Notwithstanding unfavorable conditions in its territory last year, the Great Northern railway earned \$19.27 a share in 1929, as compared with \$16.11 in 1928.

The decline in earnings during the first four months of the present year merely reflects the condition which has prevailed throughout the country during the last eight months.

Some Lines Recover—"There has been a recovery in some lines," Mr. Budd reported, "but agriculture is a seasonal pursuit and it is still too early to predict the probable results of the coming season's activities."

Checks Passenger Decline—One of the outstanding features of the report are figures showing that the Great Northern has succeeded to a large extent in checking the rapid decline in its passenger business.

While local passenger business continued to decline, Mr. Budd pointed out that the loss was largely offset by a substantial increase in the transcontinental or through business.

Mr. Budd said that the increased through business was due principally to the fine passenger service afforded by the railway's transcontinental trains, the Oriental Limited and the Empire Builder.

Not only have the schedules for these trains been rearranged during the last year so as to meet as closely as possible the convenience of the travelling public, Mr. Budd said, but the Empire Builder is running on a schedule that is more than ten hours faster than the fastest schedules in effect at the close of the war.

CITY PRECINCT POLLS GIVEN

10,972 Voters Will Cast Primary Ballot On May 16th

With the primary election just three days off, the polling places within the city and for Enterprise, Hillsdale and Orindale precincts have been announced through the office of C. R. DeLap, county clerk.

The polling places in the county precincts have not been changed, it was announced, and are the same as they were at the last election.

10,972 Can Vote—Candidates are in a last drive to get sufficient votes in their favor from the 7,632 registered republicans, and the 3,340 democrats in the county to be nominated by their parties.

Of the total registration of 11,543 registered voters in the county only 10,972 will be able to vote. The remainder have registered either with parties having no tickets or have given no politics and will be unable to vote in the primaries.

Estimates 40 Per Cent Vote—There are in the city of Klamath Falls 4,987 republicans registered. In the county outside of Klamath Falls, 3,545 republicans and 1,604 democrats have registered.

If, as some observers have predicted in other newspapers, only 40 per cent of the registered voters cast ballots there will be 3,053 republican votes cast in the county and 1,326 democratic ballots to count.

Candidates Busy—Already efforts are under way to get a large turnout on election day and just recently there has been more interest shown in the various candidates and in the campaigns than there was a month ago.

Candidates are busy winding up their campaigns for votes. Numerous meetings are being held at which the candidates have been invited to speak and give their platforms.
