S. P. Announces Schedule Change

Among announcements made Tuesday by C. M. Biggs, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company, are the following changes in that company's train service:

Effective at once trains 532 and 533 on the Walnut Grove branch will resume normal service, leaving Sacramento at 10 a. m., and leaving Lakeview on return trip at 5 p. m. daily.

Effective at once trains 24, 26 and 19 will make a five-minute stop at American canyon. This arrangement will continue all through the summer season.

Effective immediately, trains 15 and 16 will stop on flag at Castle Craig.

Southern Pacific motor transport service between Reno and Truckee was changed, effective May 15, the bus now leaving Truckee at 9:45 a. m., arriving at Reno at 10:55 a. m. Returning, the bus leaves Reno at 3:25 p. m. and arrives at Truckee 4:40 p. m.

Effective Saturday, May 19, on train 14, and Sunday, May 21, on train 13, a San Francisco-Dunsmuir sleeping car was installed for daily service to meet the requirements of northern California people for overnight service to San Francisco.

At Primary Election

Interesting Data on Each Person Whose Name Will Appear on the Local Official Ballot Next Friday.

T. R. GILLENWATERS, candidate for District Attorney on the republican ticket, familiarly known as "Ted" to his host of friends, was born on a farm near Maryhill, Washington, in 1895, the descendant of pioneers of Old Oregon Territory. His education was in a country school, public schools and University of Oregon in 1921, graduating from the University of Oregon Law School in 1927. Came to Klamath in September, 1927, and began law practice. In February, 1928, he became Deputy District Attorney under Judge W. M. Duncan and has continued in that position to the present. Mr. Gillenwaters was married in Klamath county to a Klamath county lady. His official work in the District Attorney's office is recognized throughout the State of Oregon. He represented Klamath county in the State District Attorney's Association. Delegate to the Anti-Crime Conference. Since 1925 member of O. P. Research Committee of International Anti-Crime Conference and is president of the Southern Oregon Law Enforcement Officers Association. Has been appointed special prosecutor in cases in the federal courts. First Sergeant in Battery "D" 24th Coast Artillery. First Lieutenant Officers Reserve Corps. Slogan: "Make life and property safe. Personal attention to all Klamath county business. Service to taxpayers and all citizens."

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
