Good, bad and also some indifferent fielding was sprinkled into the melee and to add just another word there was some fielding that was putrid. Nine boots were charged against Ashland and 2 against Klamath Falls. In spite of this the game was hair raising until Ed Hilton pulled the string on the last pitch to Maas who had twice hit for the full trip, there was plenty to get excited about.

Hilton "On"
Earl Hilton of course was as usual on. He allowed 11 hits by the invaders but in only one inning, the eighth were the boys from Normal town able to bunch the buns. In this stanza Maas poked his second, the bascocks, a couple of mates and the big Ashland. This was really the last threat, although in the last frame after Gosnell had made the first station on a boot, Swartz struck out and Hulen and Kaufman had singled in succession to make it three hits apiece for the afternoon. Hilton "put on the power" and whiffed the head customers home to send the evening homebag. A little stupid base running in this stanza by Gosnell might have helped him some as he tried to take third on a short single and was thrown out by inches. Hitting honors were between Eddie Ziel and Maas. Ed had a double, single and homer for his hit, while Maas, as aforementioned, gave two of Hiltons offerings a four-pipe ride. Shipman for Kay Falls got his Big Betsey against Gosnell's best for three smacks, one being for two bases. Hulen partly atoned for a terrible afternoon field by smacking three.

Oregon Trounces Statens on Track In Saturday Meet

EUGENE, Ore., May 26. (AP)—University of Oregon Athletics were back on their old stamping grounds today with the satisfaction of having trounced Oregon State in the 15th annual dual track meet between the two institutions. Oregon won the meet 77 to 54, forfeiting the last event on the program, the relay. The Statens lost their chance for a record in the relay by this forfeiture as their crack foursome has been stepping the mile in less than meet record time this season.

Three Records Broken
Three records were broken, all by university men. Dickson established a new mark of 195 feet 11 1/2 inches for the javelin; beating the distance of Art Tuck, Oregon State, set in 1921.
Bale finished the 220 in 22 seconds, slicing a tenth of a second off the mark set in 1922 by Oberteuffer, Oregon.
Ed Moeller beat his own record of last year by tossing the discus 150 feet six inches.

Ralph Hill, sensational miler, took it easy in the meet and came loafing behind Steel, schoolmate, who placed first.

SACS IN TIGHT PLACE AFTER SUNDAY GAMES

Lose First Series Of
Season In Mixup
With Angels

Four doubleheaders, including some unique encounters, yesterday put the Sacramento team in a position such that it will have to step lively to keep ahead in the near future. The Sacs lost their first series of the season when Los Angeles beat them 3 to 6, in the afternoon, after the teams had played an all-night twelve-inning 6 to 0 tie in the morning. Tony Freitas, of the Sacs, and veteran Ed Baecht for the Angels put up a pitcher's duel that kept the batters of both teams from registering a tally in the first contest, which was played at Stockton. In the afternoon, Holling was knocked out of the box after starting for the Angels, but his two bagger with three on in the fourth proved a decisive factor.

Oaks, Seals Split

The other two first division clubs, San Francisco and Oakland, split a doubleheader, the former taking four out of the seven games of the week's series. Curtis Davis pitched well for the Seals and hit a three bagger in the second inning as his team took the measure of Edwards and won the first game, 3 to 1. In the afternoon Pete Daglia allowed the Seals 13 hits while his teammates got only eight, but the Oaks used their better advantage to score a 5 to 4 victory at the expense of Miljus and Turpin.

Indians Blank Missions

The Missions took their sixth out of the week's eight games with Seattle in the morning, 14 to 13, in 13 innings, but were shut out, 7 to 0, in the nightcap. The Indians started the morning fray with 7 to 0 lead in the first three innings, but the reds tied it up at nine all in the seventh. Knothe and Barbee knocked homers for the Indians in the first of the ten, and a four run lead made it look like a Seattle game, then George Burns, Mission first sacker, knocked out a homer with two on, which with one more Red tally tied the score, at 13 all. The Missions took the winning run from Dutch Reafer in the 13th. Douglas and Pillette worked on the mound for the Missions.

Stars Take Series

Hollywood made it five out of eight for the week by dividing a two game bill with Portland at Los Angeles, 6 to 5 and 4 to 7. Johns was credited with winning the first game for the stars, and Orman threw for Portland. Carl Mays took the second for the Beavers, keeping Hollywood well in hand throughout. Wetzel, Page and Severid were hit frequently by the Portland batters.

In fact it was something of an event yesterday when two of the younger generation of hurlers turned in good games on one afternoon.

Mahaffey Winner

Leroy Mahaffey of the Athletics, who has been tried out in the Majors before but did not make the grade, was the one winner of the two. Making his first start for the world's champions, he turned back the New York Yankees in a neat fashion, stopping their batting spree with a seven hit game to win, 10 to 3. Mahaffey, who came up this year from the Portland Pacific Coast league club, perhaps recognized a kindred soul in Dusty Cooke of the Yankees, for he allowed Cooke two hits, including a home run, which aided his average considerably.

Lucas Scores Winning Tally

Leon Chagnon of Pittsburgh pitched well in the second game of the Pirates double header, but he could not cope the experience of his rival, Red Lucas, and the Cincinnati Reds broke and the losing streak with a 4 to 3 victory. Lucas himself scored the winning run in the ninth inning. The Pirates gave Cincinnati its tenth straight defeat in the ten inning opener by a 4 to 3 score. The rest of the day's pitching triumphs went to veterans of at least several years standing: Adolfo Luque, one of the ancient of the National league, held the New York Giants to four hits in ten innings as Brooklyn won, 4 to 3, for its 19th victory.

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Oregon Amateur Golf Title Play Opens at Eugene

EUGENE, Ore., May 26. (AP)—The annual Oregon State amateur golf championship tournament with 42 women and 125 men from clubs in Oregon, Washington, California, Texas and Nebraska participating, started here today over the Eugene country club course with the fair mashie wielders raising the curtain with their qualifying rounds.

Competition in both divisions promised to be keen. Dr. O. F. Willing, present title holder, and Don Moe, Oregon boy wonder, are absent from the tournament this year, both having been selected on the Walker Cup team. With their absence, the state title belongs to any one who can shoot below par golf.

Vincent Dolp and his brother, Frank, both of whom have held Pacific Northwest titles, are looked upon as the favorites in the men's section, while Mrs. R. E. Eya, defending champion, is booked to retain her title.

Archie Stewart and Earl Peterson, both of Seattle, are two of the out of state contenders. California is represented by three men and one woman: George Shaw, Los Angeles; F. S. Pyle, Lake Lucerne; Dr. G. M. Londrock, Mill Valley and Miss Betty Rowden, Sacramento. George Rollins of Stanford, Texas, and Mrs. A. C. Loucks, Omaha, Neb., complete the out of state entrants.

Actual play in the men's division will start Tuesday with a 36 hole medal test. The women will play an 18 hole qualifying round.
