If the fight had gone a couple of rounds more Ray would have stopped Dolan. He is in great shape and will be the favorite to take this rugged Steamboat.

Jackson is all confident he can whip McQuillan. He has developed a K. O. punch, showing it to Jack Breedlove on the last card at Chillicothe. Catching the Bend battler with a hard right hand smash to the jaw he sent Jack to the canvas for more than the full count. One thing can be said of Steamboat—the fans are sure of a real fight when he is in the ring.

Light Heavies in Semi
For the semi six rounds, Tex has secured Fighting Bob Evans, high school youth of Dunsmuir to meet Tommy Thompson. Light heavy of Olsen Young Evans is said to be a phenom in the ring and those who have seen Thompson in action know he has ability. Both are hard punchers and one is liable to hear the birdies sing.

American Horse May Win Epsom Derby This Year

LONDON, May 22. (AP)—The success of the American bred horse The Scout II, in the Newmarket stakes yesterday has raised the possibility of an American winning the historic derby at Epsom this year and at the same time giving William Woodward of New York a chance to win both the American and British derbies.

Woodward's Gallant Fox, a half brother of the Scout II, won the Kentucky derby last Saturday.

The Scout II had shown consistent improvement recently and yesterday defeated several other derby candidates at Newmarket. The Scout's success yesterday has shortened the betting odds against him for the derby to 16 to 1 when previously he had been quoted at 33 to 1. Diolite is the favorite at 5 to 1.

Fishermen Up In Arms Over Rogue Recommendation

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22. (AP)—Harold H. Clifford, state game warden, today was in receipt of a communication from the Commercial Fisheries association of the Rogue river district which criticized bitterly the action of the state commission in recommending the closing of the river to commercial fishing.

The recommendation to close the river to the commercial interest was made May 12 when T. E. Daniels, representing the Jackson County Game Protective association and the Isaac Walton league of Grants Pass, presented the commission with an amendment to the present state law.

The amendment provided for the closing of the Rogue river to all forms of commercial fishing. Members of the state game commission gave the amendment their unanimous approval.

The communication from the Commercial Fisheries association stated the association had no chance to present their side of the case, but Clifford said the association would be given a chance to speak at the next session, June 9.

Tug Due in San Francisco Today

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22. (AP)—Anchor tugboat company officials said today the tug Vigilant, unless lost in a gale off the coast Monday or Tuesday as reported yesterday, would arrive in San Francisco this afternoon. The tug cleared the Columbia river Monday enroute to San Francisco. A heavy gale developed 12 hours after the tug left the river.

Captain Harry Johnson, former master of the Oregon Pine, and five other men are aboard the tug officials said. It was towing an empty barge to San Francisco.

World Champion Boxers Credited

BERLIN, May 22. (AP)—The International Boxing Union, convening today, recognized the following Americans as world champions: Frankie Genaro, flyweight; Battling Battalino, featherweight; Sammy Mandell, lightweight; and Young Jack Thompson, welterweight. Titles in bantamweight, middle, light heavy and heavyweight divisions were pronounced vacant.

Delegates were in attendance from seven European countries but one from the United States. England and Czechoslovakia refused admission as their by-laws do not conform to those of the International Boxing Union.

Although their race has been rather overshadowed by the heated struggle in the National league, the Clubs of the American league have been putting on some rather interesting contests of their own for the higher positions in the standings. Little more could be asked of the two leaders, the surprising Washington Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics, current champions, than the pace they have been setting. They are separated only by a one game margin, the Senators having two more victories, and neither seems to be able to do anything to increase or decrease it. Washington now has won six games in a row, but the Athletics are right behind.

Sarpolis Upsets Foxy Kotsanos Two Out of Three

PORTLAND, Ore., May 22. (AP)—Dr. Karl Sarpolis, Cleveland medic-wrestler, defeated George Kotsanos, Hollywood, Cal., here last night two out of three falls. Sarpolis surprised the Californian when he applied his famous flying scissors hold to take the first fall in 22 seconds and the referee stepped back after giving his instructions. Kotsanos came back to win the second fall in 25 minutes, 30 seconds with flying knees after wearing the Doctor down with almost every hold known to the game, including Rosenbergs flying tackle. Kotsanos resumed his flying mare attack in the final session, but grew careless and left himself wide open for a body slam, to which he succumbed after three slams. The time was five minutes.

Sarpolis weighed 210 pounds, Kotsanos 195 lbs. Harry Demetral, Chicago, defeated Kara Arslan, Pasha, the Turk, when he slammed the latter to the floor head first with a crotch hold. Kara was unable to resume.

The St. Louis Cardinals got a big break when Jackie May of Cincinnati cut loose a wild pitch with a man on third and broke a 2-2 tie to give the Cards a 3-2 victory. Pittsburgh held its prehistoric grip on third place by greeting the first appearance of the Cubs at Forbes Field with a dozen solid hits and a 19 to 3 victory.

New York's Glants, after suffering various vicissitudes while entertaining the Braves, started hitting properly again with the appearance of Philadelphia and won by an 11 to 4 count. Fred Fitzsimmons pitched well while Pat Crawford, learning that his job at second was about gone as the Glants acquired Higley Cruz, led the team by driving in four runs with a home run and a triple.

Only Half Game Margin Between Pair; Ducks Lose to Actors
