With a safe lead in the sixth inning, 13-7, Manager Red Sanders pulled Lefty Beck, whose work in the box had kept the visitors on the short end that far, to give Moser, former member of the San Francisco State staff of hurlers, an opportunity to loosen up a little. Moser loosened up a little too much—that is, he got too generous—and after fanning the first man up, let several walk and ere he knew it the bases were full and he was in a bad hole.

Moser Replaced
After Moser got bailed up, Red decided to change pickers once more and he put Peterson in to stem the tide. Peterson finally managed to quell the Medford slavers and with the score 14-13, the Pelicans tried to redeem themselves, but it just wasn't their day to win a game and after a lethargic last-minute rally, Lefty Best put an end to the suffering and tucked the game in his kitbag.

A Good Game
Despite the outcome, there is much to cheer Klamath fans. The Pelicans are a good aggregation. That outfield would be a credit to many professional teams. He continued on his way through the game and was accountable for several runs.

Dr. Willing Again Wins Coveted Vase

SANDWICH, Eng., May 12, (A.P.)—Once more the St. George's vase, voted golfing trophy, has eluded the grasp of Dr. O. P. Willing of Portland, Ore.

Dr. Willing was soundly beaten by Rex Hartley, youthful Briton, yesterday in the playoff of a tie in which they finished after the regulation 36 holes of play on Saturday. Hartley scored 79 for the 18-hole playoff to win by six strokes.

Off his game from the first tee, Dr. Willing never did get started. He needed 43 strokes on the first nine to give Hartley, who played brilliantly, an eight stroke lead at the turn.

With weather conditions anything but favorable, Hartley's game went to pieces on the second nine but Willing's was little better. The Doctor could do no better than shave two strokes off the long lead Hartley piled up on the first nine.

Thus for the second time in his career Dr. Willing muffed his chance of winning the vase. Seven years ago he and Francis Oulmet, Boston veteran, finished the 36-hole competition in a tie but Oulmet won the playoff.

J. Ward, M. Parsyck, Les Sailing, Bud Carroll, E. Valente and S. A. Snyder Will Compete for the Diamond Medal and Other Valuable Prizes Awarded by Klamath Falls Evening Herald for Best Bowling Scores in Tournament at Klamath Recreation.

After five weeks of The Herald's diamond medal bowling tournament in which a portion of the entrants were eliminated each week, six survive out of the 113 original entries. These six will bowl six games each, on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock on the Klamath Recreation alleys, to decide the final standing, and also to decide who will gain possession of the handsome diamond medal given by The Evening Herald.

The Six fortunate ones are: J. Ward, M. Parsyck, Les Sailing, Bud Carroll, E. Valente and S. A. Snyder. Each of the above six will receive a prize according to his standing after the finals.

In order to make the contest as even as possible, each bowler is given 3-4 of the difference between his average as of the date of the start of the tournament, and 190. The finals will be conducted under association rules, new pins, alternating alleys, foul judge etc. Six games, two on each of three pairs of alleys will be played.

Consolation Open to All
All who entered the tournament and did not win a prize are eligible to bowl for the valuable consolation prizes offered by The Herald. Beginning Sunday, May 11th, and up to midnight Saturday, May 11st.

All one, who is eligible, has to do, is to declare himself, when ready to bowl, and without the payment of any further entry fee, he or she may bowl three games, and the total plus handicap, will determine the results. The first prize is a mottled mineralite bowling ball bored to fit the grip of the winner. Second prize is a handsome embossed leather pocket set, with the winner's monogram done in gold. Third prize is a handsome embossed leather bridge set, with winner's monogram done in gold. Fourth prize, is a pair of Spaulding bowling shoes.

Preparations are being made to take care of a large number of spectators next Wednesday evening when the finals are being played. Ladies are especially invited.

Mackmen Humbled After Nine-Game Streak Of Winning

When a team that has been having a hard time holding a place among the league leaders although it holds the club batting lead and one which has stretched a winning streak about as far as possible get together, something is bound to happen. It did yesterday when the Cleveland Indians, entertained the Philadelphia Athletics and an overflow crowd of Cleveland fans.

Make 25 Runs
The Indians have shown plenty of hitting power all season while the Athletics had a bad heating coming to them after winning nine out of ten games. The beating was inflicted to the tune of 25 to 7, by far the biggest score of the Major League season. Cleveland started by clubbing Ed Rummel from the mound with five hits and three runs in the first inning up to the seventh, and collecting 25 hits. Nine of the blows were doubles and some might have gone for more bases except for the ground rules.

Wesley Ferrell Mound Hero
Wesley Ferrell held the world's champions to four hits in his six innings on the mound. He allowed five runs but his mates beat that in two different innings, getting seven in the fourth and six in the sixth.

Cleveland's batting feat stood out on a day of rather light hitting. The only game that approached it was Brooklyn's 10 to 2 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Robins made 13 hits for their successive victory in the series while Dazzy Vance held Pittsburgh to four. The game put Brooklyn in third place in the National League, dropping Pittsburgh into a three-way tie for fourth.

Cards Make 25 Hits
The St. Louis Cardinals made

25 hits but they had to win both ends of a double header from the Boston Braves to do it. The scores were 5 to 3 and 7 to 6, varying the Cardinals to six successive victories and Boston to as many defeats. Jess Haines pitched his first full game of the year in beating out Harry Solheid in the opener.

The New York Giants made their hold on the league's first place safe for the current series with the second place Chicago Cubs by winning their third encounter, 9 to 7. The game, played after a shower had made the field slippery, saw six pitchers yield 29 blows, 17 of them going to the Giants.

Frey Hurls for Reds
Benny Frey, who has taken part in nine of Cincinnati's 22 games, hurled his fourth complete game and won his fourth victory by limiting Philadelphia to seven hits while the Reds pulled out a 5 to 4 win. Three successive walks in the ninth inning forced in the deciding run.

Ed Morris produced the day's best pitching feat as he held the St. Louis Browns to two hits for the second day in succession. The Boston Red Sox won the game, 2 to 1, on Hogan's home run. Morris gave seven walks but he struck out nine. An ex-Bostonian, Charley Ruffing, made his debut in a New York Yankees uniform and helped the Yankees beat Detroit, 7 to 6. Given a good start by Babe Ruth's fifth home run of the season in the first inning, Ruffing barely lasted through the game.

Ted Lyons of Chicago huffed ten innings to defeat Washington 5 to 3, in a fine duel with Rump Hadley. Three successive hits in the tenth, one a triple by Watwood, gave Chicago the deciding runs.

Northwest Sportsmen's Association Passes Into History

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12, (A.P.)—The Northwest Sportsmen's Association, for years the governing body of regional trapshoot tournaments in this section, was an organization of the past today and the Northwest Trapshooting Association had taken its place. Formation of the Northwest Trapshooting Association was completed yesterday at the end of the three day Pacific Northwest Trapshoot tournament at which Frank M. Troeh, Portland, internationally known gunner, and Eddie Bauer, Seattle, divided major honors.

Templeton President
Dr. V. L. Templeton, Seattle, one of the veteran gunners of the northwest, was elected president of the new organization. He is credited with having discarded the Northwest Sportsmen's Association and started the new organization on its upward path. Dr. B. J. West, Tacoma, was chosen for vice president, and Charles Dockendorf, Stanwood, Wash., a familiar figure at all the major shoots, was named secretary-treasurer.

Troeh Adds Championship
Troeh added the northwest 16 yard target championship to his already countless championships and Bauer captured the northwest handicap title. Portland's famous gunner made sure of his title by going straight on his final 100 birds and in doing this he passed M. L. Gilbreath, Lakeview, Ore., a new comer, who led the first day.

The Northwest Trapshooting Association will have jurisdiction over the sport in Oregon, Washington, Montana and British Columbia. Besides the three officers elected a board of directors will be named, consisting of one member from each of the states and the province.

Seattle Gets Tournament
Seattle was awarded the first tournament to be held under the

new association. It will be held next year.
