## MARKET QUOTATIONS

**PORTLAND, May 24. (AP)—** Butter and butterfat prices were reduced 1c at the Portland Produce Exchange today. This brings extras in butter to 34c and butterfat delivered Portland to 32c.

Egg prices were barely steady. With new crop cascara bark coming in, the price tendency was a trifle lower.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the U. S. department of agriculture says:

"Yakima apples continue to arrive by motor-truck at the rate of 500-600 boxes daily, and are moving to retailers promptly. Wholesalers dominate the apple market now, with small C grade stock finding particularly ready outlet. Prices to retailers range from about \$1.75 for cheaper grades to \$3.25 for extra fancies.

"Strawberries were rather scarce, demand is improving, and quality is improving. Local berries are now of fine quality.

"Lettuce weakened to \$1.25 per crate of 3 dozen heads, with considerably heavy supplies.

"Tomatoes show wide range in quality, ranging from track sales at \$2.50 per lug of ordinary quality Mexicans, to retailers' purchases of best re-pack Texas and California tomatoes at \$5.50 per lug.

"The large white new potatoes from Shafter, Calif., are meeting with good demand, and first arrivals are moving readily to retailers at 3c per lb. Colima garbanos are a shade lower, at \$4.00-4.25 per cwt. Old potatoes are quiet, although withdrawals from storage continue at a moderate rate.
