PORTLAND, Ore., May 23, (AP)—An informal "good will" cruise to cities of the Upper Columbia and Snake rivers, and a study of navigation possibilities of these rivers will be the mission of a dozen rortlanders who this morning left the Portland harbor in three motorboat cruizers.

Leaving Lewiston the party will spend a week exploring and studying channel conditions on the upper reaches of the Snake river.

June 6—Pendleton-John Day grading, Umatilla National forest, Umatilla and Grant counties, Ore., 5.2 miles; Roosevelt coast highway surfacing, Siuslaw National forest, Lincoln county, Ore., 13.9 miles; and Canyon City-Burns grading, Malheur National forest, Grant county, Ore., 8 miles.
