MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, May 5. (AP)—The produce market opened without material change today. Eggs were barely steady at the close Saturday and buttermilk was apparently a little steadier following the recent decline. However, supplies of both products have accumulated rapidly, with storage facilities taking care of much of the surplus. Despite this, there has been individual shading of prices here and there.

Treatment of RHEUMATISM No Longer Effective Cause Must Be Removed Chiropractors Assert

Of all the chronic disorders to which man is subject, there is perhaps none more common than that of rheumatism in its various forms, and none which so handicaps the activities of man and limits his possibilities.

POPULAR BELIEF
Because of the great number of patients suffering with this condition, many so-called cures have been placed upon the market, including the long series of liniments and the many compounds which are taken internally with a hope of effecting a relief. A very careful study has been made of rheumatism, and investigators have spent much time and effort in trying to determine the actual cause of the disease. The sum total of all this investigation has led to the popular belief, expressed through written articles and by the medical fraternity, that rheumatism is caused by the excessive retention of uric acid in the body.

All efforts toward treatment have led to the general premise of administering some combination of chemicals which would neutralize the uric acid and thus restore health.

Those who have studied the subject find that investigators do not agree as to uric acid always being the cause of rheumatism. Their contention is that very often it is produced by the accumulation of lactic acid, or by the presence of micro-organisms. This is mentioned merely to show that the medical treatment given is dependent upon the opinion the practitioner holds as to what is the actual cause of the disease.

THE QUESTION

We will concede, for the sake of argument, that the contention which holds that uric acid, lactic acid or micro-organisms are responsible for rheumatism is true. Even though we make this concession we must follow it by asking the question, "Why is there an excess of uric acid and lactic acid, or why are micro-organisms present?" Has it ever occurred to the scientific investigator to look for the cause of these unusual conditions and if possible to eliminate those causes? In brief, is it logical to inject something into the body for the purpose of neutralizing an abnormal substance, or is it logical to eliminate the cause which has led to the production of that abnormal substance?

Normally there is a certain amount of uric acid in the blood. Normally there is a certain amount of lactic acid in the system. Harmful micro-organisms can only exist in the body when a diseased tissue offers them a place of residence.

THE ANSWER

The liver is principally concerned in the formation of uric acid, although it is produced in small quantities by all the active organs in the body. An excessive amount of lactic acid is the result of improper oxidation in the tissue cell. Normally the liver functions properly, and it is only when it is functioning abnormally that uric acid can be formed in excessive quantities. Normally, oxidation takes place to a sufficient extent to eliminate any excessive lactic acid. If the liver does not function properly and oxidation does not take place normally, then let us look to these causes instead of leaving them in their abnormal state and trying to neutralize the effect of that abnormality.

All function in the body is dependent upon the quantity and quality of nervous energy which is supplied through the nervous system. If the function of the organ is abnormal, it is because the nerve supply from the brain is abnormal. The reason why the liver does not function normally and the reason for the lack of oxidation in the tissue cells is because the nerve fibres which transmit this vital energy are pinched and thus rendered incapable of carrying their proper supply. In other words, if we grant that uric acid and lactic acid are productive of rheumatism, we must trace the cause back still further and find the reason why these substances are manufactured in excessive amounts.

As it is true that uric acid and lactic acid are normally manufactured in the body, so it is also true that they must be eliminated from the body. If their elimination does not keep pace with their production, they will also manifest themselves in excessive amounts. Therefore, upon the kidneys, as the principal excretory organs, develop the function of maintaining the elimination at the normal. If the kidneys do not function normally, rheumatism may manifest itself, but in reality the primary cause is the inability of the kidneys to function properly because it is not receiving its normal supply of vital energy through the nervous system.

LOGIC
In any of these cases, the only place where the nerves can be pressed upon is where they exit from the spinal column, passing between the adjacent vertebrae. Here they are subject to pressure if subluxations (slight displacements) of the vertebrae exist.

The Chiropractor is specially trained to know what parts of the spine may be involved in cases of rheumatism. He is specially trained to locate these abnormal conditions in the spine and to correct them. It makes no difference whether the rheumatism is in one form or another, whether it is articular, muscular, acute or chronic, the cause traced to its last analysis lies in the inability of the nervous system to properly function because of impingements on the nerve fibres. The only logical way to correct the condition is to adjust the vertebrae so that the several organs of the body function normally. 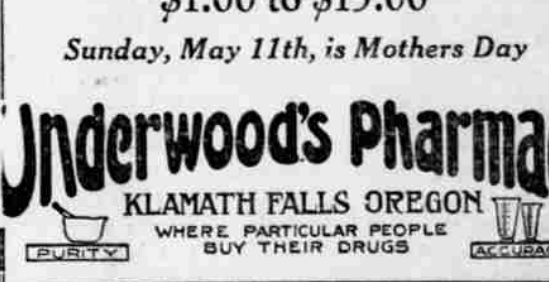
