

JUNE 27TH SET FOR ELECTION

Charter Group Reports To Council, Zoning Plan Discussed

The city council passed a resolution Monday night extending a vote of thanks to the charter committee which recently completed weeks of work on the assembling of a new charter for Klamath Falls and reported Monday night.

A special election was called for June 27 to vote on the plan. An ordinance was passed to amend and reading granting the right, privilege and franchise to the Natural Gas corporation of Oregon for laying and constructing gas pipes, pipelines and mains, and for construction and maintenance of a gas plant in this city.

Commend Committee
W. O. Smith, chairman of the charter committee, stated he didn't believe any of the committee desired thanks for their work, for they simply had performed their duty to their city. The vote of thanks especially commended Mr. Smith and Claude McCulloch, who spent days checking data for the charter. The council will meet this afternoon and take up the matter of having ballots printed.

The Natural Gas corporation is a sub-branch of the Standard Oil company which operates in California, and their proposed franchise has grown out of the refusal of the council to allow a franchise to the Consumers' Gas company, which was represented here by Edward Schary and F. Emerson Hoar. The final reading of the ordinance will not occur until after July, after which the company will start work within 10 days. However, the council is under no obligation to adopt the ordinance if by that date a decision has been reached not to grant a franchise.

Miller Awarded Bid
Upon the recommendation of the aviation committee of the chamber of commerce, W. D. Miller was awarded the bid for outfitting 3,000 feet of runway at a cost of \$6,495, and the city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance authorizing the mayor and police judge to sign the contract.

To License Electricians
A motion passed by a 3 to 2 vote, authorizing the city attorney to draw up an ordinance which will require the licensing of all contractors doing electrical repair and installation work in the city. Councilmen Richmond and Van Camp cast negative votes.

The motion was passed after presentation of a petition signed by 67 signers who requested that a \$100 license fee be charged the first year, and \$25 a year thereafter.

Several of the councilmen were of the opinion that licensing is being carried too far. Others believed the public would be better served if more businesses were licensed than at present. O. D. Matthews, plumbing inspector, stated the public has been able to get plumbing done cheaper this year than last, and it was his opinion the ordinance licensing plumbers has proved successful. Councilman Olds argued that citizens would be pleased with the law, since they would get better service.

April Reports
According to the monthly report from the police department, 263 arrests were made in April and \$2,283 collected in fines. Ten fire alarms were answered by the fire department, with \$12,800 property valuation at risk, \$1,166,055 insurance at risk, and \$1,650 fire loss.

NORTHWEST TOURNEY NEAR HALF WAY LINE

High Scores Feature Of Bowling Congress At Seattle

SEATTLE, Wash., May 6, (AP)—The half way mark was scheduled to be reached tonight in the eighteenth annual Northwest International bowling congress with teams competing from Spokane, Tacoma, Everett, Bremerton, Ferndale, B. C., and Seattle.

The majority of early leaders in the various classes continued to hold their places through yesterday's play. The Oregonian five of Portland rolled into third place in the five man commercial division last night with a score of 2651. The only first place to change hands yesterday was in the booster class when the telephone pioneers of Seattle forged to the top with 2,567.

Danley High Score
Harold Danley of the Oregonian team scored the highest single game total of the tournament to date when he cracked 248 pins last night. The Milwaukee specialists of Tacoma battered 2,529 pins to climb into third place in the booster class while the Perkins Glass and Fixture company of Seattle forged into sixth place in the same division with 2,453.
