## PELICANS AND CUBS TO PLAY VISITING NINES

Ashland And Lakeview Clubs Offer Fans Real Baseball

Klamath baseball fans are in line for a big day at the fair grounds park Sunday afternoon with two games on the bill.

Opening the entertainment will be a game between the Klamath Cubs and the Lakeview Pelicans. These teams have met already this season and Lakeview holds the honors, a fact that ripples deep in the breasts of the Cubans because the Klamath boys know they have a good team and they want to show the home fans they know the good old national game. This game starts at 1:00 p. m.

**Ashland vs. Pelicans.** Ashland, playing a good game here last Sunday, although losing 1-1, is coming back with a strengthened lineup with the hope of turning the tables on the Pelicans. To meet this renewed effort, Manager Red Sanders is holding his three pitchers in line. "Big Boy" Moser has whipped into shape and if used tomorrow the fans will see a different chucker to the one who ferreted Ashland to turn defeat into victory. Then there is Earl Hilton, a pitcher any club can rely on to deliver the goods. Lefty Beck will probably occupy the box tomorrow, although Red has not stated his choice.

The Pelicans have worked out very evenly and the warmer weather has given them the old time baseball rest. Sandy is just waiting to meet Medford again, for he feels he has an aggregation that can outplay the Pear Pickers.

**Great Battering Rivalry.** Great batting rivalry has developed among the boys. Mann and Ziel are out to top the league, but they will have to watch their step with a consistent batter like Shipman, and this new boy Granger is not to be overlooked. He is a consistent hitter and has a fast getaway to first. From all appearances he is big league timber.

These two veterans, Pop Varnadore and Fuller, are working like Jackson and Critz of the Giants. The warm weather is doing these crack infielders worlds of good. Peterson at first is himself again, having recovered from the ill effects of a badly spiked foot which kept him from playing his game last Sunday.

As the Jack Sharkey-Max Schmeling fight draws closer it looks like one of the best heavy weight scraps since the Dempsey-Tunney "long count" bout in Chicago in 1937.

The fight fans see some color in the match, which is a great relief after the pallid affairs that have been dished up the past few years, disguised as fights.

If Schmeling's long lay-off hasn't hurt his judgment of distance it ought to be a corking affair.

Sharkey is about due for one of his good fights and if he is, Max is in for a tough evening.

While Jack has less accuracy of delivery than Tunney and a less deadening sting to a single blow than Dempsey, he is a formidable opponent when he thinks he can lick his man. Assuming a dreadful look of mingled contempt and slaughterous purpose, Jack, in his good fights, uses his fists more like clubs than hands and beats down his victim's guard.

But if he has one of his lazy, indifferent nights, Schmeling has a great opportunity.

## RAY McQUILLAN STOPS JACKSON IN ROUND FIVE

Colored Boy Threw Far Too Many Gloves For Game Steamboat

Steamboat Jackson is as game a fighter as ever stepped into the ring in Klamath Falls, but there are some things about the fight racket that Steamboat hasn't learned yet and this was made apparent in his mix with Ray McQuillan at the Legion pavilion last night.

In the first two rounds Steamboat appeared to have about an even break on close-in fighting and slugging, but in the third the superior boxing ability of the colored boy began to show and Steamboat took an awful lot of punishment. In the fourth round McQuillan went in to get his man and before the round was over Steamboat had taken the count of nine. But did he quit? Never! He got right up and milled it with McQuillan until just before the tap of the bell when another short right put the white boy on the canvas.

In the rest period Tex Bickstaff threw in the towel for Steamboat but this didn't suit the boy who was getting the worst of a tough fight and he hurried it out. At the sound of the going in the fifth, he went in for some more hard milling but took another fall and Referee Dick Reed raised McQuillan's hand in token of victory. Steamboat protested but Dick was adamant and the fight was over.

The fans were with Steamboat for his gameness, but all recognized the superior ring mastery of the colored boy, who is one of the best in his weight on the coast and who is scheduled to meet Young Jack Thompson in an effort to wrest the championship from him. Steamboat lost none of his popularity by last night's performance. He is way above the average in his class but must learn more boxing to save himself in the light pinches. Failure to ward off body blows last night weakened his chances in the early rounds and his tendency to bore in when sparring would have been more to his advantage were work spots the clever McQuillan took readily advantage of. Steamboat landed some hard punches and McQuillan admitted they hurt.

**Fighting Bob Loses** Tommy Thompson was given the decision in his six round fight with Fighting Bob Evans. The worst that Evans should have had was a draw. This boy Evans fought his first fight and shows well. He is 18 years old and going to high school. He will be a credit to the fight game if he continues as he has started, but has lots to learn.

Thompson looked bad. During a flurry of blows from Evans he would get as near to the canvas as he could and still hold his hands up. Why he does it no one but himself knows. In this position he is open for a short uppercut and can do nothing in the way of punching. Tommy could be a good boy if he liked the fight racket but he does not care to be hit and when his punches he throws them wide and wild.

**Feature Fight** In the feature fight of the card Red Hannecker and Indian Joe Corbett fought four hard rounds. These two boys stood toe to toe and swung punches. Corbett landed the most and was rightly given the fight.

It is said these fighters were fighting a grudge fight and it had the earmarks of just such a fight. Red climbed back in the ring and issued a challenge to Corbett. He is not satisfied that the Indian is the better boy.

Californians Come Out Without Loss Of Single Set

AUTEUIL, France, May 24 (AP)—The powerful American combination of Helen Wills Moody and Elizabeth Ryan captured the French women's doubles tennis championship today, defeating Mme. Simone Mathieu and Mlle. Yvette Barbiere of France in the final at 6-3, 6-1.

The Californians won the title without loss of a single set. Though a bye and default they had to play only three matches and won them all in short order. Queen Helen, paired with one of the finest doubles players in the world, thus added a second French title to the singles crown which she is now defending.

**Play Invincible Tennis** Mrs. Moody and Miss Ryan played invincible tennis, especially in the second set where Helen, for the first time in her present appearance in France, reached top form.

The Americans won through their own superior playing, not the faults or errors of their adversaries.

Although Helen has captured singles honors easily for the last two years she has been unsuccessful hitherto in doubles, having been eliminated last year when paired with Edith Cross and the previous year when she had Penelope Anderson as her partner.

In the veteran Californian who has lived in England for many years, she found the perfect partner. A master of doubles court tactics, the famous chop stroke artist fitted in perfectly with Helen's strong driving and serving game.
