## Salvation Army Handicapped by Supply Shortage

"Klamath Falls has a large population and of its remarkable growth Ensign Ford of the local Salvation Army, 'But,' the ensign continues, 'of that number there are many who have heard of the fame of Klamath Falls, came expecting too much and were disappointed, many of them, in not being able to find the necessary work, and have become dependent on various charity organizations to carry them until work opens up to accommodate them and their families.'"

**Hundreds Cared For**  
Since Dec. 1st, 1929, to May 1st this year, the local Salvation Army workers have cared for more than seventeen hundred and eighty men, women and children, assisting each of this number in various ways, including groceries, bedding, shoes, clothing, transportation, meals, beds and medical care. Ensign Ford states the Scouts sent over food recently to assist in feeding the hungry men and others have done the same, and still many have had to be turned away. Food, clothing and other necessities, especially men's and children's clothing, having had to run as best possible without scarcely any home service funds, the corps here has been under considerable handicap to carry on its work successfully.
