union high school, will be the main speaker at the exercises. Several musical numbers will also be given but plans have not been completed for this part of the program.

Short talks will also be given by J. C. Rutenic, commander of the Spanish American War Veterans, Leon F. Crawford, commander of the American Legion and Noble Cantor, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Plan Parade
 As usual, a parade and exercises at the Link River bridge will be held preceding the theater program. Services at the bridge will commence at 9:30 a. m. with an address by one of the local preachers in memoriam of those who lost their lives at sea. Following this flowers will be strewn

on the water by the school children of the city, and a salute of three volleys by a squad from the national guard will be given and the sounding of taps from a bugle.

The parade will form at 9:45 and will march through the streets of the city to the Pelican theater. Music in the parade will be furnished by the De Molay drum corps and the combined Elks and Shriners drum corps. There is a possibility that either the high school band of a community band will also take part.

It is being planned to have airplane formation above the crowd. Permission will have to be obtained from the department of commerce to enable the planes to fly low enough to drop wreaths in front of the parade formation. The local pilots have signified their approval and desire to assist in this manner if the permission is obtained.

The merchants will be asked to close their stores on Friday from 10 a. m. until noon, and to provide special decorations in their display windows.

In connection with the Memorial day events an essay contest is being held in the city schools and prizes will be offered for the best essays written on "Memorial day." The first prize will be \$10, second \$5 and third \$2.50.

The general subject is "Memorial day," but essays should cover such points as origin, purpose, history and proper observance. The essays will be limited to 350 words and must be handed in to teachers on or before May 23.

Announcement of the winners will be made at the Memorial day exercises and the winning essay will be read at the time of the theater program.

Clark Withdraws From G.O.P. Ballot

Following information received Tuesday from the secretary of state, County Clerk C. H. De Lap has officially cancelled E. L. Clark's name from the republican ballots for the primary election, May 19.

Mr. Clark announced his withdrawal from the legislative race on Monday, stating that his campaign work will take up his time for the next 18 months.

"I am withdrawing because I will be busy with the census for 18 months or more. It is my duty, I feel, to the census district to stay and finish the work," Mr. Clark stated last night.

"I also feel that the district will be well taken care of with five representative citizens running for the three offices. I feel that the south end of the district is entitled to two representatives and the north end is entitled to one. I say that taking into regard the great growth in Klamath

and Lake counties," Mr. Clark said.
