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## Babe Has Four Hitting Areas

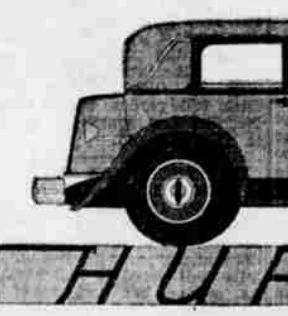
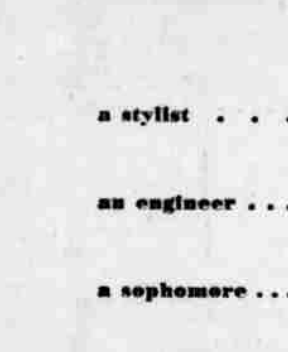
From personal observation and also from conversations I have had with Babe Ruth I believe his total home runs are bounded out from the four hitting areas in practically the percentage I have shown in my above cartoon.

I have noticed, and Ruth admits that at least half of his total home runs for a season are on low fast balls or curve balls that break inside. Practically one-quarter of his circuit clouts off right-handed pitchers are made on high, outside, fast balls that he hits into the stands in left field. About one-fifth of his long drives are made on high, inside fast or curve balls from left-handed pitchers. Ruth gets many a base hit, but very few homers from low fast balls outside. If he has any weakness, this is the spot.

Sacramento lost to the Angels and held first place by a half game margin only due to the crushing defeat administered the Oaks by San Francisco. Manager Zamloch, anxious to move that short distance into first place if possible, called on Pete Daglia, star hurler from Napa, to deal with the Seals. Daglia lasted for only a part of the first inning, in which Frank Crosslett and "Red" Wingo led a five run batting attack. The hitting spree continued at the expense of Dumovich and Kasich, the Acorns' relief men, and the Seals totalled 15 markers on 21 hits to Oakland's two runs on seven hits.

**Angels Disrespectful**  
Los Angeles showed its disrespect for league leaders by banging Laurie Vinel, Sacramento hurler, out of the box in the first inning to establish a safe four run lead. Jones also failed to hold the Angels, and the total for the Southerners ran to eight. The amazing race of the National League clubs for the higher places in the standing has stolen the show in big league baseball from their rival circuit. Four games were played yesterday in each major league, and while the American was offering but one change in the standing, a shift of the seventh and eighth place clubs, the elder circuit left just two clubs in their former posts.

## Robins Hold Lead

The Brooklyn Robins, who became the leaders only Sunday, held their place by trouncing the Phillies, still the tail enders, 16 to 9. All the rest shifted about. The New York Giants dropped from second to fourth place for the day's biggest fall while Pittsburgh made the best climb, going from fifth to third.

## Beaves in Struggle

Even the Boston Braves, ranked of all outsiders, found themselves in the struggle as they downed the Giants for their fourth victory in the five game series. Led by Wally Berger, a hard hitting recruit from Los Angeles who seems to have found a lot of "cousins" on the Giants, the Braves pulled out a ten inning triumph, 4 to 3. Berger scored both of Boston's runs in the regular nine innings, one of them on his ninth homer of the year. George Sizer drove in the run, getting a timely single in the tenth after Larry Benton had weakened just enough to fill the bases.

## Brooklyn had almost no trouble holding the top as they pounded three Philly pitchers for 18 hits to get their 15 runs.

Pittsburgh leaped up two places in the standing as Larry French shut out the Cincinnati Reds with four hits to give the Pirates their third straight victory. For seven innings French had a tight battle against Red Lucas, holding only a one run lead, but the Pirates came through in the last two frames to make it 5 to 0.

## Women May Retain Place in Olympic

BERLIN, May 21, (AP)—Strong pressure in favor of the continuance of women's Olympic track and field events in the 1932 games at Los Angeles was brought to bear today by the international amateur athletic federation in session here.

Unless the women are allowed to compete, the world's male athletes as represented in the I. A. A. F. will adopt a policy of non-cooperation in regard to the Olympics, it was indicated.

A resolution proposed by Gustavus T. Kirby of New York was adopted by the federation at its closing session today which provides that the I. A. A. F. shall remain in Berlin in readiness to be called together should the Olympic congress, convening next week, decide to eliminate the women's track and field events.

## Coast League to Engage in Flood-Light Baseball

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21, (AP)—Night baseball, which many magnates believe will save the American pastime from financial decay since its successful trial by Des Moines this spring, will make its debut in the Pacific Coast league at Sacramento, June 10, according to an announcement by Law Moreing, president of the league's leading team.

Oakland's Acorns will vie with the Senators in the first coast venture at knocking high flies into the floodlights, and other teams will have their opportunities soon after. For Moreing stated that five regular games will be played at night each week from then on. Only the Sunday morning game at Stockton and the Sunday afternoon game at Sacramento will be played by sunlight.

Moreing believes that Sacramento's climate is particularly favorable for night games, and declares that lighting engineers will profit by the experience of the Des Moines experiment and offer the best equipment available.
