George Simpson Rules Sprint

World With His 9.4 Hundred

New Fastest Human Combines Speed of Roland Locke, Stride of DeHart Hubbard and Finish of Charlie Paddock in His Race to the Top.

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first of a series of eight articles on George Simpson, telling of the triumphs and tragedies in the life of the world's fastest human.

A new and dominating figure has burst into the colorful picture of track and field athletics. He is George Simpson, Ohio State University senior and undisputed dash champion of the world.

Such illustrious stars of the past as Kelly, Drew, Jaddock, Locke, Borah and Hubbard have dimmed before the brilliant performances of the new "fastest human" who, with his 9.4 seconds "100," erased from the books a record that had withstood the assaults of a quarter century.

A Sprinter
Curiously, Simpson combines the best features of dash men of the past. He has the dynamic speed of Roland Locke, the bounding stride of DeHart Hubbard and the whirlwind finish of Charlie Paddock. The smoothness that marked the running of Drew of Southern California is lacking in Simpson's style, as is the sheer strength that Billy Hayes of Notre Dame carried from the football field to the cinder path with such marked success. There is missing also the explosive start that won Hubbard of Michigan so many races and brought success to Jack Elder of Notre Dame.

Simpson, in the final analysis, is simply Simpson. He has a

better start than the average sprinter possesses, a driving speed that has been unequalled in the racing fraternity and a fighting heart that tells when the last few yards call for a stupendous effort.

In physical characteristics, George Simpson is all that could be desired of the dash man. His running weight is 155 pounds while his height is but a mere shade under six feet. Long, tapering legs and a pair of shoulders that would do credit

to a weight man complete the ensemble of this dark-haired youth who, at the age of 21, rests at the top of the heap of modern flyers.

He Would Not Stay Down
It is characteristic of the Ohio State star that he has never remained beaten. Both Claude Bracey of Rice Institute and Eddie Tolan of Michigan, who took Simpson's measure in recent years, later bowed to his superior speed. Both of them, however, were in the epic 9.4 race of June 8, 1929. Even in his early days, Simpson possessed the will and ability to come back after defeat and atone in expressive seconds for his few reversals.

In common with other stars of the sporting world, Simpson is reluctant to talk about the details of each race. To be sure, he has a sincere belief in his ability, but is never grudging in defeat. Where on rare occasions others have capitalized on their ability, Simpson has forsaken the Great God Hallelujah to let his records speak for themselves.

His "fan mail" is amusing. From the boy in California who wants his picture to the high school star in Maine who asks for training advice, there is a steady stream of letters to the new king of the racing clan. Simpson answers them all, embarrassed perhaps, but secretly pleased at this new world of printed praise and clicking cameras.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 5. (AP)—Ninety six matches were on the program for the fourth day of the Northwestern International Bowling congress here today with teams from Tacoma, Portland, Vancouver, B. C., Shelton, Wash., Salem, Ore., and Seattle competing in the five man, doubles and singles events. The tournament will continue until next Sunday. In the last flight of last night's game which ended after midnight, the Salem legionnaires of Salem, Ore., rolled into first place in the major class of the five man event. The Salem five scored a brilliant 2,768 to nose out the Wenatchee Apple Blossoms No. 1 of Wenatchee, Wash., which had held the top spot from Saturday night with 2,659.

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DUCKS GARNER SERIES FROM CINEMA STARS

Take Four Out Of Six Games on Home Lot; Teams Travel

The Portland Ducks won the series from the Hollywood Stars, four games to two, splitting a double header with the movie city team yesterday. The Ducks took the forerunner game, 8 to 3, after a spirited contest which was featured by a fight between Chatham of Portland and Pitcher Wetzel of the Stars. The Ducks felt that Wetzel was a bit too careless in "bouncing" Orroil in the eighth. Walter "The Great" Mails shut out the Stars for seven innings in the second game only to have Hollywood rally in the eighth to score five runs and tally four times again in the ninth to win 9 to 2.

Sacs Take Series.
The Sacramento Senators not only broke a two-year losing streak to the San Francisco Seals last week but also moved into the favored position in the Coast league standings by virtue of a series victory over the locals, four games to three.

The Senators wound up the series in impressive style taking a double-header from the Seals at Recreation park yesterday. Fay Thomas pitched masterful ball to give the Senators the morning game 7 to 2 while Zinn and Frietas gave a fine exhibition to win the night cap, 4 to 3.

Angels in Second.
The Los Angeles Angels also climbed up a few notches and settled in second place after walloping the Oakland Oaks, league leaders last week, in a double header. Truck Hannah homered over the left wall of Wrigley Field with two men on bases to give the Angels the morning trounce, 3 to 2, while Ballou held the Oaks to six scattered hits with his teammates bunching timely singles to win the night cap, 5 to 2. The last game was a seven inning affair. The double victory gave the Angels the series, four games to two with one game being rained out.

Robins, Cardinals, Indians Perform Surprising Feats at Bat to Thrill Cash Customers

Three clubs which have been thrilling the fans by scoring their runs in big bunches and at the last possible moment in the games have been accomplishing surprising feats in the Major leagues during the past few days.

These three are the Brooklyn Robins, St. Louis Cardinals and Cleveland Indians.

Brooklyn and the Cardinals have staged a series of slugfest battles at St. Louis that never were decided until the final put-out was made, but on each occasion, the Robins came out ahead by a run or two to sweep the four game series and to carry their winning streak to seven games. A double victory yesterday put the Robins in fourth place in the National league standing.

On Saturday, St. Louis tied the score in the ninth inning and barely missed again in the tenth when Brooklyn scored five runs and St. Louis four. Yesterday, Ray Phelps, Robins rookie, out-pitched Bill Hallahan to win the first game, 2 to 1, without any Cardinal rallies but in the second the Cards repeated their act of getting four runs in the ninth and carried the battle in 13 innings before the Robins scored three runs to win, 11 to 10.

Three times in succession, Cleveland put on late rallies against the Boston Red Sox and won three games by doing it. They came from far behind yesterday, scoring five runs in the ninth inning and one in the tenth for an 8 to 7 victory. The sixth successive triumph put the Indians in first place in the American league as the St. Louis Browns won their second game in succession from Washington by an 8 to 6 score. The Browns bunched their hits off Thomas effectively in the second inning for seven of their runs.

The New York Yankees brought another chance in the American league standing, moving into sixth place ahead of Boston by beating the Chicago White Sox, 7 to 4. Babe Ruth's third home run of the year helped the Yankees considerably. It came in the eighth inning, just as Chicago was threatening.

In the fourth American league game, Bill Shore of the Athletics and George Uhle of Detroit staged a battle that remained a 1-1 tie for six innings, then the Philadelphia slugger got started and they pounded out six runs and a 7 to 1 victory in the last three frames.

The Cincinnati Reds altered the National league standing considerably by downing the New

York Giants, 5 to 4, behind the good pitching of Jackie May. The Giants dropped into second place behind the idle Pittsburgh Pirates through the defeat while the Reds jumped from last place to sixth.

The Chicago Cubs won another close game from Philadelphia 5 to 7 when Lou Koupal made a costly wild pitch inning and let Dan Taylor cross the plate with the deciding run. The Phillies had just completed an uphill struggle to tie the score with two runs in the first half of the ninth.

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
