For governor 6459 districts gave Brown 509,134; Pinchot 454,013 and Phillips, running mate of Bohlen, 217,722.

Of the districts remaining to be tabulated approximately 400 were in Allegheny county in which the city of Pittsburgh is located, and the remainder were scattered through territory which generally gave Pinchot and Grundy heavy majorities.

GREEN NOMINATED IN SOUTH DAKOTA

PIERRE, S. D., May 21, (AP)—Warren E. Green of Hazel, who placed last in a field of five candidates in the state primaries two weeks ago, today was the republican candidate for governor. He will oppose D. A. McCullough of Sioux Falls, democrat, in the November election.

Green was nominated last night by the state convention after a heated fight which deposed a woman candidate who placed first in the primaries—Miss Gladys Pyle, secretary of state—and three others.

Miss Pyle led a field of five in the primaries, but failed to poll the requisite 35 per cent vote, necessitating nomination by party convention.

Green's nomination was assured on the eleventh ballot, after Brooke Howell of Frederick, withdrew and threw his support to Green.

The final vote gave: Green 44,232; Pyle 47,885; Carl Tryland, Brookings, 4,340; Howell 3,441, and Carl Gunderson, Mitchell, none.

BLANTON DEFEATS WOMAN ASPIRANT

ABILENE, Tex., May 21, (AP)—Thomas L. Blanton, aggressive Texas congressman who retired two years ago to enter the senatorship race against Earle B. Mayfield, today seemed assured of return to Washington as representative from the 17th Texas congressional district.

Opposing Mrs. R. O. Lee, candidate for the place left vacant several months ago by the death of her husband, Blanton today had a lead of 1,360 out of 14,470 votes counted.

Of the votes tallied, he had received 7,915 and Mrs. Lee, 6,555. Blanton was defeated in the democratic primary of the senatorship race two years ago, and did not reach the runoff election in which Tom Connally defeated Mayfield.

stock and furniture in 40 minutes' time.

A crew of men kept watch over the smoldering ruins all night in order that there would be no recurrence. Sparks were watched so that no other buildings would be endangered. A watchful eye was kept on a corner of the bank building and the remains of a pile of wood which was still blazing away late yesterday afternoon.

There was a possible chance of another blaze if the wind changed.

Few Buildings Remain. A few buildings remain standing, those on the south side of the street, and the buildings in the block where the Hickman hotel is located. None of these was damaged by the flames or sparks, although the hotel was in constant danger during the progress of the fire.

The Carl Lentz family was cared for last night by other residents. Mr. Lentz and his family lost their home and most of their belongings in the fire. They resided upstairs over the restaurant which Mr. Lentz operated for J. L. Sparretors.

The bank vault, in which most of the money and valuables were stored, was the only part of the bank and postoffice building which remained this morning, the only remaining landmark of the disastrous fire which caused Bonanza a loss of \$100,000.

The vault has not yet been opened to remove the valuables.

NEW YORK, May 21, (AP)—It was with a sigh of relief that Mrs. Elizabeth G. Hutchins, 92 years old, went aboard the steamship George Washington today to sail for France with the third contingent of 282 Gold Star mothers.

Mrs. Hutchins was all tired and not, she explained, from the effects of her five day trip across the country from her home in Oakland, Cal.

"I'm the doctors," she said. "They won't leave me alone. Think I'm too old to go to France—I, who still earn my living by running a rooming house out in Oakland—and they keep pestering the life out of me."

"All the way across the continent they kept hopping onto the train and wanting to take my pulse. I suppose people in Oakland wired ahead to them, and they meant well. And I tried to be nice and polite about it."

"I only refused once. That was in Logansport, Ind. But you do get tired of having 'your' pulse taken all the time. It's made me wonder, if after all, maybe, I'm too old to travel."
