Chicago White Sox One of Big Surprises of 1930 Baseball

Among the numerous surprises that have cropped up in the early weeks of the major campaign must be listed the showing of the Chicago White Sox. Chicago, like Washington, was listed as a probable second division club and has been right up among the American league leaders.

Drop to Third
The White Sox were shoved into third place yesterday as the Detroit Tigers gathered in four runs in the first inning for a 6 to 4 victory, but they still are among the first ranking teams. With four regulars batting in the .300 class and a flock of pitchers working in good form, the White Sox have earned the present rating of .600, gained from six victories and four defeats.

Bill Cissell, current co-leader of the American league batters, has been the spark plug of the team this season after a few years of rather disappointing performances. He connected with Elton Hogssett, Detroit's big Indian hurler of sinker balls, for three of Chicago's 13 hits yesterday, but the rest of the Sox were not able to keep pace with him and produce the required runs.

Senators Humiliated
Washington, still the leader of the American league, was another high ranking club to meet defeat yesterday. The Senators, after eight successive victories, bowed to the pitching of George Pipgras of the New York Yankees, who shut out 9 to 0. Pipgras, who has pitched in two of three Yankee victories, gave two five hits while Brown and Burke allowed 12 and the Senators contributed four costly errors.

Indians Go Three Straight
Another Brown, Clint of Cleveland, took the leading role as the Indians beat the St. Louis Browns for the third time in succession, 6 to 3. The rookie hurler from New Orleans gave St. Louis but six hits for his third victory of the season. He now leads the American league pitchers.

Milton Gaston of the Boston Red Sox, turned in the fourth fine pitching performance in the American league yesterday to beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 7 to 3. Gaston gave the world's champions only six hits, fanned six and allowed no walks. Sim-

TUFFY BACK ON LIST OF HEAVY WEIGHT STARS

Decisions Boston Sailor To Regain Standing As Contender

CHICAGO, May 1, (AP)—Tuffy Griffiths, of Sioux City, Ia., today was back on the list of contenders for the world heavyweight boxing championship, the stain of a technical knockout defeat by Jack Gagnon removed from his record by a 10-round decision victory over the Boston sailor last night.

Big Crowd Present
Before 20,550 spectators, most of whom went to the Chicago stadium hoping to learn that Gagnon's stunning victory over Griffiths at Philadelphia early last month was a mistake, the tough one outboxed Gagnon most of the way. The right hand that sent Griffiths crashing to the canvas in Philadelphia did little damage although Gagnon kept it busy all evening. It landed on Tuffy's chin in the eighth round but Gagnon couldn't get his man lined up for another shot. Griffiths' long left was in great working order and it kept Gagnon off balance. The sailor never stopped trying and the right was swishing over Griffiths' head or landing high just as busily at the bell as at the start.

Gagnon failed in his effort to convince that he is among the best in his division, but the job was anything but a financial failure for him. The fight drew

a gate of \$78,684, with Gagnon receiving 30 per cent.
Griffiths' triumph probably will lead to a great "natural" for the stadium next month—a Griffiths-Otto Von Porat bout. Von Porat had agreed to meet the winner and Griffiths is expected to sign up soon.
The 10-round semi-final to last night's attraction resulted in a decision for Joey Medill, Chicago lightweight, over Stanislaus Lonyza, game little Chilean puncher.
