Of especial interest was the dancing maidens who revive England's first May Day as it was celebrated by the Romans after their invasion. Peasants, gathered about a May Pole, with their dance bring a radiant ending to a golden day.

Cheers bring laughter as nearly a hundred girls do a variety of dances for their Queen, following the Proclamation of the Prime Minister. The traditional May Pole dance and the processional end the fete.

CHICAGO, May 8, (AP)—Four National league veterans have been declared ineligible by Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis for failure to sign new contracts.

They are Edd Roush, giant outfielder; Johnny Cooney, Boston infielder; Chester Nicholas, Philadelphia pitcher, and J. Pete Fowler, pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, May 8, (AP)—Egg and butter prices appeared steadier today than at any time in the last week. Receipts have been slightly less and demand apparently brisker.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the department of agriculture says:

"Several cars of spinach are available for shipment, but eastern markets all report 'local' spinach supplying the market' in response to Oregon shippers' inquiries."

Cool weather is delaying maturity of Oregon head lettuce, so that first carlot shipments will not be loaded until next week.

"California strawberries show wide variation in quality. Items at shipping districts have resulted in many soft watery berries. Keneswick is now expressing a few crates of strawberries daily to northwestern markets."

"Hunched vegetables are arriving from California, loaded bulk in ice cars. Quality is excellent. Carrots are firmer, with sharp price advances."

"An occasional motor-truck load of vegetables from Sacramento is the latest innovation in long-distance trucking."

Butter and eggs steadier, unchanged. Milk (buttermilk), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, wool, suits, hay, cactus bark and hops, steady and unchanged.
