

Jackson-McQuillan Bout May End in Kayo

STEAMBOAT'S RIGHT FILLED WITH DYNAMITE

Preliminary Card Also Offers Possibilities Of Knockouts

Ray McQuillan, colored middleweight of Portland, and Arthur "Steamboat" Jackson, Klamath middleweight, are in the best condition for tonight's fight at the Legion hall when they meet in the ten round main event.

Five good bouts are offered on the card which will start at 8:30. Two willing mixers will open the show when Young Gionetti, Dorrie, California, and Indian Johnny Jackson meet in the four round curtain raiser.

Sensation to Show
The second event of four rounds at 147 pounds sees Honolulu Joe and Turkey Red, of Klamath Falls and Eugene respectively, meeting. The Eugene boy is called the sensation of the valuer at the present time. He is a high school youth, 16 years old, and full of the old "Irish".

In the four round special event, also at 147 pounds, Indian Joe Corbett of Roseburg and the ever pleasing Red Hansaker of Chiloquin will meet. Hansaker fought Austin Rowander to a standstill in the last Chiloquin card. Corbett has fought Steamboat Jackson three draws—some time ago—and should defeat Hansaker who has surprised more than one "coming" fighter, however.

Light-Heavies Meet
Two light-heavyweights who are ambitious to get ahead in the fight game will meet in the semi-windup of six rounds. Fighting Bob Evans of Danamur will be seen in one corner while Tommy Thompson, experienced boxer from Oleno, will occupy the other corner. Fans hope for a knock-out and the sound of "Timber!" as a big boy drops to the canvas.

The main question in the main event seems to be whether or not Steamboat Jackson has improved enough in the past year to box on even terms with McQuillan who won a decision Tuesday night in Portland over Jimmy Dolan who had been groomed for a fight with Young Jack Thompson. The colored boy won so decisively that Dolan backers decided he needed more "grooming".

Real Doubt Exists
Many think that the bout will go the full route and that if it does McQuillan will win on points. The real doubt, however, happens to be one of Steamboat's hard rights. If one of them lands any time before the final going it will probably be "certain" for McQuillan as it was for Jack Breedlove last week in Chiloquin. It is a clutch bet that Jackson can take the hardest McQuillan has to offer and still keep on fighting strong.

Jackson backers are optimistic. McQuillan supporters are confident. Tickets are on sale at local pool halls.

Regatta Expected To Attract Large Gathering Sunday

In expectation of the huge crowd that will line the banks of Emigrant Lake Sunday afternoon to watch the American Legion outboard motorboat races, extensive preparations have been made by the regatta committee to furnish adequate parking space for motorists and conveniences for the spectators.

New gates are being erected at the entrance to prevent a last minute traffic jam and members of Post No. 15 Drum Corps will have charge of car parking and policing of crowds. As the Pacific highway is now clear of construction work, motorists from the north and south will be able to drive their cars on the pavement all the way to the lake.

Install Broadcast System
Spectators on shore will be kept posted on the various events through an outdoor broadcast system to be installed by the Electric Wiring company. Names of the winners and their boats will be relayed to the shore from the judge's barge and immediately broadcast along the shore fronting the race course.

Officials in charge of the race were announced today by Harry G. Moore, general chairman. They are: judges, O. O. Alender, J. C. Thompson and F. E. Mendoncello; timers, Everett Brayton, Emil Brophy, Don Newbury and W. G. Laidley; starter, C. T. "Ted" Baker; scorers, Herbert Huesong and George Nickerson; announcer, Carl Y. Tengwald; registrar, Bob Wilson.

Expert to Assist
R. E. Bernhardt, outboard motorboat expert for the Standard Oil company, will arrive from San Francisco the latter part of the week to assist the committee in the handling of the races. Bernhardt assisted the committee at the races last month and is an authority on classifying outboard craft. He also will act as assistant starter.

"Hit and Run" Plays Described

The "hit and run" play is really a "run and hit" play. The object of the play is to "break up" the infield of the opposing club. By means of a prearranged sign between the batter and the baserunner, the batter signals his intention to hit the ball as the pitcher delivers it. Either the second baseman or shortstop must cover second to try and catch the runner stealing and the batter endeavors to hit the ball through the position thus vacated.

The batter usually "hits and runs" when he is the pitcher in the "hole"; when he is reasonably sure that the pitcher must throw him a good ball. However, no matter where the ball is thrown, he must make every effort to hit it and protect the baserunner, once he has flashed his intention.

The sign I have given in my cartoon is a simple one. In this sign, the "hit and run" sign is in force on every ball pitched, until it is called off by the batter touching his cap and tapping the plate with his bat, before each pitch.

Some major league batters like to "hit and run" with a runner on second base. When the runner starts for third the third baseman must cover the bag and this gives the batter a chance to hit through his vacated position.

Babe Ruth Has Improved Day By Day Since Season Opened

Since early season, Babe Ruth has been getting better and better and the Yankees have been improving steadily. But not until yesterday did the Babe and his slugging partner, Lou Gehrig, hit their best from together to give a demonstration of the possibilities of Bob Shawkey's club.

Gets Three Homers
Ruth opened up with his big runs on Wednesday when he hit three home runs in one game. Yesterday he performed a slightly lesser feat, hitting two homers in one game of a double header and one in the second.

While his mates followed his example in hitting hard and frequently to trounce the Philadelphia Athletics by the decisive score of 10 to 1 and 20 to 13.

In the two games, the Yankees made 39 hits, of which nine were homers, while the Athletics made five four baggers in the second contest to tie the Major League record of ten in one game. Gehrig emulated Ruth's great feat by hitting three in this game. The big three of the Yankees, Ruth, Lazzeri and Gehrig, made 17 of the hits with some outside assistance from Lyn Lary while even Dusty Cooke, the hitless youngster of the club, made three blows in the second game.

A's Checked
The double defeat checked the Philadelphia prospects of overtaking Washington's League leaders as the Senators took two games from the Boston Red Sox. Washington pulled out a 3-2 opening victory in a duel between Bump Hadley and Milton Gaston as each yielded five hits. Then they stepped out to hit 18.

The day's encounters closeded the race in the first division and left the Missions with only a slim hold on first place in the second division.
