MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, May 6. (AP)—Butter prices appeared to be steadier today with supplies on the street lighter than usual. No change was made in prices at the produce exchange.

Eggs were liberal and demand light. No price changes were announced.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"Strawberry receipts were curtailed due to rains at California shipping districts Saturday; consequently, supplies were cleaned up at an early hour, at \$2.75 per 20-lb crate. Frost throughout the Hood River district last Saturday night resulted in much damage to strawberries there.

First unofficial reports indicate greatest damage in the upper portion of the valley.

"Orange supplies are almost entirely confined to Valencia now, with navela being confined to clean-up lots, mostly. The market remains steady.

"Lettuce advanced to \$4.00 per crate of best stock, due to prospective lighter shipments in the immediate future. Quality continues good, with resultant active consumer demand.

"The market is oversupplied with spinach now. National car lot shipments are light now, but local supplies are liberal throughout the east; otherwise the northwest would be loading considerable volume of spinach for eastern shipment.

"Potatoes continue dull. Idaho dealers assert that there are only 450 to 500 cars of potatoes still available for shipment from that state."

Yellowstone Party Leaves Boise May 8

"On to Redding" is the slogan which will animate the Yellowstone cut-off caravan, starting in Boise, Idaho, on the morning of May 8, and proceeding down the line of the Yellowstone Cut-Off highway to Redding, Cal., for the annual meeting of the Yellowstone Cut-Off association.

The run for the first day, headed by Don S. Whitehead, vice president of the association; Harry K. Fritchman, director for Ada county, and W. T. Lockwood, manager of the Boise chamber of commerce, will be made to Burns, Ore., the headquarters of the association.

Delegations to join Stops will be made at Nampa and Caldwell, Idaho, to pick up the representatives of Canyon county, and in Ontario and Vale, Ore., where the Malheur county delegations will fall in.

An over-night stop will be made in Burns where the members of the caravan will have the opportunity of participating in the elaborate program staged by the city of Burns for the official opening of the new Hines mill.

Visits Alturas, Lakeview On the morning of the ninth, the caravan, augmented by the Harney county people, will continue to Lakeview with a stop at Paisley. At Lakeview that evening there will be a dinner meeting arranged by the Lakeview chamber of commerce, with F. Zim Baldwin, director for Lake county, in charge of the arrangements.

Saturday morning, May 10, an early start will be made and the caravan will continue on to Alturas with a brief stop at New Pine Creek at the state line. Adding continually to its members, the caravan will journey on to Redding, going through the various towns on the Redding-Alturas lateral, with a stop in Fall River Mills.
