TO BUILD ROAD AND STEEL FIRE TOWER ON FAMOUS SUGAR HILL

ALTAMONT, May 22.—The summit of Sugar Hill, one of the famous mountains of the north end of the Warner range in this section, will be made accessible by an auto road, construction of which will be started by the forest service within the next two weeks.
At the present time an auto road runs within two miles of the summit and the new road will reach the top on a fairly easy uniform grade.

Famous Landmark
Sugar Hill, which rises almost from the shore of Goose lake, to form a rather low-lying, domed summit, has been a famous landmark since while men first arrived in this section and was much used as a lookout point by the Indians of that time.

It juts out from the main body of the Warner range so that it gives a commanding view not only of a large scope of territory lying along the western summit of the mountains but also for miles into Oregon and California from its top.

The forest service expects to have the road completed to the summit of Sugar Hill by July 1, after which a standard steel lookout tower will be constructed there. The present tower consists merely of a platform built in a tree and this has done duty for many years. This home made tower was built almost a decade ago by Forest Ranger Laurence L. Smith, and Perry and Luther Clark, all expert woodmen who carefully cut one tree partially through and allowed it to fall into another upright tree in which a platform was built, the leaning tree being used as a ladder or stairway to reach the observation platform, which is a little over 60 feet high.

Sugar Hill was so named because during the late '60s a wagonload of sugar on route from Yreka to Ft. Bidwell for the soldiers there, broke down in negotiating a shoulder of the mountain and the garrison went sugarless for several weeks.

Members of Aloha chapter of Eastern Star will be in charge of the final rites for Mrs. Virgil, who was a well-known Klamath pioneer. Interment will be held in the family plot in Linville cemetery.
