Klamath Listed Among High Schools Accredited in State

The Oregon commission of the northwest association of secondary and higher schools has just received from the secretary of the association the final report giving the list of high schools of the northwest accredited by the association at the recent meeting in Spokane. There were 227 applications from high schools which were fully approved. Fourteen high schools were required to raise their standards in some particular before being placed on the accredited list. These will probably be able to meet the requirements by the time of the next annual meeting.

Of the fully accredited high schools, Oregon has 54, Washington 81, Montana 37, Idaho 25, Utah 14, Nevada 3, and Alaska 3. The northwest association is affiliated with the north central association and other similar organizations of the United States. Superintendent George W. Hug of Salem is president of the association. The members of the Oregon commission on accrediting are: Supt. J. T. Longfellow, La Grande; Supt. James M. Burges, state department of education, Salem; and E. F. Carleton, executive secretary, Oregon State Teachers' association, chairman.

Oregon Guardsmen Eligible at C. M. T. C. at Vancouver

VANCOUVER BARRACKS Wash., May 1.—Information of importance to prospective applicants for the Citizens' Military Training Camp who are members of the Oregon National Guard is contained in memorandum No. 15, released April 22nd by Major General George White, commanding the latter organization.

Under the provisions of this memorandum, eligible Guardsmen who are accepted for C. M. T. C. may be excused from the National Guard field training camp upon approval of their commanding officers, on June 21, 1930. Members so relieved will draw their National Guard pay for the period spent at camp with their units, and transportation to Portland. They will be eligible for C. M. T. C. mileage to and from their homes.

General Paul A. Wolfe, U. S. A., commanding at Vancouver Barracks, has agreed that such eligible Guardsmen will be accepted at the Citizens' Training Camp up to 6:00 p. m. of June 22, 1930.

Crew Taken From Japanese Vessel

TOKYO, May 1, (AP)—A boat of the Imperial Life Saving service, partially manned by fishermen, effected the rescue of the 39 members of the crew of the Luzon Maru, Japanese freighter, which ran aground yesterday on the rocks near Cape Inuro, Ibaraki Prefecture. None of the Luzon Maru's crew was injured, but they were suffering from exhaustion. The grounded steamer broke into three parts.
