E. W. Vannice is owner of the Golden Rule store here.

M. S. West is connected with the Big Basin Lumber company of this city.

FOREST FIRES RAGE IN EAST

Approximately 20,000 Acres in Wisconsin Damaged by Blaze Which Even Rains Failed To Halt

MILWAUKEE, May 1. (AP)—More than 250 men today fought fires burning over approximately 20,000 acres of Wisconsin's forests. A heavy smoke hung over the entire Chequamegon Bay region as fighters backfired in attempts to save threatened farm dwellings.

Near Hebburn, Wis., 125 men worked to extinguish a blaze spreading northward toward Lake Superior over thousands of acres of forest. Approximately 4,000 acres have already been burned. A slight drizzle yesterday failed to hinder the progress of the fire. Much of the burned territory included valuable blue berry tracts.

Seven miles west of Washburn, Wis., more than 15,000 acres of the new Mequah national forest burned as a force of 100 men sought to bring the fire under control.

Three separate fires burned in Forest county near Wabeno, Wis., and a series of small fires kept fighters busy in Chippewa and Rusk counties.

Federal Farm Loan Appraiser Expected

Word has been received by Mrs. L. R. Hague, secretary-treasurer of the Klamath Falls National Farm Loan association, to the effect that the federal appraiser will be in Klamath county in the near future for the purpose of checking over the condition of loans, and also appraising securities offered under new applications for loans.

The local loan committee, consisting of A. R. Campbell, Roy W. Nelson, Bruce Gaddis, and Will Blackman, recently made tours over the valley regarding these securities.

The officers of the association are: Charles E. Drew, president; D. Ellis Young, vice-president; U. E. Reeder, A. L. Marshall, and H. E. McClay, directors. Mrs. Hague reports that the association is in good condition with the exception of two loans, upon which taxes and amortization payments have become delinquent. During the 13 years of its existence this association has had but one foreclosure, that being on a loan of only \$500, although that period approximately \$450,000 have been loaned to the farmers of Klamath county through this association.

Lakeview Stage Fare Reduced

Starting today, May 1, the Red Bull Stage Line will reduce the fares to and from Lakeview. The one-way trip price will be \$5 instead of \$6. For round-trip \$9, a reduction of \$2 over the former rate, will be charged. It was stated last evening by local officials of the stage line.

Two stages run daily between here and Lakeview, operated by this company, leaving Klamath Falls at 8:30 a. m. and 2 p. m., and making the trip in three and one-half hours.

Duchess Returns From Air Journey

LONDON, May 1. (AP)—The Duchess of Bedford, 64 year old aviation enthusiast, today completed a round trip to Cape Town and landed at Croydon airport this evening. The duchess, accompanied by two pilots, left Sofia, Bulgaria, where she had been forced to make a landing yesterday because of a broken oil line, this morning. She left England for the South African city April 10, and hoped to make the round trip in 19 days, but was forced to take 25 days by the breaking of the oil line.

As an orphan slave, who becomes the mascot of a minstrel show through her efforts to save its singing star from a headlong flight to oblivion through drink and a love that is wrong, Miss Twelvetrees has a role that demands a trying combination of spirit, wistful appeal, repression and subtle comedy. She is said to acquire herself excellently.

Current Book Reviews

Debonair, by G. B. Stern
Published by Alfred A. Knopf, New York

The modern young girl will surely want to read this book which champions the youth of today, and possibly those most pessimistic about our young people will want to read it to find out what it is about youth that someone has found to be worth championing.

The central figure of the novel is a modern young girl, Loveday by name, who is the only child and greatly humored daughter of Mrs. Trevelyan, a widow. The story opens with Loveday's return (supposedly from school) to her mother for the vacation.

The truth of the matter is that Loveday craving excitement, has left school, throwing off its protection to experiment with life in a world made up of men bent on pleasure, and girls ready to give pleasure, a world in which Loveday's only protection is her sophistication strangely mixed with naivete.

Her own words best describe

her attitude. "I'm a parasite, but I'm worth it! I'm amusing. Don't you think it's as good a job as any other? If one's amusing and not unrepresentable Men can look and listen—I don't care to be touched. An unscrupulous pirate needn't be."

Loveday's advice to other girls is not to be sentimental and not to care for anyone too much. She lives according to her own philosophy until she meets Charles Elvaston with whom she falls in love. Elvaston also loves her, but there are several difficulties which constantly arise to separate them. Just as Loveday despairs of these perplexities and misunderstandings ever being straightened out, she decides to return to her mother and to forget everything. It is the remembering more than the forgetting which make up the rest of the story, and which happily solves the difficulties.

Whether or not Loveday is typical of the modern girl, she demands admiration because of her sincerity, loyalty, and sense of fair play.

April Slumps In Building Permits

Building permits reached a total of \$144,050 for April, 1930, as compared to \$148,741 in 1929 for the same month and \$92,945 for April, 1928.
