WILLIE EARNS DECISION OVER BOB ROBINSON

Jackson And Langford Steal Show In Semi Final Battle

Two things were apparent in last night's fight card at the Legion pavilion. One of them was that Willie Feldman isn't as good in the light heavy class as he was in the middle weight division. The other was that Tiger Bob Robinson hasn't proved over his showing here last fall. Both fighters stilled more than in the worst of the usual fighters and although Feldman started fast and made every effort to put up a real fight in the first three or four rounds, he soon tired and showed the ill effects of too much exertion.

Five Good Rounds

Regardless of these failings, however, there were five good rounds. Throughout the first four Willie showed a lot of his two-handed ability and the University of Washington was the likely winner of the eleventh annual University of Washington relay carnival here today.

Records May Fall

Several carnival records were expected to fall when the 200 athletes from the colleges and high schools of the northwest swing into action. Existing marks in the one and four mile relays, discus, shot put, pole vault and 120 yard high hurdles were due to bow to new figures in the class "A" or Pacific coast conference division.

20 Events Scheduled

Eleven events were scheduled in the class "A" division, three in the class "B", two in the state high school class and four in the Seattle high school division. Steve Anderson, Washington's premier hurdler and captain of the husky squad was pronounced in tip top shape for the high stick event for the first time in ten days. Anderson sprained an ankle just before the Stanford-Washington meet last week and was unable to compete in the south.

Fans Disappointed

It was plainly evident that the fans were disappointed with the main event. When, in the first four rounds Robinson appeared to be stalling, he was booed. Then, in the following rounds when Willie was too tired to carry the fight, he drew the disfavor of the crowd. Whatever the opinion of a few may be regarding the relative strength of these two fighters, the decision met with the general approval as it is easy to see that Feldman is the superior boxer and he likewise dealt the most telling blow. Willie's admission will be glad to see him train down to his regular weight and recover his oldtime form.

Semi Steals Show

Once again Steamboat Jackson delivered the goods to the cash customers and pegged up another award of merit for good freestyle citizenship. The grapevine telegraph had slated Steamboat for the small end of the bout, or even a knockout, but the tough Swede had another notion about it.

As the bout opened, Tammy

displayed championship form. He played to the gallery until he found that three or four of his best punches failed to even shake Steamboat and then the grandiose manner was dropped for a more serious men. Langford put up the best exhibition in the first three rounds. These boys had no time for love making. They were too busy putting on one of the best shows seen here since the memorable engagement between Steamboat and Kid Evans.

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SEALS GARNER HECTIC GAME FROM SOLONS

Score Seven Tallies In 8th Inning to Retire Pitcher Ed Bryan

The San Francisco Seals occupied the runner up position in the Pacific coast league pennant race today by virtue of a hectic 9 to 5 victory over the Sacramento Senators in yesterday's game, when they scored seven runs in the eighth inning.

Ed Bryan, solon hurler, pitched fine ball until that fateful frame, but before the side was out he was on his way to the showers and the Seal pitchers were weary from running bases. The Senators went on a batting spree in the fifth scoring five runs to give Bryan a four run lead and the game seemed to be in the bag for the visitors. Then came the eighth and trouble.

Bryan Fills Bases

First to score for the Seals in the eighth was Zinn, pinch hitting for McDougal. Bryan threw a few more over the plate and looked up to find the bases full. Wingo cleared them with a home run and four tallies came in to tie the score. Two more runs came in before the side was retired, and although Sacramento scored twice in the ninth, their efforts went for naught.

Oaks Drop One

The league-leading Oakland Oaks had their lead cut to one full game at Wrigley Field when the Los Angeles Angels took a doubleheader, 3 to 2 in the eleven inning opener and 4 to 1 in the second game, a seven inning affair. Major League Fans no Longer Get "Kick" Out of Home Runs; Good Pitching at a Premium

Feats of heavy hitting are becoming so common in the major leagues that few of them can excite much comment while the few pitchers who are able to hold the sluggers in check are earning most of the season's glory.

Petty and Ferrell Star

For this reason, Jess Petty of Pittsburgh and Wesley Ferrell of Cleveland stand out as the leading performers in the two big leagues yesterday. Petty took the mound against the Boston Braves with none out and the bases full in the ninth inning yesterday and a slim 3 to 2 lead to protect. He did the job by fanning one batsman and forcing another to hit into a double play, starting it himself.

Ferrell, meeting the Boston Red Sox, gave up just three hits in seven innings before he yielded the job to Ken Holloway, but his team was trailing 3-2. The Indians scored six runs in the last two innings to gain an 8 to 3 victory.

Sewell Out of Game

The notable feature of the game was the absence of Joe Sewell for the first time in 1192 games. His streak was broken by illness, which kept him in bed with a temperature of 102. Joe had missed but one previous game since 1920 and none at all since 1922.

Ted Lyons of Chicago turned in another good pitching performance as the four first division teams of the American league downed the four trailers. Lyons held the New York Yankees to six scattered hits and gave Chicago a 10 to 1 victory. The Cubs made better use of their 14 hits off Koussal, Alexander and Milligan and pulled out an 11 to 5 decision.

Night Baseball Proving Popular

DES MOINES, Ia., May 3. (AP)—Apparently only the turnstile approval of baseball fans now is needed to make night baseball under artificial lighting a success. The Des Moines and Wichita, Kas., clubs of the western league, last night demonstrated before nearly 12,000 spectators that mechanically the game may be played as well under powerful lights as in the sunlight—and probably better on gray days.

Des Moines defeated the league-leading Wichita club, 13 to 6, by a wild first inning which netted 11 runs, but there was no indication that the unusual conditions were responsible. The pitching was as good as in the day time, and the players handled ground balls and throws without hesitation. Wichita played errorless baseball, while Des Moines was charged with four misplays.

Rube Walberg completed the roster of winning pitchers for the circuit by hurling the Philadelphia Athletics to a 9 to 4 victory over the Detroit Tigers. He allowed but eight hits and struck out six.

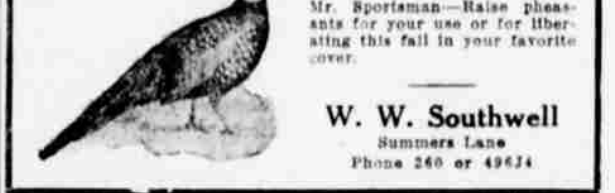
