BEAVERS ONLY TEAM OUT OF RANGE OF TOP

AM Other Clubs Within Reach of Lead in First Half

Despite high-powered hitting, faulting fielding and weak pitching, seven of eight clubs enter the seventh week of the Pacific Coast league race today with excellent chances of coping first half honors for the split season. Only the lowly Portland Beavers, eleven and one-half games behind the pace-setting Sacramento Senators, appear to be out of the running at this date.

Oaks Half Game Back
Snapping at the Senators' heels are the Oaks, half-game back; the Angels of Los Angeles, 1 1/2 games in the rear; and then, consecutively, the San Francisco Seals and Missions, Seattle Indians and Hollywood Stars. The movie-town team is seven games out of first place.

The week's games should bring about many changes, for the schedule pits the Angels against the Senators, Oaks against Seattle, Indians against Missions and Stars against Beavers.

Play Like Champs
League followers are particularly interested in the performance of the Oaks and Senators. Both clubs, unlike their competitors, have been getting decent pitching and batting and are behaving affably. Carl Zamocho, former University of California coach and one-time big leaguer and Coast League player, has injected a lot of spirit and dash into the Oakland team, which is liberally sprinkled with youngsters and veterans.

Boomer Leading Hitter
Boomer, of the Missions, who was shunted out of the Majors several years ago despite a better than .300 batting average, continues to lead the league batters although he is being closely pressed. Tony Freitas, young southern phenom of the Senators, is still the leading hurler with a perfect record of six games won and none lost. An old-timer, Walter "Dutch" Reuther, with six victories and a single defeat, shares second position with Pete Duglia of Oakland. Pitching for Seattle, "Dutch" hurled the only two games his club won last week from Hollywood.

Once Ski Jumping Champion Hanged

SYDNEY, N. S., May 20. (A.P.)—Ingvald (Bing) Anderson of Berlin, N. H., former eastern ski-jumping champion, was hanged here today for the slaying of Dublin Rehberg, a hotel night clerk.

He walked steadily from his cell to the gallows, protesting his innocence to the last. The trap was sprung at 1:13 a. m. and after an inquest the body was turned over to a local minister for burial.

Robbery Motive
Anderson once a member of the Nansen Ski Club of Berlin, N. H., was convicted of the slaying of Rehberg a month after the hotel clerk was found dying from wounds on the head. Robbery was said to have been the motive. Before he died Rehberg said that "Emmett Sloane could tell all about it." The man known as Sloane was identified as Anderson.

Injured in Skiing
When friends of Anderson in Berlin learned of the identification they engaged an attorney to seek to save him on a plea of insanity. His mother and others declared that his mind had been affected by injuries to his head suffered in a skiing accident.

The supreme court of Nova Scotia dismissed an appeal of the case.

Sonnenberg Given Decision on Foul

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 20. (A.P.)—Gus Sonnenberg, generally recognized as the world's heavyweight champion wrestler was awarded a decision over Ed (Strangler) Lewis, former champion, on a foul here last night, after each had won a fall. The referee ruled a foul when Lewis butted Sonnenberg with his knee shortly after the struggle for the third fall got under way. Lewis took the first fall in 25 minutes, 10 seconds with a series of headlocks. Sonnenberg won the second in 12 minutes 12 seconds with a flying tackle.

Fielding Fly Balls

An outfielder should be a good judge of fly balls, and be able to catch them in all positions and on either side of his body. He must be able to catch line drives and high flies that go over his head, as easily as you came in on a ball.

In order to prevent injury to yourself and the other players from collisions resulting from two men attempting to make the same catch, always shout "I have it" as soon as you are positive you can reach the ball. If the other outfielder yells for the ball, before you do, stop immediately and let him make the catch.

Always watch the flag to see which way the wind is blowing. If it is blowing out, you will have to play much deeper than you ordinarily would. Never make unnecessary throws. If you see you have no chance to throw a runner out at the plate, throw to second base and hold the batter on first base. And when you throw, always throw on a line with one or two bounces.

Divorces Granted, Two More are Filed

Two divorces were yesterday granted by Judge W. M. Duncan after hearings in circuit court and three divorce complaints were filed.

Agnes M. Swinney was given a decree from Vincent L. Swinney and their two children were given to the care and custody of Ella Glazier, subject to the right of both to visit them. The court ordered Swinney to pay \$25 a month for the support of the children and \$100 attorney's fees to D. E. Van Vactor.

Violet Lundgren was given a decree from Elton Lundgren and her maiden name of Violet Roberts was restored to her. Katie Robert David filed suit for divorce from McKinley David whom she married in Klamath Falls in October, 1928. She asks a one-third interest in property owned by David. Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll and Ralph W. Horan are attorneys for the plaintiff. She charges cruel and inhuman treatment.

Jesse Delbert Knighten filed suit for a divorce decree from Marietta Louise Knighten alleging desertion while they were living in Dorris, Calif., on November 25, 1928. They were married in Yreka, Calif., on November 25, 1925, and have no children. David Vandenberg is attorney for the plaintiff. Minnie Courtade, who married Frank D. Courtade in Ashland on September 2, 1925, yesterday filed suit for divorce from him, alleging that for the past year he has treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner. There are no children as a result of the marriage. The complaint states that Courtade earns \$7 a day and asks that she be awarded \$50 a month alimony, \$100 attorney's fees for E. B. Ashurst, her attorney, and \$30.50 court costs.

COLD WEATHER HALTS GAMES AMONG MAJORS

Detroit Tigers And St. Louis Browns Play Double Header

If the Detroit Tigers could play the St. Louis Browns all the time, they might be champions of the American League. But as it is, they are perched in seventh position after stretching their winning streak to four straight games with a double header victory over the Browns yesterday in the only games played in either of the Major Leagues. Rain and cold weather wiped out all other scheduled contests.

Tigers Better Record
The 5 to 4 victory in two innings and the 4 to 2 triumph in the nightcap marked three high spots in Detroit's 1930 campaign. By taking the twin bill, the Tigers not only made it five out of eight starts against the Browns but bettered their season's consecutive winning record by two games. The double triumph also served to lift the Tigers into seventh place in the standings and above St. Louis in the cellar.

Like Pennant Race
With the Tigers' double victory over the Browns, the second division of the Barnard circuit today had the aspect of a separate pennant race, only two games separating Detroit from the Chicago White Sox, who head the quartet. While ranking seventh in the percentage column, the Tigers actually trail the Browns by one-half game, having played five more games and won only two more. Here is how the second division looks: Chicago 11-14, .400; Boston 12-16, .429; Detroit 12-19, .387; St. Louis 10-16, .357.

As rain and cold weather took their toll of National League games, the closeness of the race remained unchanged. Pittsburgh holding down fifth place, is only one game out of first position, occupied by the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Southern States Look to Weather To Stop Floods

NEW ORLEANS, May 20. (A.P.)—Northern Louisiana and Northern and Central Mississippi today hope clearing skies would alleviate the flood situation which in the past few days has inundated thousands of acres of farm land.

In the Red River valley about two hundred families were homeless, and many were being rendered aid by farmers living in the uplands. One negro was drowned near Rorensa when caught by the swift current of Black Bayou, while trying to cross an overflowed stretch.

Hoover Reviewing Fleet Maneuvers

OLD POINT COMFORT, Va., May 20. (A.P.)—President Hoover and his party arrived here on a special train from Washington at 7:45 o'clock this morning and immediately went aboard the cruiser Salt Lake City, from which the chief executive will review the fleet maneuvers off the Virginia Capes.

The Salt Lake City, which had put into Hampton Roads early in the day to take the presidential party aboard, immediately put out to sea.

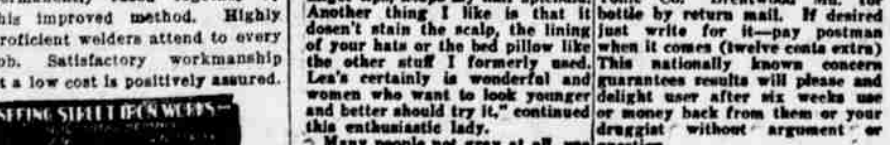

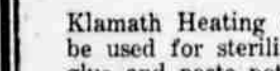
