Crippled baseball arms are very temperamental and an athlete can never tell whether his affliction is temporary or permanent. Fast ball pitchers usually develop trouble in the shoulder muscles, while curve ball pitchers have most of their trouble in their elbows.

A good arm is apparently a gift from the gods. A man can be a physical giant in all other respects and still have a poor throwing arm. Jim Thorpe, the great Indian athlete, was an example of this.

Cy Young, the famous old pitcher, developed his first sore arm after 22 years service in the major league. When he found his old salary whip was ailing he told George Stallings he was going to give it one final tryout.

He donned his uniform and disappeared for a few minutes. He returned shortly and took his uniform off and dressed slowly. When he had finished he presented his uniform to Stallings and said: "George, the old arm is gone. I'm through and going back to the farm."

Cy kept his word. He never pitched another ball.

GALLANT FOX, EARL SANDE UP CAN'T BE BEAT

By ALAN GOULD Associated Press Sports Editor NEW YORK, May 19, (AP)—Horsemen are reluctant to rush in prematurely with the laurels of greatness. They prefer to let time and the records add just these matters. Today, however, they readily concede that Gallant Fox, the thoroughbred around whose neck the rose wreath of Kentucky derby triumph was hung Saturday, and his rider, the equally gallant Earl Sande, rank as the most sensational, if not the greatest winning combination since Man O'War and Clarence Kummer were unbeatable ten years ago in three-year-old competition.

Only Fair Juvenile The winner, in succession, of the \$10,000 wood memorial, \$55,000 preakness and \$60,000 derby, has developed unconquerable habits as a three-year-old whereas this big black son of Sir Galahad third was just fair to Middlin' as a juvenile.

At the rate Sande has been piloting William Woodward's colt through the spring campaign, Gallant Fox has a royal chance to capture the third of the big three-year-old classics, The Belmont. June 7, and boost his total money-winnings beyond the \$200,000 mark.

No Rivals in Sight The Belmont probably will be Gallant Fox's next engagement with Gallant Knight, the Audley Farm's derby place-winner, offered another chance to take up the pursuit, where Crack Brigade, Tannery and other fine colts have left off, apparently somewhat discouraged. Unless it is H. P. Whitney's Whicoma, no other rival for Gallant Fox seems in sight.

BRITON TURNS IN LOW SCORE IN MEDAL PLAY

W. G. Brownlow Captures First Half of 36 Hole Play

SUNNINGDALE, England, May 19, (AP)—The Hon. W. G. Brownlow, son of Lord Lurgan, today scored 69, a record for the reconstructed Sunningdale course in the first half of a 36 hole medal competition for a vase offered by a London golf magazine.

Several Walker cup players, including Bobby Jones, engaged in the competition. Jones was accompanied on his morning round by the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, the Duke of Gloucester and Prince George but not even the presence in his gallery of the four sons of the King could enable him to keep pace with Brownlow and he returned a card of 75.

Passes Dr. Willing Dr. C. F. Willing, another Walker Cup player, had a 72 which led the field until the record smothered 69 came in. The Prince of Wales congratulated the Portland, Ore., player and asked him how he did it. His royal highness turned to Dr. Willing's partner and asked the score. When the reply was 92, the Prince said: "That's more like my golf."

George Voigt also returned a card of 72 and George Von Elm had 73. Rex Hartley, R. H. Openheimer, N. C. Selway each had scores of 73 and Cyril Tolley, British amateur champion, 76. Doug Fairbank had 84.

Errors Spoil Game

After going out in a highly creditable figure—3—the American captain made two errors on the first three holes coming home, cutting a brassie shot at the tenth and over-approaching at the twelfth where he also missed his first putt of the round. He was even four for 13 holes but finished with a six at the seventeenth and three putts on the home hole.

Bobby started out with only three Princes in his gallery, but before he finished the Prince of Wales and two brothers were joined by the other brother, the Duke of York.

Klamath County Boys Win Laurels In Track Events

HAYWARD FIELD, Eugene, Ore., May 19, (AP)—Clipping three and two-fifths of a second from the world intercollegiate record for the mile run, Ralph Hill, Oregon, established a new mark of 4:12 3-5 for the distance in the dual meet here against University of Washington Saturday. The Oregonians defeated Washington 69 1-3 to 61 2-3. Hill's time bettered that of John Paul Jones, formerly of Cornell, who in 1913 did the mile in 4:15 4-8. Rufus Kiser, of Washington, national champion, was six yards behind Hill, and collapsed at the line.

Oregon won the century when Tyrell Lowrey went the distance in 10:2. Victorious in the pole vault, the Oregonians then took the two-mile run by the longest margin, as Clarence Hill went that distance in 9:34.4, finishing more than 50 yards ahead of the nearest Husky contender.

The Washington freshmen defeated the Oregon yearlings 51 to 41.

Winners From Klamath

Ralph Hill, who set the new world's record for the intercollegiate record for the mile run, and Clarence Hill, his brother, winner of the two mile run, are Klamath county boys, whose family home is near Bonanza.

Tom Stoddard, who tied for second place in the pole vault, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. N. Y. Stoddard of Modoc Point.

MILWAUKEE, May 19, (AP)—Harry Hardner hit a home run yesterday, and by dint of speedy running stretched it into a single.

Hardner, negro pitcher for the Walnut Street Carriage team, amateur, slammed the ball to the edge of the playing field, and ran like sixty. He circled the bases and came in standing up, beaming all over. In the meantime the outfielder, Bob Simmons—a brother of the well known Al—was fielding the ball.

Hardner's teammates began gesticulating wildly. Hardner, it appeared, had neglected to touch first base. So Hardner started all over again, sprinting like mad down the first base line. He got there just in time, and the scorebook gives him a single.

Robins All Hopped Up Over Grabbing Pennant This Year

The Robins won the title in 1920 and since then they have spent most of their time in the second division. But they are right up in this year's close race, holding first place today as a result of a double victory in yesterday's double header against the Phillies.

The leading teams are so closely bunched that Pittsburgh, in fifth place, is only one full game behind the Robins. While Brooklyn was defeating the Phillies yesterday, 3 to 0 and 7 to 5, the New York Giants were dividing one double header with the Boston Braves and the St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs were splitting another to line up in order behind the Robins.

The Braves captured the first game from New York, 4 to 1, as old Tom Zachary, until recently with the New York Yankees, made his debut by making nine Giant hits almost useless while Boston made the most of five off Walker and Fitzsimmons. The Giants won the second game 3 to 2, in eleven innings. Travis Jackson had to drop out of the Giant lineup because of mumps, the disease which already has laid Wally Reuther low.

The Cubs drove out 14 hits, including Hack Wilson's tenth and eleventh home runs of the year, to stop the St. Louis winning streak at nine games. The Cubs won the first game 9-6, the Cardinals took the second 5 to 2.

COAST BATTING AVERAGES SOAR OVER SUNDAY

Large Drove of Fans See Sluggers Get 194 Hits, 116 Runs

(By the Associated Press) Batting averages soared generally higher as the eight clubs in the Pacific coast league battled through a schedule of double-headers yesterday and got noophers for their troubles, each of the morning game victors being in turn defeated in the nightcap. Large droves of fans, attracted by ideal playing conditions, saw the league's sluggers pummel 34 pitchers for 194 hits and 116 runs in the eight games played.

Seals Take Series Although defeated 10-6 in the final game, the San Francisco Mission captured the series four games to three by defeating the Portland Beavers 11-8 in their morning clash. Monroe, Mission second sacker, led the hitters with a homer and two singles. Ken Weisback, former big leaguer, hammered one out of the lot for the Beavers in the matinee.

Seals Regain Lead

Temporarily shoved into second place when they lost to the San Francisco Seals 7-4 (ten innings) at Stockton in the morning, the Sacramento Senators rallied behind the excellent pitching of young Tony Freitas on their home grounds in the afternoon and reversed the verdict to regain the league lead. The Senators took the series, four games to three.

Carl Zamloch's Oakland club occupied top position in the standings for a little more than three hours by virtue of a 7-4 morning win over Los Angeles. The Angels quickly knocked them down again, however, winning the ma-

time battle 10-7. The series went to the Oaks, six to two.

Indians Lose Series At Los Angeles, Seattle and the Hollywood Stars split a pair, the Indians taking the first game 9-1 behind Dutch Reuther's steady pitching and the home club the second 11-10. Barbee, Indian's right fielder, hit for four bases in each contest. Hollywood took five of the seven games played.

This week's schedule will see Los Angeles at Sacramento; Seattle playing the Missions at San Francisco; San Francisco at Oakland, and Portland at Hollywood.
