George Jackson Submits Figure of \$167,130 On Building

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\$219,575 and Stebbins Brothers, Portland, \$175,880.

Actual construction on the building, which is to be located on South Seventh between Oak and Walnut, will be started in the near future and there is a possibility that it will be commenced before the first of July. The successful bidder will probably be notified within a few days and construction must necessarily start within 30 days after the notification.

The postoffice will not move into new quarters before they take possession of the new building. John McFall, postmaster, stated recently, since the new building is expected to be ready for occupancy about October 1, 1931.

Plans and specifications have been approved and Klamath Falls is assured of a handsome structure fitted with the most modern of appliances and conveniences.

The most up to date methods of handling the mail will be used in the new building.

mills during the first 20 weeks of the year were 8.09 percent below their output.

Reports for the first 20 weeks of this year from 303 mills which had been operating about 35 percent below capacity, showed that production was 3.81 percent below the cut during the same period last year.

Unfilled orders increased about 6,500,000 over the previous week.

Notwithstanding his great size, Jack Crawford, the popular young leader of the Victor Recording Orchestra coming to Klamath Falls on Tuesday, May 27, is one of the most nimble and graceful of dancers. His is not the deliberate joking that is generally prearranged, but the kind that responds spontaneously to the humorous side of a situation. It is not uncommon for many of his quips and sallies to be repeated by others months later, and with good effect.

COWMEN MEET IN CONVENTION

association, and the brand inspection laws.

The County Judge closed his address by welcoming the delegates to the convention of the Southern Oregon Livestock association, Klamath county, and the Klamath county chamber of commerce, not only at this time, but for future conventions.

Morse Responds.

The response to Judge Goddard's address of welcome was delivered by Roger Morse, county agriculturist of Baker county, on behalf of Cattle and Horse Raisers association of Oregon. Mr. Morse has attended four conventions of the organization in the last four years.

"I feel," said Mr. Morse, "that a response to an address of welcome is unnecessary, the members of the convention will show by their actions their appreciation of Klamath's hospitality."

Achieves Envious Record.

When the invitation from Klamath Falls was delivered at the 1929 convention in Baker, the members voted unanimously to accept the invitation, because all were anxious to become acquainted with the Klamath country. Mr. Morse concluded with the statement that the Cattle and Horse Raisers association of Oregon, during the 17 years since its organization, has achieved an enviable record of accomplishments for the state. The leaders of the association have been men of vision and courage, and the organization has done much to foster the industry in the state.

President Speaks.

The president of the association, Herman Oliver, of John Day, Oregon, followed Mr. Morse. Mr. Oliver opened his address with a short eulogy in memory of the late Governor L. L. Patterson, who was a member of the organization. President Oliver asked that the audience rise for a moment in respect to the memory of the late governor of the state.

"The livestock industry," said Mr. Oliver, "is one of the most important in the nation, and has been one of the slowest to organize. It is essential that livestock men, and their bankers, and financial backers come together in convention at various times to pool thoughts and ideas. Financiers must understand the interests that they are backing, and to this end must know freight rates, elements of disease control, and the tariff."

"Cattlemen have been hard put to know just which way to turn during the past year, what with a severe winter, the depressed financial conditions, poor grazing, because of insufficient rains early in the season, the market has been unsatisfactory. However, I do not believe that these conditions will prevail much longer."

Beef Production Low.

"The beef industry is the only one at present, not faced with over production," Mr. Oliver continued, "I advise cattlemen, in spite of this fact, to cull and grade inferior stock, to breed for quality, to keep down their overhead by raising heavy, quickly developing stock in which the returns are greater."

"Beef cattle have decreased over thirteen million since the year of 1900, and the human population has increased over four million since that time, so that where there were two people for every beef in 1900, in 1929 there were five to every beef. The total meat consumption has decreased since 1900, but in the period since that time more pork and mutton have been consumed. Cattlemen must boost beef consumption. The demonstrations given by D. W. Hartzell are very beneficial to the industry, and are being met with approval wherever given."

Reviews Laws.

Mr. Oliver reviewed the measures that have been sponsored by the association, and which have benefited stockmen of the state, and urged the attendance of all at the national convention to be held in Seattle next year. Judge William Duh, of Baker,

presented a report of the resources of the association, and also urged a full attendance at the national convention to be held in Seattle.

State Veterinarian, Dr. W. H. Lytle, of Salem, gave an interpretation of the "Gasoline Cowboy Bill" and of the benefits that have been derived from it.

The morning session closed with the appointment of a committee on credentials, an auditing committee and a committee on resolutions.

One hundred and ten cattlemen and their wives were in the audience at this morning's session. Registration of the delegates is in charge of Dorothy Stevens of the local chamber of commerce, and is being handled in a systematic and efficient manner.

At this afternoon's session interesting talks were given by distinguished members of the association, and several musical numbers were presented during the afternoon. A theatre party will be the entertainment for the evening.

One of the features of Saturday's program will be the cowboy breakfast at the county fair grounds at 6:30 a. m.
