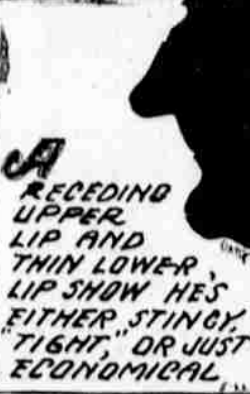


NEWS IN BRIEF

Parrott Employs Faith as Sermon Text Last Night

"Conquering, ever-increasing Faith" was the theme of Evangelist Everett H. Parrott's message to a very interested audience, at the big wooden tabernacle at the corner of 7th and Oak streets last night. The evangelist took his text from the first chapter of the book of Joshua, after Moses' death, God's commission to a young man (Joshua), to lead about two and a half million Israelites, across the Jordan, into the promised land. God's promise to this young man was through faith, no man would ever be able to stand before him. "Every foot of ground that the sole of your feet shall tread upon, shall be yours."

Impossible Made Possible
The evangelist stated, not only with Joshua, but before and after his time, all through the ages, the impossible has been made possible, through simple faith in the God of the Bible, which is proven true, from cover to cover. God is only limited by the extent of our faith, and as Jesus spoke to Martha on the way to the tomb of Lazarus (who was dead four days), He is speaking to His people today, "Said I not unto thee, if thou wouldst believe, thou shouldst see the glory of God?" Unbelief is the great hindrance to the Christian world today, as in every other age.

Tells of Miracles
Rev. Parrott told of God's miracle working power in his very recent campaign in Orland, California. The prayer of faith was offered for a man, who was almost totally blind, being led from place to place for the past twenty years. Sight was completely restored, by the miracle working Christ, who is without a doubt proven to be the very same today. Mr. Parrott stated he felt real faith rising in Klamath for a mighty revival of salvation, and healings, and he would soon pray for the sick. Services every night, and twice on Sundays. Mr. Parrott was hindered from being here in time for last night's service, but will arrive in the city today in time for the service tonight.

Local Salesman Doubles Record For Ford Sales

F. B. Patty, salesman for the Ford Motor company, has set an unusual record in car sales. Mr. Patty has 200 cars in the 11 months he has been with the Ford company of this city. A man with exceptional ability sells about 100 cars a year. In many localities they have the "100 Car Club" composed of salesman selling 100 cars each year. Mr. Patty's record is more than double this amount.

This salesman covers on an average of 100 miles a day in his territory which includes Merrill, Malin and the Tule Lake country, and sometimes travels as much as 200 miles a day. MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, May 22, (AP)—Egg values continue weak, although no price change was announced by the co-operatives. Butter quotations were fairly steady following the recent decline. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says: "Trading on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market continues dull, probably due to increased supplies of early-summer fruits, movement of which is delayed by cool rainy weather. Cantaloupes from the Imperial valley are of excellent quality, but they are meeting with little interest by the retail trade, and prices were lowered 25-50c per crate today. "A few cherries are arriving from California, but prices are still high, and demand is limited. Eastern Washington is expressing a few crates of early cherries daily also. "Oregon asparagus and strawberries are in light supply, and prices continue steady. Weather continues to do damage to quality of strawberries. "First large white potatoes from the Shafter, California district appeared at Portland today. This is fine-appearing stock, selling at about 5c per lb. "Tomatoes from Mexico, southern California, and Texas are competing for preference. A general lowering of prices is the result."

EGGS: Weak, unchanged.
MILK (butterfat), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, wool, nuts, hay, cascara bark and hops, steady and unchanged.

FLOUR (city delivery prices): Family patents, 49s, 47.00; whole wheat, 49s, 46.10; graham, 49s, 46.90; bakers' hard wheat, 9s, 46.20; bakers' bluestem patents, 49s, 46.50; pastry flour, 49s, 46.50.
