Chiloquin Wins Track Meet at Klamath Falls

Last Saturday the Klamath county track meet was held at Klamath Falls. The schools represented were Chiloquin, Merrill, Bonanza and Fort Klamath. Chiloquin won the meet with 68 points, having a place in almost every event. Merrill was second, having 24 points, and Malin was third with 14 points.

P. Lewis of Merrill made a new record for the 220-yard dash, when he made it in 23.5, which was changed from 24.4. The Chiloquin relay team established a new record for the 330-yard relay, by making the lap in 1.42, the old record being 1.43. H. Thew of Bonanza furthered his own record in the mile, from 5:19.9 to 5:19. Nichols of Chiloquin made a new record in the pole vault when he jumped 10 feet three inches; the old record was 9 feet 8 1/2 inches. The half-mile record was changed from 2:24 to 2:14 by Nelson of Chiloquin.

The 50-yard dash and the 100-yard dash records were tied by P. Lewis of Merrill.

Lewis of Merrill was high point man making 15 points. He made three first places, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, and 220-yard dash. Nichols of Chiloquin was second with 13 points.

Man Taken North To Federal Court

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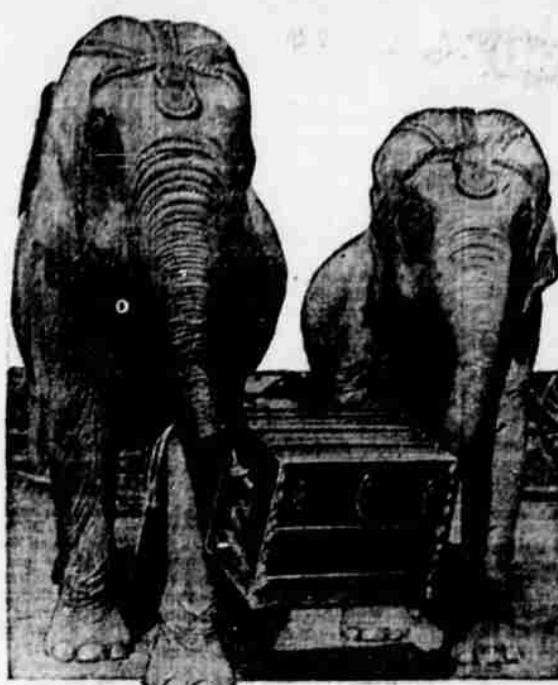
