## Ensign Ford Submits Report Of Salvation Army Work for Fiscal Period May 1929-1930

### Special Relief

The Salvation Army provided transportation for 103 fortunate young people to and from the Army's barracks during the above period, for 1,951 women and children. These individuals live in the outlying districts and probably would not receive training in Christian character building had not the Salvation Army taken this interest in them.

### Family Relief

228 families numbering 1,727 individuals received aid from the Salvation Army by means of food, clothing, medical aid, jobs or transportation.

### Transient Relief

661 meals, 513 nights lodging, 818 garments, and 231 pairs of shoes, medical assistance and transportation were provided 1,756 transient men and women. 696 jobs were provided transient men, and 29 positions were secured for women in need of employment.

A grand total of 4,557 individuals received aid in some manner from the Salvation Army at Klamath Falls, Oregon; actual value of relief given out, taken from weekly records of the Salvation Army's office, reaches the sum of \$2,981.50.

### Jail & Hospital Work

20 visits were made and meetings were held at the hospitals and county jail, \$116.66 was spent in bringing cheer and comfort to inmates of these places. 489 individuals were in attendance.

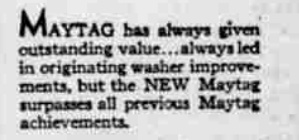
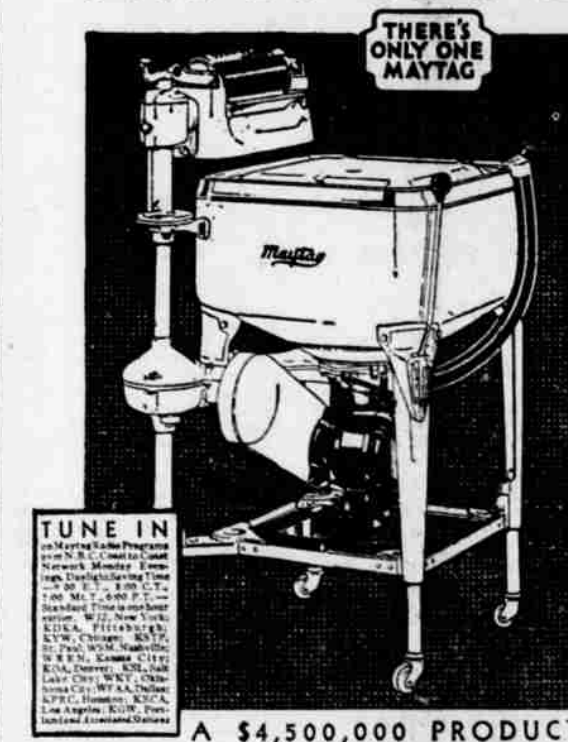

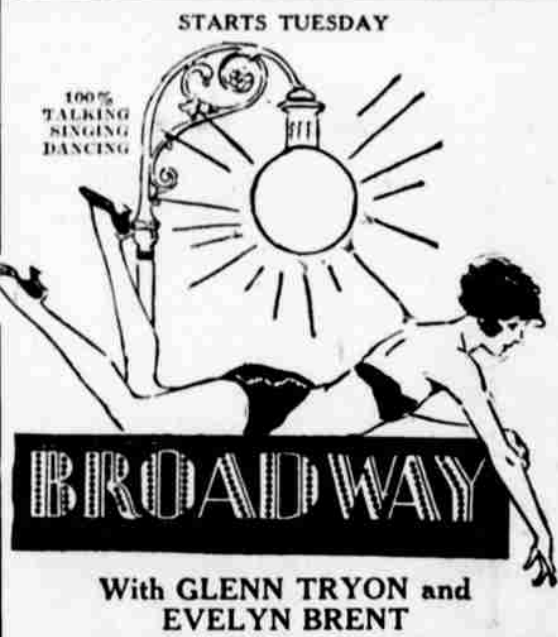
