

REGISTRATION SURPASSES ALL FORMER YEARS

Oregon Gain Over 1928 Pronounced; Voters Number 398,746

SALEM, Ore., May 1. (AP)—With the closing of the registration books on April 15 and the compilation of reports received by the secretary of state from the county clerks, which was completed Saturday, it is found that the political registration in Oregon not only has surpassed all previous records but is \$1,255 greater than the registration for the primary election of 1928. The total registration for the coming primaries of May 16 is 398,746, while two years ago it was 317,491.

Republican Gain Heaviest
The republican registration of 284,241 is 62,102 ahead of the 222,139 of two years ago, while the democratic gain is 19,591, or 193,295 this year against 83,304 in 1928. The progressive registration this year is only 329, provision of Oregon Provisional Government Day next Saturday. Easter access to the grounds will be provided by a new road, there will be added protection against rain and new camping accommodations.

Few Counties Lose
The figures two years ago were all compiled from records in the secretary of state's office, while this year, with the exception of seven counties, they are taken from reports sent in by the county clerks. For this reason there is some doubt whether the increase is actually as large as indicated. All counties show increases except Baker, Crook, Douglas, Harney, Josephine, Umatilla and Wallowa.

Squatters Given Time Extension

PORTLAND, May 1. (AP)—Federal Judge McNary today allowed extension of time until May 6 for trial of Emory Davis, E. H. Best, J. E. Braham and Edwin Martin, Umpqua national forest squatters, charged with trespassing on a government reserve. Formal charge of trespass was filed against Martin on his appearance in court today with the other three defendants. J. K. Carson, attorney for the four, requested the time extension. Each of his clients has pleaded not guilty.

Klamath Flying Service to Start Glider Club Soon

Plans were made last night for the forming of the Klamath Glider Club to be sponsored by the Klamath Flying Service. Membership is open to 20 persons, either men or women, who are over the age of 14 and who pay the \$25 fee.

A glider with the necessary equipment will be purchased by the club after it is formed and Norman Hansen, experienced pilot, will be chief instructor for the club.

Dr. A. L. Travis, owner of one of the three planes in the Klamath Flying Service, has been named as temporary secretary-treasurer for the club. Dewey Powell has been named as organization manager. Those interested in joining such a club are asked to get in touch with Mr. Powell.

Cascade Box Co. Begins Operations

Operations of the Cascade Box Company will start this morning. It was announced last evening by F. W. Modrow and J. M. Johnson, San Francisco men who came here to build the plant. The company's plant is located three miles south of Klamath Falls on a site near the Koster-Lumber company and the buildings and equipment represent an investment of close to \$100,000. An eight-hour shift will be operated at first and later, if the market conditions permit, a double shift will be operated. At present from 10 to 50 men will be employed in the manufacture of box shooks. The output will be one carload a day, or a total of 900,000 box shooks each 50 days.

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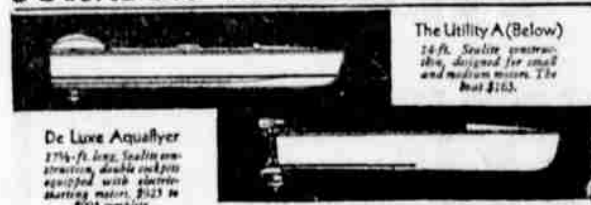
