Tariff On Lumber Is Beaten By Strategy, West Is Sacrificed

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4. (Special).—The house of representatives has put the lumber industry of the United States upon the altar of political expediency and offered it as a sacrifice to the personal ambition of the majority of the members of that body who are up for re-election.

Two weeks ago a prominent member of the house who was not interested in the lumber tariff made the remark that through a clever fit of political strategy the lumber and shingle tariffs, generally conceded to be ideal for the purpose, had been maneuvered around into the position where they were to be used as a football after everything else had been dropped. No one could have witnessed the action of the house Friday without being convinced that this congressman knew what he was talking about.

So elated were the lawmakers at the opportunity to go on record as having voted against protection for lumber and shingles that there was a mad scramble to get into the debate, and such a hilarious, festive atmosphere prevailed at the prospect of the pre-arranged slaughter that the percentage of silly prattle and irrelevant buffoonery caused that famous indecorous body to put on a show so devoid of dignity or seriousness of purpose that it was sufficient to disillusion the most liberal-minded optimist on his ideals of the functioning of what is supposed to be one of the most important legislative bodies in the world.

As politicians, the members of the house are decidedly gregarious. The party delegations from each state if there happens to be two, are each dominated by some one man who to a large extent puts a ring in the nose of every individual in his crowd. Lumber and shingles were the piece de resistance of the tariff, for it must be remembered that politicians have long since learned that a brickbat tossed at the lumber industry is always sure to bring applause, so that to have these items to toy with at the last grandstand is without a question the grandest climax ever known to tariff revisions in the history of the country.

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Arguments as to the real merits of the case of lumber and shingles have at no time been of much value. In fact, that is of those who voted for and against the tariff on logs, lumber and shingles to make it clearly evident that enough high - protection republicans placed their personal requirements ahead of political principles to bring about the defeat.

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Strength of East Is Felt
Under such a plan it is futile for the western states to hope to succeed in anything to which the heavily populated eastern states are opposed for it must be remembered that either New York or Pennsylvania has more members in the house than Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Colorado, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico combined.

When word was passed around Thursday that New York and Pennsylvania were preparing to tell the lumberman what they could do no one doubted their ability, if they once made up their minds, especially since the middle west prairie states were lined up against the lumber tariff to a man, even though they heaped much on the cost of living for the lumbermen and their employees through having been heavy beneficiaries in the upward revision of all agricultural products. As to the final outcome, one has only to read the names

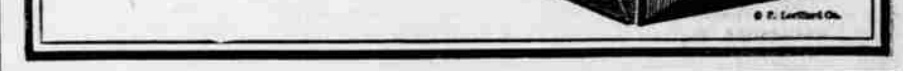
