Cowtesting Reaches Highest Point in Number of Animals Tested During Month of April

During the month of April the Klamath Cow Testing association reached its high point in the number of cows tested, a total of 29 herds being on test for the month containing 633 cows, of which 112 were dry. Total milk production in the association 48,677 lbs., containing 18,693 lbs. butterfat, 19 per cent of the cows on test, or 133, produced over 46 lbs. butterfat for the month. Average production 689 lbs. milk, containing 26.7 lbs. fat. The highest average since the association started January 1st.

High Herd Average
Charles E. Drew, Pine Grove, had the highest herd average in herds of 20 cows or over. Mr. Drew's 38 cows averaged 1819 lbs. of milk, containing 32.1 lbs. fat. In herds of 12 to 20 cows, Schmid and Borlin, Langell Valley, having 12 cows, were high with average of 985 lbs. milk and 43.8 lbs. fat. In herds under 12 cows, M. J. Loosley, Malin, with 7 cows had the high herd with an average production of 1015 lbs., containing 36.9 lbs. fat.

Individual High Averages
The two high cows for the month were Littlest owned by Schmid and Borlin, Langell Valley, producing 1167 lbs. milk and 79.4 lbs. fat; and Tiner, owned by C. W. Lewis, producing 1719 lbs. milk and 74.7 lbs. fat.

Next in order of production were Blossom, owned by C. W. Lewis, giving 69 lbs. fat; Kicker, owned by E. D. Briscoe, Fort Klamath, 68.5 lbs. fat; Beauty, owned by H. M. Mallory, Fort Klamath, giving 65.8 lbs. fat; and Bally, owned by A. Pinelli, giving 65 lbs. fat.

The five high cows in the 4-year old class were Monday, owned by C. W. Lewis, 61.2 lbs. fat; Trixie, owned by H. J. Ticknor, Langell Valley, 60.8 lbs. fat; and five other cows.
